VHS Acquisition Subsidiary Number 9, Inc. (d/b/a MetroWest Medical Center) – Formal 90-Day Notice of Closure of Medical/Surgical Service, Intensive Care Unit, Emergency Department, Operating Rooms, and Outpatient Rehab at Leonard Morse Campus

Dear Mr. Lohnes:

This letter is submitted on behalf of VHS Acquisition Subsidiary Number 9, Inc., d/b/a MetroWest Medical Center (the "Medical Center"). Pursuant to 105 CMR 130.122(B), the Hospital hereby provides ninety (90) day notice to the Department of Public Health ("Department") of its decision to discontinue its operation of all medical hospital services at its Leonard Morse Campus located at 67 Union Street, Natick, MA 01760 ("LMC"). These services include a 64-bed Medical-Surgical unit, 10-bed Intensive Care Unit, all Operating Rooms, its Emergency service, and its Outpatient Rehabilitation Service, collectively referred to as the "Services." As a result, only LMC's inpatient Psychiatric Service, its Sleep Lab Service, outpatient laboratory phlebotomy, electroconvulsive therapy and its CT Service will remain open. We offer the following comments with respect to this matter.

The Medical Center has determined that the Services should be discontinued because of insufficient patient volume, which is an indicator that the services are not needed and redundant in light of other alternative sites providing similar services. In compliance with applicable requirements at 105 CMR 130.122(B), the Medical Center provides this written notice of the planned discontinuance of the above described services. The following information regarding the discontinuation is hereby provided for your review:

1. <u>Current Utilization Rates</u>. The following represents the patient volume of the Services at the Medical Center over the last several years. Each of the Services has experienced a declining volume trend over this time period.



Since 2015, LMC has experienced a significant drop in emergency department volume. During this time period, emergency department visits dropped twenty-four (24%) or almost one quarter (1/4) of its volume.

The declining emergency visit trend correlates with a sharp decline in the other acute care services. For example, the Average Daily Census ("ADC") for LMC's medical/surgical unit dropped from 19.3 patients in 2016 to 13.6 patients in 2019, which represents an almost thirty percent (30%) drop in ADC, or about one third (1/3) in admissions to the unit on an ADC basis. The decline in ADC volume in the intensive care unit ("ICU") was even more significant during the same time period, dropping over thirty-six percent (36%).

Both inpatient and outpatient surgery services had a similar decline in volume. Since 2016, inpatient surgeries dropped twelve (12%) percent. Outpatient surgeries dropped almost six percent (6%). Accordingly, the average decline in total surgeries at LMC dropped 8.5% percent from 2016 through 2019. In other words, almost one out of ten patients is no longer obtaining surgery at LMC.

LMC's outpatient rehabilitation services have also been impacted by changes in patient volume. Since 2016, there has been an over fifteen percent (15%) drop in patient utilization of LMC's Physical Therapy Service. Over the same period, the volume of Occupational Therapy declined by almost ten percent (10%). In both cases, and like the other Services being closed, volume dropped year after year. Accordingly, total outpatient rehabilitation utilization dropped eleven percent (11%) since 2016. This significant and consistent decline in outpatient rehabilitation volume in the last few years is evidence that patients are not choosing LMC for these services in greater numbers.

- 2. <u>Impact of Discontinuance</u>. The Medical Center does not expect a significant impact, if any, on patient access following the closure of these Services. Its Framingham Union Hospital campus is capable of taking on any and all additional volume that may result from the closing of the Services at LMC. In addition, it is geographically close to LMC and its patient community, as it is under six (6) miles away and is near main roads, such as Route 9 and Route 135, both of which run through Natick. There are other health care providers which offer these Services within the same geographic area, as well. For example, the following is a list of alternative hospital sites where patients may obtain ED and Surgical care:
 - MWMC Framingham Union Hospital (5.7 Miles) 147 Beds; 45,000 ED Visits
 - Beth Israel-Deaconess Needham (6.1 Miles) 58 beds; 19 bays
 - Newton-Wellesley Hospital (7.5 Miles) a 286 beds; 60,000 ED Visits in 36 bays

There are also numerous urgent care sites in the Town of Natick and City of Framingham which can serve as a substitute for the ED setting at LMC where appropriate. Likewise, Physical Therapy and Occupational Therapy is offered in other settings operated by the Medical Center that are geographically close and accessible to the patient community, and that offer similar outpatient rehab services. These sites include:

- MWMC Framingham Union Hospital (5.7 Miles)
- MWMC Wellness Center (6.5 Miles)
- 3. <u>Date Set of Discontinuation</u>. Ninety (90) day notice is hereby given for a target closure date of May 20, 2020.
- 4. <u>Health Care Coalitions and Community Groups</u>. The Hospital anticipates that the following community group may have an interest in the discontinuation of the Services:

- 5. <u>Community Engagement and Planning Activities Prior to the Notice of Closure.</u> The Hospital has undertaken the following community engagement and planning activities:



- January 20, 2020 Conference call with CEO and officials from local health care and community organizations concerning the rationale for changes, timeline, community resources, and plan for Framingham Union Hospital. Participants included MetroWest Chamber of Commerce, Framingham State University, MassBay Community College, New England Quality Care Alliance (NEQCA), Tenet Physician Resources (TPR), Charles River Medical Associates (CRMA), Reliant Medical Group, Brewster Ambulance Service, Fallon Ambulance Service, and MetroWest Health Foundation.
- January 21, 2020 Notice of closures provided to the Medical Center's governing board, medical staff, Massachusetts Nurses Association, Local 877 Union, IBEW 109 Union, Massachusetts Senators and Representatives for Natick and Framingham, local officials of Natick and Framingham, PFAC, and EMS providers from Natick, Framingham, Ashland, Holliston, Hopkinton, Marlborough, Millis, Sudbury, and Wayland, as well as Brewster Ambulance Service, Fallon Ambulance Service, and Lifeline Ambulance Service.
- January 21, 2020 Employees were notified of the closures through open forums held by the Medical Center.
- January 21, 2020 Meeting with CEO and EMS providers concerning the rationale for changes, timeline, community resources, and plan for Framingham Union Hospital.
