General Information: This 531-acre pond averages 5.9 feet in depth with a maximum of 12 feet. Aquatic weeds are common along much of the shore. Residential development is moderate with several year-round homes and summer cottages. Half of the northern shoreline is bordered by Shore Road, while the remaining half is clustered with cottages and houses. About 2/3 of the eastern shore is developed, in contrast to the practically undeveloped western shoreline. Boats can be launched at the north end of the pond off Shore Road. There is a paved launching ramp and parking space for 40 cars. Fishing, boating, and swimming are all popular.

Access: Boats can be launched at the north end of the pond off Shore Road. There is a paved launching ramp and parking space for 40 cars.

Management History: Managed as a warmwater fishery.

Fish Populations: The fish population was most recently studied during a 1995 summer sampling effort. The pond supports a diverse fish fauna. Gamefish present include largemouth bass, chain pickerel, and northern pike. Seven species of panfish are present including white perch, yellow perch, black crappie, bluegills, pumpkinseeds, and redbreast sunfish. Bullheads, both yellow and brown, white suckers, golden shiners, lake chubsuckers and alewives also inhabit the pond. Northern pike have been stocked here regularly since 1984. Since 2008 annual surveys are conducted in the spring on Northern pike growth and reproduction.

Fishing: With Northern pike becoming a popular gamefish, people are known to travel good distances to pursue this great fighter. There are also quality largemouth bass, chain pickerel, white perch, yellow perch, and black crappie to be had. For those interested in summer bullheads, Quaboag Pond has some of the best potential around.
