

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The average daily population during this first quarter of 2012 (January-March) was the highest it's been in a year both in terms of the custody and jurisdiction populations. This was mostly due to an increase among the criminally sentenced population. Monthly averages can range and are normal among the various types of criminally sentenced admissions and releases, with the totals therein driven by new court commitments (admissions) and expiration of sentence to the Street (releases) representing the largest type respectively.


From April 2011 through March 2012:

- Admissions outpaced releases resulting in a cumulative increase of 285 inmates in the MA DOC jurisdiction population
- Based on monthly averages, 44% of **admissions** were pre-trial detainees, 34% were criminally sentenced and 22% were civil commitments. **Release** averages were almost exactly the same in proportion
- Among the **criminally sentenced** population, the cumulative difference between admissions and releases among **females** decreased by 64 inmates, whereas it increased by 257 among **males**
- The percent of criminally sentenced releases to the street **paroled** continues to fluctuate ranging these last 4 quarters from a low of 16% to a high of 24%
 - There was a sharp increase among females being paroled this quarter (Jan-March 2012) compared to the past 3 quarters, 30% compared to 14%, 15% and 13% the previous 3 quarters
 - While 58% of criminally sentenced males were released with some type of criminal justice supervision (parole and/or probation) during this quarter compared to 53% three quarters back, there was much more fluctuation across all supervision types
- **Civil commitment** admissions averaged 192 per month while releases averaged 193 reflecting an overall cumulative decrease of 10 civil commitments over the last year
- **Pre-trial detainee** admissions averaged 382 per month while releases averaged 373 resulting in an overall cumulative increase of 103 pre-trial detainees over the last year
 - **Female pre-trial detainees** comprise the majority (64%) of pre-trial admissions, coming primarily from Essex (28%), Worcester (23%), Middlesex (21%), Norfolk (15%) and Plymouth (11%) counties
 - **Male pre-trial detainees**, representing 36% of pre-trial admissions, come primarily from Suffolk (57%) and Middlesex (28%) counties
 - Over the last year, 2,954 female pre-trial detainees were admitted and 2,881 released; 1,627 male pre-trial detainees were admitted and 1,597 were released


Section 1. Overview of MA DOC Populations, Admissions and Releases

1.1 Total MA DOC Custody¹ and Jurisdiction² Population



The average quarterly jurisdiction and custody populations in the Massachusetts Department of Correction rose in the first quarter of 2012, by 102, and 119 inmates respectively from fourth quarter 2011. During the trend period, both the jurisdiction and custody populations increased in number by 1%, with the jurisdiction population ranging from 11,739 inmates in the second quarter of 2011 to 11,856 in the first quarter 2012.

1.2 Snapshot Totals for MA DOC Jurisdiction Population by Commitment Type




Snapshot data shows fluctuation amongst all types of commitments over the trend period. Civil commitments ranged from 617 to 668; the criminally sentenced population ranged from 10,469 to 10,622; the pre-trial detainee population ranged from 597 to 674.



1.3 MA DOC Total Admissions and Releases by Month




During the trend period, April 2011 to March 2012, total admissions to the MA DOC outpaced releases resulting in a cumulative increase of 285 inmates. Admissions ranged from a low of 730 to a high of 997, and averaged 865 admissions per month during the trend period. Releases ranged from a low of 722 to a high of 933, and averaged 842 releases per month. In the fourth quarter of 2011, releases outpaced admissions by 122, while in the first quarter of 2012 admissions outpaced releases by a difference of 212 admissions.

1.4 MA DOC Total Admissions




Based on the monthly average, 44% of admissions were pre-trial detainees, 34% were criminally sentenced, and 22% were civil commitments.

1.5 MA DOC Total Releases



According to the monthly average, 44% of releases were pre-trial detainees, 33% were criminally sentenced inmates, and 23% were civil commitments.

1.6 MA DOC Criminally Sentenced Admissions and Releases by Month




During the trend period, criminal admissions average 292 per month while releases average 276 per month. In the first quarter of 2012, criminally sentenced admissions outpaced releases by an additional 159 inmates.



Admission Type by Month**




Criminally sentenced admissions to MA DOC are driven by new court commitments. New court commitment admissions fluctuate from 170 to 316 with an average of 245 over the trend period. The monthly average for parole violations is 26, a transfer from other jurisdictions is 15, probation violators and re-admit from court release is 3. Grouped into quarters below, admissions show a steady decline in new court commitments in the second half of 2011, but increasing again in first quarter 2012.

Female criminally sentenced admissions spiked in June with 103 admissions and hit a low the next month with only 64 admissions. New court commitments comprised 85% of female admissions over this trend period, followed by transfer from other jurisdiction (6%), and parole violation/detainer (5%).



Male criminally sentenced admissions fluctuated with a low of 146 in July and a high of 264 in March. New court commitments comprised 84% of male admissions over this trend, followed by 10% parole violation/detainer, and 5% transfer from other jurisdiction.




3.1 MA DOC Criminally Sentenced Releases by Type and Month

Criminally Sentenced Jurisdiction Releases from Massachusetts DOC: Release Type by Month



Fifty-five percent of criminally sentenced releases are due to an expiration of sentence, followed by 17% parole-expiration of sentence to other, 13% parole to street, and 10% non-DOC release to other jurisdiction. September had the greatest number of releases at 306 while the low was in October with 243. The quarterly release totals show a steady decline in releases from the third quarter on 2011 to the first quarter in 2012.



During the trend period, criminally sentenced females averaged 85 releases per month. Majority of female releases were due to an expiration of sentence (53%), followed by 20% released to another jurisdiction, 13% released parole-expiration of sentence to other, and 11% were paroled to the street.



3.5 MA DOC Male Criminally Sentenced Releases by Type and Month

Male Criminally Sentenced Jurisdiction Releases from MA DOC: Release Type by Month



Criminally sentenced males averaged 190 releases per month. Similar to female releases, male releases were driven by an expiration of sentence release type (53%), followed by 19% percent released to parole-expiration of sentence to other, 14% released parole to street, and 6% non-DOC release to other jurisdiction.





4.1 MA DOC Female Criminally Sentenced Admissions and Releases




It is interesting to note the gender differences over the trend period for criminally sentenced admissions and releases; females decreased by 64 inmates while males increased by 257.

4.2 MA DOC Male Criminally Sentenced Admissions and Releases





5.1 MA DOC Parole Admissions and Parole Releases to the Street by Month



Parole releases outpaced parole admissions for majority of the trend period, with a monthly average of 12 more parole releases per month compared to admissions, resulting in a cumulative decrease of 140 inmates. It is important to note that parole releases include inmates with prior violations as well as inmates being released for the first time off of their current sentence.



6.3 MA DOC Female Criminally Sentenced Releases to the Street by Supervision Status

Criminally sentenced females are primarily released to the street due to an expiration of sentence; only 17% were paroled to the street.

Forty-nine percent of female releases to the street are supervised upon release with either parole, probation or both.


Female Criminally Sentenced Releases to Street from MA DOC by Supervision Status April 2011-March 2012



6.4 MA DOC Female Criminally Sentenced Releases to the Street by Supervision Status and Quarter

The percentage of female releases to the street with no supervision was drastically lower in the first quarter of 2012 with only 39% having no supervision, and 61% having supervision upon release.



Male Criminally Sentenced Releases to the Street from MA DOC by Supervision Status April 2011-March 2012




6.7 MA DOC Male Criminally Sentenced Releases to the Street by Supervision Status and Quarter

Criminally sentenced males are primarily released to the street due to an expiration of sentence; only 20% were paroled to the street.


Fifty-six percent of male releases to the street are supervised upon release with either parole, probation or both (compared to 49% for females).

Similar to the female releases to the street, the percentage of male releases to the street with supervision is increasing, with only 42% releasing with no supervision in first quarter 2012, compared with 47% in the second quarter of 2011.





7.1 MA DOC Civil Admissions and Releases by Month




From second quarter 2011 through first quarter 2012, there were 2,306 civil commitment admissions and 2,316 releases. For both civil admissions and releases 89% were male with just 11% female (at MCI-Framingham).

7.2 MA DOC Civil Admissions by Quarter and Admitting Institution




7.3 MA DOC Civil Releases by Quarter and Releasing Institution



MASAC was the admitting and releasing institution for over 60 percent of the civil admissions and releases in this trend period. Throughout the trend period admissions (shown on prior page) and releases averaged 577, and 579, respectively per quarter. Also, during this trend period, releases just slightly outpaced admissions resulting in a cumulative decrease of 10 civil commitments.



8.1 MA DOC Pre-Trial Detainee Admissions and Releases



Pre-trial detainee admissions ranged from 315 to 434 per month with an average of 382. Pre-trial releases ranged from 301 to 408 per month with an average of 373. Admissions and releases over this trend period resulted in an increase of 103 pre-trial detainees.

Female pre-trial detainees come from several counties across Massachusetts, especially those counties with no or limited female beds. Ninety-eight percent of MA DOC female pre-trial trial detainee admissions over this trend period came from Essex, Worcester, Middlesex, Norfolk, and Plymouth counties. Female pre-trial detainee admissions peaked in the first quarter of 2012 with 794 admissions, and were at a low in the fourth quarter of 2011 with only 703 admissions. Female pre-trial admissions accounted for 64% of pre-trial admissions.

Ninety-one percent of MA DOC male pre-trial trial detainee admissions over this trend period came from Suffolk, Middlesex, and Worcester counties. Male pre-trial detainee admissions peaked in the third quarter of 2011 with 483 admissions, and were at a low in the fourth quarter of 2011 with only 371 admissions. Male pre-trial admissions only accounted for 36% of pre-trial admissions.



Eighty-seven percent of pre-trial detainees were released via a court release, followed by 11% transfer to other jurisdiction, and 2% release from a MA parole detainer.


8.6 MA DOC Female Pre-Trial Detainee Admissions and Releases by Quarter

Female pre-trial detainee admissions averaged 720 per quarter over the first three quarters of the trend period; the first quarter of 2012 increased to 794 pre-trial admissions. There was a cumulative increase of 73 female pre-trial detainees over the course of the trend period.



Male pre-trial detainee admissions averaged 407 admissions over the course of the trend period. Additionally, over the course of the trend period there was a cumulative increase of 30 male pre-trial detainees.

Appendix

Notes and Definitions

Note: Admission and Release data for this report was gathered in January of 2011. Numbers in this report may vary slightly from numbers in other reports due to the continuous updating of data and information in the Inmate Management System

Admissions	Inmates or detainees committed to a MA DOC facility as a “new court commitment”, “parole violator”, “transfer from other jurisdiction”, “probation violator”, “awaiting trial detainee”, a “civil commitment” or other admission through legal means.
Awaiting Trial or “Detainee”	An individual who is detained prior to trial, but not yet convicted of a crime to include male and female county detainees, male county detainees transferred to state facilities under Massachusetts General Law Chapter 276, section 52A, and federal detainees (both male and female).
Civil Commitment or “Civil”	The involuntary commitment of an individual via legal means to incarcerate an individual against their will.
Criminally Sentenced	An individual who has been found guilty of a criminal offense through legal means, and is required to be incarcerated.
Custody Population	An individual is considered to be in Massachusetts DOC custody when they are being held in a Massachusetts DOC facility.
Expiration of Sentence (Release)	An inmate is discharged from his sentence at the expiration of his term, less any statutory or earned good time. Statutory good time was eliminated for all offenses committed after June 30, 1994, due to the enactment of the “Truth in Sentencing” law. “Expiration of Sentence” releases include “Expiration to Street”, “Expiration to Out of State Sentence”, “Expiration to Federal Authority”, “Expiration to Immigration”, “GCD/EXP/REL to F&A/CC HOC Sentence”, “Expiration to Warrant”, “Expiration to From & After/CC at DOC”, and “Expiration to Civil Commitment”.
HOC	House of Correction, i.e. county jail.
Jurisdiction Population	An individual is considered to be under Massachusetts DOC jurisdiction when the Commonwealth has legal authority over the individual regardless of where the inmate is being held to include those incarcerated in Massachusetts DOC facilities as well as those housed in correctional facilities outside of the Massachusetts DOC (Massachusetts Houses of Correction, other state’s correctional facilities and the Federal Bureau of Prisons).
MA DOC	Massachusetts Department of Correction, i.e. state prison.

Parole (Releases)

Inmates released on parole are under the supervision of parole while in the community and may be re-incarcerated for violating the terms of their supervision. Unless otherwise specified, parole releases may include “Parole to Street”, “Parole to Out of State Sentence”, Parole to Federal Authority”, “Parole to Immigration”, “Parole to From & After HOC Sentence”, “Parole to Warrant”, “Parole to From & After DOC Sentence”, or “Parole to Civil Commitment”.

Probation

Probation is a court-ordered sanction placed on a person convicted of a crime. The offender is allowed to remain in the community under the strict supervision of a probation officer.

Release to Street

A release to street occurs when an inmate is released from the custody of the Massachusetts DOC by way of parole or discharge to the street. Conditions warranting a release to street include: Parole, Good Conduct Discharge (GCD), and Expiration of Sentence.

Releases

A release occurs when an inmate is released from the custody of the Massachusetts DOC by way of expiration of sentence, parole, a non-DOC release to other jurisdiction, a court release or other legal release from the custody of MA DOC.
