JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE.

Thursday, November 12, 2009.

Met according to adjournment, at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Papers from the Senate.

Senate bills

Prohibiting the sale of lottery tickets on credit (Senate, No. 157) (on a petition); and

Further regulating public charities (Senate, No. 2117, amended by inserting before the enacting clause the following emergency preamble:

“Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to update forthwith the public charities laws, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.”) (on House, No. 325);

Severally passed to be engrossed by the Senate were read; and they were referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

Reports of Committees.

By Mr. Murphy of Burlington, for the committee on Ways and Means, that the Senate Bill preserving publicly-assisted affordable housing (Senate, No. 2190, amended) ought to pass with an amendment striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text contained in House document numbered 4335. Referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Mr. Kafka of Stoughton, for said committee, then reported recommending that the matter be scheduled for consideration by the House, with the amendment pending.

Under suspension of Rule 7A, on motion of the same member the bill was read a second time forthwith.

The amendment recommended by the committee on Ways and Means was adopted; and the bill, as amended, was ordered to a third reading.

Subsequently under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Honan of Boston, the bill (having been reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) was read a third time; and it was passed to be engrossed, in concurrence. Sent to the Senate for concurrence in the amendment.

Emergency Measure.

The engrossed Bill relative to clean energy (see House, No. 4253, amended), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

Clean energy.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 4 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Orders of the Day.

The House Bill authorizing the city of Melrose to establish traffic safety zones (House, No. 4055), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was read a third time; and it was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.
