Met according to adjournment, at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Petrolati of Ludlow in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Resolutions.

The following resolutions (filed with the Clerk) were referred, under Rule 85, to the committee on Rules:

Resolutions (filed by Mr. Finegold of Andover) extending the Commonwealth of Massachusetts' greetings and congratulations to the Iranian-American community of the occasion of Nowruz. Nowruz.

Resolutions (filed by Mr. Galvin of Canton) congratulating Joseph W. Williams of Old Colony Council Boy Scout Troop 77 of Canton on earning the Eagle Scout Award; and Joseph W. Williams.

Resolutions (filed by Mr. Pignatelli of Lenox) recognizing the Berkshire Community Radio Alliance; Berkshire Community Radio.

Mr. Binienda of Worcester, for said committee, reported that the resolutions ought to be adopted. Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Ms. Wolf of Cambridge (Mr. Donato of Medford being in the Chair), the resolutions (reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) were considered forthwith; and they were adopted.

Report of a Committee.

By Mr. Kafka of Stoughton, for the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling, that the Senate Bill to provide the voters of the town of Randolph a choice of charters for the new form of government (Senate, No. 14) be scheduled for consideration by the House. Randolph, town government.

Under suspension of Rule 7A, on motion of Mr. Spellane of Worcester, the bill was read a second time forthwith.

Pending the question on ordering the bill to a third reading, Mr. Timilty of Milton and other members moved to amend it by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text contained in House document numbered 3414.

The amendment was adopted; and the bill, as amended, was ordered to a third reading.

Subsequently, under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Ayers of Quincy, the bill (having been reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) was read a third time; and it was passed to be engrossed, in concurrence. The bill (Senate, No. 14, amended) then was sent to the Senate for concurrence in the amendment.

Recesses.

At twelve minutes before twelve o'clock noon, on motion of Mr. Kafka of Stoughton (Mr. Donato of Medford being in the Chair), the House recess until the hour of two o'clock P.M.; and at seven minutes after two o'clock, the House was called to order with Mr. Donato in the Chair. Recesses.

The House thereupon, on motion of Mr. Ayers of Quincy, took a further recess, subject to the call of the Chair; and at five minutes before three o'clock P.M. the House was called to order with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair.
