

JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE.

Monday, March 24, 2008.

Met according to adjournment, at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. O'Flaherty of Chelsea in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Prayer was offered by the Reverend Robert F. Quinn, C.S.P., Chaplain of the House, as follows:

Papers from the Senate.

Antique barometers.

A Bill further regulating the sale and distribution of certain antiques containing mercury (Senate, No. 2555) (on Senate No. 2293), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

Volunteer dentistry. Brockton, building commissioner.

Regulating volunteer dentistry (Senate, No. 1323) (on a petition); Relative to the certification of the inspector of buildings and building commissioner in the city of Brockton (Senate, No. 2458) (on a petition) [Local Approval Received]; and

Holyoke utilities, authority.

Restricting the authority of the Holyoke Power & Electric Company and the Holyoke Water Power Company (Senate, No. 2554) (on Senate bill No. 2315);

Severally passed to be engrossed by the Senate, were read; and they were referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Orange, flooding.

A report of the committee on Transportation, asking to be discharged from further consideration of the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 2033) of Stephen M. Brewer and Christopher J. Donelan for legislation relative to flooding in the town of Orange, and recommending that the same be referred to the Senate committee on Ways and Means,— accepted by the Senate, was consid-

ered forthwith, under Rule 42; and it was accepted, in concurrence, insomuch as relates to the discharge of the committee.

Domestic abuse program.

By the same member, for the same committee, on a joint petition, a Bill providing for the public disclosure of quality indicators for the developmentally disabled (House, No. 869).

By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill clarifying the investigative powers of the Disabled Persons Protection Commission (House, No. 2212).

Disabled Persons Protection Commission.

By Mr. Smizik of Brookline, for the committee on Environment, Natural Resources and Agriculture, on a petition, a Bill to regulate coal ash (House, No. 758).

Coal ash.

By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill to reinstate the clean environment fund (House, No. 792).

Clean environment fund.

By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill amending the conservation restrictions and agricultural preservation statutes (House, No. 798).

Conservation restrictions.

Campgrounds, protect. By the same member, for the same committee, on Senate, No. 511 and House, No. 816, a Bill to protect and preserve family camping in Massachusetts (House, No. 816).

Rights of way. By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill relative to the operating and management of rights of way (House, No. 886).

Spectacle Island. By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill relative to Spectacle Island (House, No. 887).

Boating regulations. By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill relative to certain environmental boating regulations and penalties (House, No. 3831).

Vital records. By Mr. Koutoujian of Waltham, for the committee on Public Health, on a petition, a Bill to establish an electronic system of vital records (House, No. 2054).

ri By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill relative to vital records (House, No. 2138).

ri By the same member, for the same committee, on Senate, No. 1229 and House, Nos. 2055, 2154, 2189, 2190, 2201, 2213, 2218, 2224, 2248 and 2253, a Bill relating to the security of the vital records and verification of identity (House, No. 2218).

Corrections Department, retirement. By Mr. Kaufman of Lexington, for the committee on Public Service, on a petition, a Bill to amend retirement benefits for certain employees of the Department of Corrections (House, No. 2765).

Cultural Facilities Fund. By Mr. Turkington of Falmouth, for the committee on Tourism, Arts and Cultural Development, on a petition, a Bill enhancing the Cultural Facilities Fund (House, No. 3406).

Artist enter-prise zones. By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill establishing artist enterprise zones (House, No. 3418).

Veterans, businesses. By Mr. Verga of Gloucester, for the committee on Veterans and Federal Affairs, on a petition, a Bill relative to veteran-owned small business (House, No. 3726).

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

Controlled substances. By Mr. Koutoujian of Waltham, for the committee on Public Health, on a petition, a Bill relative to controlled substances (House, No. 4434).

Deceased persons, cremation. By the same member, for the same committee, on House, No. 4252, a Bill relative to the cremation of bodies of certain deceased persons (House, No. 4927).

Regional retirement system. By Mr. Kaufman of Lexington, for the committee on Public Service, on a petition, a Bill relative to allowance increases for retired members of regional retirement systems (House, No. 2461).

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Engrossed Bill.

Bill enacted. The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Donna L. Monfredo, an employee of the Department of Correction (see House, No. 4571) (which originated in the House), in respect to which the Senate had concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.
