

## JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE.

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Tuesday, April 1, 2008.

Met according to adjournment, at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Prayer was offered by the Reverend Robert F. Quinn, C.S.P., Chaplain of the House, as follows:

Gracious God, we pray for Your gift of wisdom and for the skills to address correctly the issues which come before us. Your assistance and guidance enables us to analyze accurately each day's legislative proposals and to keep all legislative items and their consequences in clear focus. In these changing and uneasy times, grant us the ability to cope with the demands which are made upon our time, energy and patience. In Your goodness, help us to make our communities safe and stable and to build confidence in our traditional institutions and values, both human and spiritual.

### *Petitions.*

Mr. Stanley of Waltham (by request) presented a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4636) of Thomas M. Stanley (with the approval of the mayor and city council) for legislation to authorize the city of Waltham to lease a certain parcel of land for the construction of a golf course; and the same was referred to the committee on Municipalities and Regional Government. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

By Mr. Cabral of New Bedford and Senator Montigny, joint petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Antonio F. D. Cabral and others for legislation to regulate the release and parole of sex offenders and increasing the penalties for certain violations by such sex offenders.

National guard, headstones.

By Mr. Miceli of Wilmington, petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of James R. Miceli that the Commissioner of Veterans' Services be authorized to provide headstones for certain deceased members of the National Guard.

Wilmington, A & S Towing, Inc.
