Relative to Gold Star license plates (Senate, No. 2352, amended by adding the following section:—

“SECTION 3. Said section 2 of said chapter 90, as so appearing, is hereby further amended by adding the following paragraph:—

The registrar shall develop guidelines for and shall implement a license plate retention program for members of the United States military and Department of Defense employees who are deployed to, or present in, a theater of combat operations. Under the program, any Massachusetts resident who is serving in the United States military, the United States military reserves, the Massachusetts National Guard or is working as a civilian employee of the United States Department of Defense or 1 of its agencies and is deployed to, or present in, a theater of combat operations, shall have the option of retaining one or more of his motor vehicle license plates, at no charge, for the duration of his deployment. The registrar shall develop and make available an appropriate form or forms which may be used by a qualifying individual to cancel his automobile insurance and suspend his vehicle's registration, taking effect prior to deployment and upon the sale or storage of his motor vehicle. Upon returning from his deployment, the vehicle's owner shall furnish the registry with proof that his automobile insurance policy has been reinstated, and the registry may then allow him to register and affix his plates to a new vehicle or to re-register the plates and re-affix them to an existing vehicle held in storage.”) (on Senate, No. 2104);
