*Resolutions.*

The following resolutions (filed with the Clerk) were referred, under Rule 85, to the committee on Rules:

Resolutions (filed by Mr. Hill of Ipswich) honoring amateur radio operators as they celebrate Amateur Radio Week and participate in Field Day; Amateur Radio Week.

Resolutions (filed by Mr. Pignatelli of Lenox) celebrating the one hundredth anniversary of St. Ann Parish in Lenox; and Lenox,— St. Ann Parish.

Resolutions (filed by Mr. Vieira of Falmouth) congratulating the Oysterville Yacht Club in the town of Osterville on all of the member's charitable contributions to the fight against cancer; Oysterville Yacht Club.

*Special Report.*

A special report of the Department of Public Health (under the provisions of sections 5, 20 and 21 of Chapter 111 of the General Laws) relative to an inspection of the Bristol County Jail—Ash Street Facility in the town of Dartmouth, was placed on file. Bristol County Jail,— Public Health report.

*Papers from the Senate.*

The House Bill authorizing the town of Sturbridge to convey a certain parcel of land (House, No. 574), came from the Senate passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with an amendment, striking out section 2 and inserting in place thereof the following section: Sturbridge,— land conveyance.

"SECTION 2. In consideration for the conveyance authorized in section 1, the grantees shall convey to the board of selectmen of the town of Sturbridge for completion of the Burgess Elementary School project a square-shaped parcel of land, containing approximately 11,157 square feet, lying to the north of the grantees' property at 408 Main street near the southwest corner of land of the town of Sturbridge. The parcel to be conveyed to the board of selectmen by the grantees is shown on the sketch described in section 1 and is a portion of the parcel of land identified in the assessors' office in the town of Sturbridge as parcel number 415-02446-408. conveyance authorized in section 1 shall include such other terms and conditions as the board of selectmen deems appropriate.”

Under suspension of Rule 35, on motion of Mr. Smola of Palmer, the amendment (reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) was considered forthwith; and it was adopted, in concurrence.

Designating the Barre Falls Wildlife Management Area as the Stephen Drawbridge Wildlife Management Area (Senate, No. 326) (on a petition); and

Establishing a sick leave bank for Louise D’Orsi, an employee of the Department of Transportation (Senate, No. 1933, amended in lines 4 to 6, inclusive, by striking out the sentence contained therein and inserting in place thereof the following sentence: “Whenever Louise D’Orsi terminates employment with the Massachusetts Department of Transportation or requests to dissolve the sick leave bank, any remaining time in the sick leave bank shall be transferred to the extended illness paid leave bank.”; in line 7 by striking out the word “may” and inserting in place thereof the word “shall”; and by striking out the emergency preamble and inserting in place thereof the following emergency preamble:

“Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to establish forthwith a sick leave bank for a certain employee of the Massachusetts Department of Transportation, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.”) (on a petition);

Severally passed to be engrossed by the Senate, were read; and they were referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.
