Forensic and

A Bill providing access to forensic and scientific analysis (Senate, No. 1987, amended in lines 66 to 70, inclusive, by striking out the paragraph contained in those lines and inserting in place thereof the following paragraph:

“(iv) the moving party’s attorney in the underlying case was aware at the time of the conviction of the existence of the evidence or biological material, the results of the requested analysis were admissible as evidence in courts of the commonwealth, a reasonably effective attorney would have sought the analysis and either the moving party’s attorney failed to seek the analysis or the judge denied the request; or”, in lines 90 to 94, inclusive, by striking out the paragraph contained in those lines and inserting in place thereof the following paragraph:

“(e) The court shall expeditiously review all motions filed and shall dismiss, without prejudice, any such motion without a hearing if the court determines, based on the information contained in the motion, that the motion does not meet the requirements set forth in this section. The prosecuting attorney may provide a response to the motion, to assist the court in considering whether the motion meets the requirement under this section. The court shall notify the moving party and

the prosecuting attorney as to whether the motion is sufficient to proceed under this chapter or is dismissed.”, in line 168 by striking out the words “endeavor to”, and in lines 191 and 192 by striking out the words “by the moving party as an extra fee or cost in an amount the court deems equitable” and inserting in place the words “by the moving party to the maximum feasible amount possible given the financial resources of the moving party as the court deems equitable”) (on Senate bill No. 753), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

The House Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Arcelia Williams-Sullivan, an employee of the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission (House, No. 3588) (its title having been changed by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading), reported by said committee to be correctly drawn, was read a third time.

Pending the question on passing the bill to be engrossed, Mr. Pedone of Worcester moved to amend it by inserting before the enacting clause the following emergency preamble:

“Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to establish forthwith a sick leave bank for a certain employee of the Massachusetts rehabilitation commission, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.”

The amendment was adopted; and the bill (House, No. 3588, amended) was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.
