Message from the Governor.

Papers from the Senate.

The House Bill authorizing the board of selectmen of the town of Tisbury to grant licenses for the sale of wines and malt beverages to be drunk on the premises of certain restaurants, inns and hotels (House, No. 1907) (its title having been changed by the Senate committee on Bills in the Third Reading) came from the Senate passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with an amendment in section 1, in lines 5 to 9, inclusive, by striking out the following "petition the General Court to allow the town of Tisbury to issues licenses without quota and for a season or annual term as the selectman may determine for the sale of beer and wine to patrons of restaurants, including restaurants within inns and hotels with a seating capacity of not less than 30 persons, to be consumed with meals only, and only to patrons who are seated at a dining table" and inserting in place thereof the following: "grant 19 licenses for the sale of wines and malt beverages to be drunk on the premises to restaurants, including restaurants within inns and hotels with seating capacities Tisbury,—liquor license.

Emergency Measures.

Quarterly tax bills. The engrossed Bill extending the deadline for mailing quarterly tax bills (see Senate, No. 2226), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 14 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Bill enacted. Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the House) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Polish American Day. The engrossed Bill designating Polish American Congress Day (see House, No. 3035, changed), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 14 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Bill enacted. Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the House) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Lori and Eric Polson,—sick leave banks. The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave banks for Lori Polson and Eric Polson, employees of the Department of Correction (see House, No. 4273, amended), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 11 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Bill enacted. Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the House) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Engrossed Bills.

Bill enacted. The engrossed Bill validating the acts, votes and proceedings of the 2009 spring annual town meeting and the 2009 spring special town meeting of the town of Westminster (see House bill printed in House, No. 4179) (which originated in the House), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was passed to be enacted (more than two-thirds of the members having agreed to pass the same); and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.
