INTERIM ORDER

in September 26, 1988, the Hanover School Committee (School Committee) filed ion with the Labor Relations Commission (Commission) pursuant to Section if G.L. c.150E (the Law). The School Committee alleged that teachers reputed by the Hanover Teachers Association, affiliated with the Massachusetts shasociation and National Education Association (herein HTA) have been I in a strike, slowdown or work stoppage since on or about Monday, Septem-1988, and that the officers and a certain agent of the HTA have induced, iged and condoned the strike.²

The Commission scheduled an investigation to commence at 2:30 p.m. on her 26, 1988, and issued a Notice of Investigation to the parties.3

Attorney Clerke initially entered an appearance on behalf of the Massachu-leachers Association (MTA) and its agents, John P. Reilly and Gerald Dlouhy, r individual and agency capacities. We dismissed the petition with respect old Dlouhy at the commencement of the investigation. See footnote 3, When the petitioner later withdrew without prejudice its petition against and its agents, see footnote 2, infra, Attorney Clarke continued to specially on behalf of Mr. Reilly, who remained a named respondent in his i capacity as an agent of the HTA.

The investigation began at approximately 2:30 p.m. and on the basis of the westigation, we hereby make the following findings of fact.

FACTS

The HTA represents a bargaining unit of 162 teachers employed by the School mmittee.

The most recent collective bargaining agreement between the School Committee id the HTA was effective from July 1, 1985 through June 30, 1988. The parties we been bargaining for a successor agreement since November 1987. Since the immencement of negotiations, the parties have held twelve negotiation sessions which the last seven have been conducted under the direction of the Massachutts Board of Conciliation and Arbitration. The last session was held on Septimber 25, 1988, without the conclusion of an agreement. No further negotiation issions have been scheduled.

There are five schools in Hanover serving approximately 2200 pupils. The sporting time for teachers at the Sylvester and Center elementary schools is 50 a.m.; at the Cedar elementary school it is 8:15 a.m.; at the high school it; 7:05 a.m.; and at the junior high school it is 7:30 a.m.

On September 16, 1988, Melanie Drozdowski, President of the HTA, informed ne Attorney for the School Committee, Paul J. Kingston, that teachers represented the HTA had voted unanimously to go, and would go, on strike Monday, September 1, 1988.

On September 19, 1988, of the 162 teachers who were scheduled to report to ork, only two did report to work. The remaining teachers including the abovemed HTA officers were absent without excuse. On September 20, 1988, all teachers are absent without excuse. On September 21, 1988, all teachers were absent without excuse. On September 22, 1988, all teachers were absent without excuse. [.] The School Committee served the Notice of investigation upon the individual espondents and upon the HTA. The School Committee failed to provide an affidavit f service of the Notice upon Gerald Dlouhy, therefore we dismissed the petition ith respect to Mr. Dlouhy at the commencement of the investigation. The remaining individual respondents, Melanie Drozdowski, Robert Barra, Ralph Mills, Wilma anders and John Reilly challenged the sufficiency of the service on the grounds nat the affidavits of service did not state the place of service or indicate how (continued)



The School Committee's petition initially also alleged that teachers repsented by the Massachusetts Teachers Association (MTA) have been engaged in a trike, slowdown or work stoppage since September 19, 1988 and that certain jents of the MTA have induced, encouraged and condoned the strike. The School mmittee withdrew without prejudice its allegations against the MTA and its jents during the investigation.

Mr. Reilly is not a public employee. He all the negotiations for the HTA at the bargaining table for the past twenty, and represents the HTA in its current negotiations. He has filed produced with the School Committee on behalf of the HTA.

DISCUSSION

Based upon the facts above, we conclude that the teachers represented by. IA have been engaged in a strike beginning on September 19, 1988, and connig to date.

The Commission can infer the existence of a strike from, inter alia, the sence without excuse or authorization of virtually 100% of the teachers regularly scheduled to report to work in the context of a dispute over the terms of successor collective bargaining agreement and the fact that employees carried cate signs outside of schools during working hours on September 19, 20, 21 and 1, 1988. See e.g., Everett School Committee, 14 MLC 1284 (1987); Tewksbury thool Committee, 12 MLC 1353, 1359 (1985).

We further note that all the named officers of the HTA were among the machers who did not report for work on September 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, and 26, 188. We have found that HTA President Drozdowski informed the School Committee more that a strike vote had been taken on September 16, 1988, and that throughest the dates of the picketing, the named officers of the HTA picketed schools using working hours. We infer from these facts that the HTA was both aware of ind involved in the concerted withholding of services by the employees. Taken spether, we find these facts are sufficient to conclude that the HTA induced, scouraged and condoned the strike in violation of the Law. See Northeast stropolitan Regional Vocational School Committee, 13 MLC 1213, 1216 (1986).

CONCLUS 10N

WHEREFORE, on the basis of the facts set forth above, we conclude that the pllowing have induced, encouraged and condoned a strike, work stoppage, slowdown, withholding of services in violation of Section 9A(a) of G.L. c.150E by acchers represented by the Hanover Teachers Association (HTA): MELANIE ROZDOWSKI, Individually and as President of the HTA; ROBERT BARRA, Individually id as Vice-President of the HTA; RALPH MILLER, Individually and as Treasurer of HTA; WILMA SANDERS, Individually and as Secretary of the HTA; JOHN P. REILLY, agent of the HTA⁴; and the HANOVER TEACHERS ASSOCIATION. We further conclude nat the above-listed officers of the HTA in both their individual and representive capacities, the HTA, and the employees whom it represents, are engaged in strike, work stoppage, slowdown or withholding of services in violation of ection 9A(a) of G.L. c.150E.

Accordingly, by virtue of the power vested in the Commission by Section 4(b) of the Law, we hereby issue the following ORDER:

 The Hanover Teachers Association, affiliated with the Massachusetts Teachers Association, and the National Education Association, its

officers and agents, Mealnie Drozdowski, Robert Barra, Ralph Miller, Wilma Sanders and John P. Reilly, and the employees whom it represents shall immediately cease and desist from engaging in any strike, work stoppage, slowdown or other withholding of services.

- 2. The Hanover Teachers Association, affiliated with the Massachusetts Teachers Association and National Education Association, its officers, agents and members, shall Immediately cease and desist from encouraging, condoning or inducing any strike, work stoppage, slowdown or other withholding of services. The Hanover Teachers Association, affiliated with the Massachusetts Teachers Association and National Education Association, shall take necessary steps to prohibit its officers or agents from engaging in conduct to encourage, condone or induce the unlawful strike, work stoppage, slowdown or other withholding of services which the Commission has found to have been occurring in this case.
- 3. The Hanover Teachers Association, affiliated with the Massachusetts Teachers Association, and National Education Association, and its officers and agents, shall take necessary action before the start of the next regularly scheduled school day to inform its members of the provisions of Section 9A(a) of the Law and of the contents of this Interim Order.
- 4. The School Committee and the Hanover Teachers Association, affiliated with the Massachusetts Teachers Association and National Education Association, shall continue to bargain in good faith; and further, shall participate in mediation as may be directed by the Board of Conciliation and Arbitration.
- 5. The Hanover Teachers Association, affiliated with the Massachusetts Teachers Association and National Education Association, and the School Committee, shall notify the Commission at 9:30 a.m. by telephone or by reporting to the Commission in person on September 28, 1988, of the steps taken to comply with this Interim Order.
- The Commission retains jurisdiction of this matter to set further requirements as may be appropriate.
