To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:—

By the 15th chapter of the General Statutes, it is provided, that "on or before the fifteenth day of January of each year, the Auditor shall submit to the legislature a report, exhibiting a full and accurate statement of the financial condition of the Commonwealth, and of the pecuniary transactions thereof, during the year ending on the last day of the preceding month; and also, that "he shall include in his report an estimate for the following year, of the ordinary income of the Commonwealth, and other means which he may point out for defraying of expenditures, and shall annex thereto such representations or suggestions as he may deem necessary." And it is also provided by chapter 158 of the Acts of 1858, sections 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9, which sections of said Act are now in force, as follows:

SECTION 2. The annual report of the auditor shall contain a summary statement of the receipts into and payments from, the treasury of the Commonwealth in each year: said report shall also contain a detailed and particular statement of the receipts and expenditures belonging to each year; and for the purposes of this statement the account of receipts shall include all the revenue properly accruing or provided by law during the year, whether any part thereof be unpaid at the end of the year or not: *provided*, that the amount of revenue thus unpaid shall be distinguished in the account. In like manner, the account of expenditures in the detailed statement, shall include, first, the total expense incurred during the year, for the support of all permanent departments, services and institutions; and second, all exceptional and special charges, incurred for objects ordered within the year, the account being constructed in such manner as to show the total expenditure actually incurred within

year, whether the same has been paid during the year, or whether whole or a part thereof, remain unpaid at the close of the year: *provided*, that the amounts paid and unpaid, shall be properly distinguished. The variations between said summary account and said detailed account, shall be indicated and explained by proper notes and references.

SECTION 4. The auditor's report, in each year, shall show the aggregate amount of funded debt at the beginning and end of the year respectively, the balance of increase or decrease, and a statement of the cause of such balance; and in like manner, shall show the aggregate amount of the temporary loan, at the beginning and end of the year, the balance of increase or decrease, and a statement of the cause of such balance. The report shall likewise state whether the ordinary expenses of the year have exceeded the income, or the contrary, and show the amount of the balance, with an explanation of the means by which any deficit may have been met, or of the purposes to which any surplus may have been applied.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the auditor to include in his report, the items of all accounts of expenditure, so far as they may be useful or interesting to the people of the Commonwealth; and in particular, so far as may be practicable, the various heads of expenditure shall be separated, so as to show the different officers or boards, under these directions the several portions of the expenditure have been incurred; all salaries and other general charges shall likewise be separated, so as to show the different classes of officers who received the several portions of the expenditure; and no expenditure exceeding five hundred dollars, shall be included under any indefinite head, if it be composed of separate items.

SECTION 6. The auditor's report shall annually, contain a particular statement of the manner in which the moiety of the income of the school fund, applicable to educational purposes, has been disbursed.

SECTION 7. The auditor's report shall hereafter state the amount paid to each county, in reimbursement of the costs of criminal prosecutions, in such manner as to show the whole amount charged, the amount credited for fines and forfeitures, and the balance; also, the amount of commissions allowed on such payments, to the treasurer of each county.

SECTION 8. The auditor's report shall hereafter describe the new investments of any portion of the funds belonging to the Commonwealth, which may have been made during the year.

SECTION 9. In estimating the value of the shares of Western Railroad stock belonging to the Commonwealth, the treasurer and auditor shall not assign a separate numerical value to the rights in the loan

sinking fund; and all railroad shares or other securities, shall be reckoned at their market value at the time of making the report.

In compliance with the foregoing provisions, I have the honor to submit the following Report, embracing, so far as is practicable, the details required. The total amount of the resources of the Commonwealth, on the first day of January, 1861, was \$13,302,028.52; the liabilities at the same time were \$7,175,977.94.

The total amount received into the treasury during the year was \$3,348,712.48—total amount paid therefrom during the year was \$3,334,209.80. The expenses of the Commonwealth, for the year 1860, were \$1,091,086.13; the revenue, \$1,017,206.64; being less than the expenses, \$73,879.49.

The expenses of the last quarter of the year being mainly unpaid on the 31st day of December, the actual indebtedness of the Commonwealth on the first day of January was some three hundred thousand dollars more than appears upon the books of the treasurer. The precise amount will be seen in the difference between the "*payments* from the ordinary revenue of expenses of 1860," and the actual expenses of the year as given in another table. It is not possible to comply fully with the requisitions of the statutes above referred to, in relation to the pecuniary transactions of the Commonwealth for the entire year, inasmuch as the details thereof are not rendered in full, at this office, by many of its public officers, until after the close of the year. The adjutant-general is allowed by law the entire month of January to lay before the Auditor the expenses of his department, and no public officer is required to render the details of his expenditures earlier than the first week in January, only as he may desire to draw money from the treasury of the Commonwealth. It might, however, be practicable, if, as prior to 1858, the payments from the treasury were recognized as the expenses of the year; but the details of expenses were not then given, and had not been except in a single instance, for the year 1852, and then in compliance with a special Act of the legislature of the following year, 1853. Of course, under the system then in practice, all expenses accruing for salaries of public officers, and of whatever nature, if not actually paid from the treasury before the close of the last day of the year, were excluded from the report.

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But the system established in 1858, and evidently intended to be continued by the provisions of the General Statutes, makes it the duty of the Auditor to give the details of expenses incurred during the year from the first day of January to the last day of December. To perform this service it must be evident to any reasonable person, that considerable time must be required in the month of January to procure from the public officers the necessary particulars. And then there will be many items of expenditure, often of large amounts, that will not be received within the required time, and others may not be fully adjusted, so that any tables which may be given must necessarily be more or less inaccurate. There are a few belonging to 1860 not yet adjusted satisfactorily to the claimants, and in some instances appeals may be made to the legislature for redress.

William White, Esq., has a claim of about \$4,000, which I have not felt authorized to allow, for the stereotype plates used in the publication of the General Statutes. It is not, by any means, clear to me that the statutes of 1859, under which the contract was made with him for publishing the General Statutes, contemplates that any consideration should be allowed for the plates other than that granted in the privilege of furnishing the statutes to the people of the Commonwealth at the price specified. But that the ownership of the plates is vested in the Commonwealth as a guarantee that the contract should be faithfully performed,—they could certainly be of value only as security for the fulfilment of the same. I am happy, however, here to bear testimony that Mr. White has, in my opinion, performed his duty to the State as public printer with great faithfulness, and I consider his claim, whether strictly due or not, according to the contract, deserving of consideration.

Some slight modification of the laws in relation to certain expenditures would relieve the Auditor from many embarrassing questions. The General Statutes, ch. 15, sect. 38, provide that the term "*incidental expenses*" shall include, when used in any appropriation, the expenses of postage, printing, and stationery, and ch. 52, sect. 2, of the Acts of 1860, provides that the term "*incidental expenses*," whenever used in any Act of appropriation heretofore, or which may hereafter be passed, shall be held to include no charges except for postage, printing, stationery, and fuel. But in making appropriations the terms

"incidental expenses," "contingent expenses," and "expenses," are used indiscriminately. Are they intended to be used as synonymous? This should be made plain.

The policy of the legislature, particularly at the last session, was apparently against allowing any charges for newspaper. In some departments of the government such charges are presented for allowance. Some action of the legislature defining more particularly the proper construction to be put upon these terms would set that matter at rest.

Chapter 15, section 48, provides that commissioners, and other public officers having jurisdiction throughout the Commonwealth, to whom travelling expenses are allowed, shall receive for each mile actually travelled not more than three and a half cents a mile each way, nor more than the amount actually expended. I was disposed to give to this provision the same construction that was allowed to the 7th section of the 221st chapter of the Acts of 1859. But in consequence of some change in the phraseology, the attorney-general has thought that the "three and a half a mile" only applied to actual travel, such as fares upon railroads, carriage hire, &c., while hotel expenses might still be paid in addition. I have, therefore, in accordance with his advice, allowed the extra charges. In addition to this, claims are made for travelling expenses by commissioners from their respective residences to their office in the city of Boston, and that too, as often as in their judgment it is necessary to travel back and forth, which if between towns on the western border, or in the extreme eastern part of the Commonwealth and the city of Boston, would constitute a large item of expense.

Some claims of this description are still pending, and may be presented to the legislature for allowance, as I have felt authorized to allow for travel only from the city of Boston, on official business. Hotel expenses incurred in the city of Boston are also, in some instances, claimed to be proper charges, but these have not been allowed. I would advise the legislature to make all questions relating to travel and incidental expenses perfectly plain.

Commissioners and other public officers of the Commonwealth are compensated more generally for their services by a stated salary, and it may perhaps be well to consider whether there

should be any exceptions among the more important of these. I would suggest whether a fixed salary in the case of Back Bay Commissioners would not be more economical to the Commonwealth than a per diem compensation. At present they are allowed five dollars per day for their services, which frequently, as appears by their records rendered in this case, are apparently very slight.

It would seem that the income of the Commonwealth, now amounting to about \$750,000, exclusive of any tax, might be amply sufficient to meet our expenditures, and were we not now controlled by the force of habit to create expenses, I am quite sure it would be. By the legislation of 1860 the treasury of the Commonwealth was relieved from the payment of criminal justice amounting in the aggregate to about \$150,000 per annum, though for the past year the amount thus saved was only about that sum, the law under which the reduction was made taking effect on the first of July.

We have many expenses that cannot be extinguished nor materially reduced. The expenses of the regular sessions of the legislature, perhaps, are of this class,—though these I think would bear some reduction. If distinct appropriations should be made for the several purposes for which the expenses are to be incurred, it would be the occasion of a more careful scrutiny of the same. The bills for stationery for House and Senate amount to about \$2,500,—of this sum about \$750 is paid for 314 reams of writing paper and \$433 for 363 pen-nibbles. If at the commencement of the session the several amounts were asked for, for those purposes, there would be some hesitation, I apprehend, in making the requisite appropriations therefor. The expenses for printing from day to day, though reduced from what they were in former years, may yet perhaps be reduced still more. It would be well for every member to make himself familiar with the expenses that are being daily incurred. The shortening of the session to a period of sixty days, with the salaries of the members reduced to correspond to the time, would make a reduction in the expenses of the session of at least \$40,000. During the last year, the introduction of the cattle disease called "pleuro-pneumonia" into this Commonwealth was the occasion of an extra session

of the legislature,—the cost of which, together with the expenses incurred in the extinguishment of the disease, was nearly \$55,000. Similar contingencies are liable to occur in the future and cannot be guarded against in advance,—but ordinary expenses may be foreseen and properly restricted in anticipation of their occurrence.

I would recommend that hereafter there should be no separate appropriation for bank note register. As there will be a necessity for the employment of two clerks in the Auditor's office, I would suggest that they each be appointed registers, and that no sum in addition to their regular salaries be allowed. But I would recommend that the salary of the first clerk in this department be made equal to the salaries of the first clerks in the offices of the secretary and treasurer. The amount of labor he must necessarily perform and the time required for his office hours justly entitle him, in my opinion, to a first class salary. It is very proper that clerks occupying similar positions, and positions equally responsible, should stand upon an equality in their compensation.

Repairs and improvements upon the State House have become an important item of expenditure. Last year some \$10,000 was so expended. I would suggest, as a guarantee that work shall be done for a reasonable consideration, that it should in all cases when practicable be open to honorable competition, and that in no case should a member of any committee of the legislature, or a member of any commission be interested, either directly or indirectly, pecuniarily, in the execution of the work. Under such a rule, I believe that a least twenty-five per cent. would ordinarily be saved in the cost of our public works. By chapter 15, section 62, the sergeant-at-arms, secretary and treasurer of the Commonwealth are constituted "a commission, without compensation, to have in charge any appropriations for the repairs, improvements and furniture of the State House and contingent expenses of the council, general court, and offices in the State House." I would suggest that until this law shall be repealed, that whatever improvements are made upon the State House or upon the grounds connected therewith, they should be placed in charge of these commissioners.

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The Commonwealth expends for charitable purposes nearly one hundred thousand dollars per annum. I would not advise any act that should mar the happiness of a single individual, nor of the recipients of the charities of the Commonwealth. The institutions through which these charities are distributed, whether or not the best that could be devised, are monuments of our kind regard for the poor. The average number of state paupers supported by the Commonwealth in the almshouses and hospitals, the last year, was 2,479. Of these 17 are insane and are inmates of our lunatic asylums. Most of them are harmless and inoffensive, and the Commonwealth pays for their support, after having furnished the necessary accommodations, two dollars and fifty cents per week. I think that one hundred dollars per annum, the amount paid therefor in the city of Boston previous to the construction of the hospital at Northampton, is all that should be paid from the treasury of the Commonwealth for each person so supported.

Each of the almshouses has connected with it a large farm. Though poorly adapted to pauper labor, they are undergoing improvements from year to year, and are constantly becoming more and more remunerative. There should still be an increased attention paid to agriculture at these institutions. At Monson, there was paid for milk alone, last year, \$3,713,—about eighty gallons per day at twelve and a half cents, or more, per gallon. Of this sum thus expended, if one thousand dollars should be applied at the beginning of the year in the judicious purchase of cows, I believe that there might be saved at least fifteen hundred dollars, if the cows should be kept in stables, and proper attention be paid to the saving of the manure, and a reasonable allowance made for the value thereof. I feel quite confident that one-third, or nearly that proportion of the expenses of these institutions might be saved, if the lands connected with them were well adapted to the labor of paupers. And even a great saving may now be made by giving to this subject proper care and attention. It is worthy the attention of the legislature.

Some suggestions in relation to the classification of paupers were submitted in my last Annual Report. I regard them now as worthy of consideration.

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I would again call the attention of the legislature to the subject of pauper burials. These are the only expenses paid to cities and towns for paupers outside the State almshouses. I do not see that any injustice can be done to any city or town by repealing this law. It is reasonable to suppose that the burden that would be thus imposed, would be nearly equally distributed among the several cities and towns of the Commonwealth.

During the year three banks were organized under the general banking law, making six in all, now in successful operation, with a capital in the aggregate amounting to \$3,700,000. They have received from this department circulating notes to the amount of \$1,013,849, of which amount there has been returned and cancelled notes to the amount of \$256,685 leaving a balance now in the hands of the banks, December 31, 1860, of \$757,164. This amount is believed to be well secured by the deposit of such stocks as the department is authorized to receive therefor. The amount on deposit December 31, 1860, from the several banks was as follows:—Revere Bank, \$213,000; Safety Fund Bank, \$200,400; Bank of Republic, \$189,500; Bank of Metropolitan, \$107,000; Mt. Vernon Bank, \$62,000; Continental Bank, \$50,000.

The currency afforded the people by these institutions must certainly be regarded as the safest and the best of any furnished by the banks of the Commonwealth.

A table will be annexed to this Report giving in detail the particulars of each bank.

The great haste in which this Report is necessarily prepared, will be my apology for many inaccuracies in the statements of the expenses for the year. Many of them have not yet been received at this department; others were received so recently as to preclude the possibility of a careful analysis and adjustment. But the amount of expenses not included in the tables or covered by estimates, cannot be large.
