To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:—

In obedience to the requirements of chapter 15 of the General Statutes, and of sections 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 of chapter 158 of the Acts of 1858, which sections are still in force, I submit to you my Report, "exhibiting a full and accurate statement of the financial condition of the Commonwealth, and the pecuniary transactions thereof" for the year 1862.

The business of the office has been largely increased, owing to the disbursements for military expenses and other matters occasioned by the war, and has made it necessary to increase the clerical force employed. One person has been employed the whole year with manifest advantage to the interests of the State, in examining the returns from the cities and towns of the Commonwealth claiming reimbursement for "aid to families of volunteers."

Another has spent his whole time in making copies of bills of military expenses, and in making up a full and detailed statement of these expenses to be rendered to the government of the United States. This increase of business has added to the incidental expenses of the office, but I am happy to be able to say that the amounts appropriated to this department have not been exceeded, either for incidental expenses or salaries of clerks.

In consulting the tables and statements in this Report, it will be necessary to bear in mind that the law requires two distinct sets of accounts to be reported, one giving the receipts and payments of the year, and the other the actual expenses prop-

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erly chargeable to each year. The payments from the treasury may vary from the expenses properly chargeable to any year, as the bills for the last quarter of the year are many of them not paid till the first part of the succeeding year. The aggregate of bills remaining unpaid varies but little in each succeeding year, so that the payments approximate very nearly to the actual expenses.

The total amount received into the treasury during the year ending December 31st, 1862, on account of ordinary revenue was \$2,949,816.71; the total amount paid therefrom on the same account was \$1,769,160.52, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$1,180,656.19. The expenses of the year 1862 already ascertained amount to \$1,716,172.88, but as the claims have not yet all been presented, the actual expenses will probably amount to \$1,750,000. If we deduct from this \$442,114.02 reimbursed to cities and towns for aid to families of volunteers, and \$180,000 interest on the loan for military expenses, it will leave \$1,127,885.98 as the ordinary expenses of the year.

MILITARY EXPENSES.

The amount of military expenses on account of the United States for the past year is \$199,982.67, and the total amount expended and charged to the general government since the commencement of the war is \$3,455,110.52. Of this sum there has been reimbursed from the United States and other sources \$1,625,188.25, leaving now due the State \$1,829,922.27.

To meet these expenditures the bonds of the State have been issued to the amount of \$3,600,000, and the payment of these bonds has been provided for by the Union Loan Sinking Fund to the amount of \$1,071,139.01. To this should be added \$700,894.13 now in the treasury, being so much of the State tax of last year as was assessed to meet the direct tax of the general government, which was settled by an offset on our general account. These two sums amount to \$1,772,033.14. If to this is added the amount now due from the United States, it will make \$3,601,955.41, which is pledged to redeem the bonds as above stated. It will thus be seen that our bonds are fully secured, and that there cannot be a shadow of doubt of the means to meet them at maturity.

AID TO FAMILIES OF VOLUNTEERS.

Returns from the cities and towns of the Commonwealth were received claiming reimbursement for aid rendered to the families of Volunteers in the year 1861, to the amount of \$175,341.28. After a careful and critical examination the sum of \$142,114.02 has been allowed, and \$33,227.26 rejected as not properly chargeable to the Commonwealth. This difference was caused partly by errors in computation, and partly from a want of a proper understanding of the law, on the part of the officers called to administer it, when it first went into operation. Subsequent experience and a better knowledge of the law have obviated many of these difficulties, and it is hoped that the returns for 1862 will be much more free from error.

The amount already returned for the past year is \$1,866,000, and when the remaining towns report it will probably increase the sum to about \$2,000,000.

This amount is large, and it is a grave question whether the has all been legitimately spent; but where so many different persons have charge of the disbursement of the State's bounty it is not possible that it should be entirely free from error.

The law as it now stand may not be perfect in all respects, but municipal officers have become accustomed to its provisions and understand the decisions of the Auditor upon the various questions that have been raised, and it may well be questioned whether it is expedient now to alter it. Every alteration raises new questions, and produces irregularities in its administration, and I would respectfully suggest the propriety of leaving it without alteration, unless strong reasons are shown for change.

REVENUE AND EXPENSES.

The estimated revenue of the Commonwealth for the year 1863, from ordinary sources, exclusive of direct taxes, as furnished in detail in statement Number IV. of this Report, amounts to \$1,162,700.

The expenses of the year I estimate as follows:—

The cash in the treasury on the first day of January, was \$1,180,656.19, but \$705,229.73 of this properly belongs to various funds. Deducting this from the former sum, it leaves \$475,426.46 available for ordinary expenses. Deducting this from the estimated expenses to be provided for, it leaves \$1,816,873.54, or for convenience, say \$1,800,000 to be provided for by a direct tax. The tax last year was \$1,800,000, and it is presumed that no one would object to a tax of the same amount when it is necessary to sustain the credit of the State.

The finances of the Commonwealth were never in a more prosperous condition. The Union Loan Sinking Fund will pay the military loan at maturity, the sums loaned to railroad corporations, with slight exceptions, are amply secured by mortgages upon the roads; bonds for other purposes are secured by sinking funds; the State does not owe a dollar of floating debt; and there is an ample working balance of cash on hand. The only exception to the above statement is the loan to the Troy and Greenfield Railroad, the interest of which is paid by the State.

The foregoing estimates of receipts and expenditures for the year, are based upon the supposition that there will be no occasion for any extraordinary expenses beyond those estimated. The country is in the midst of a gigantic struggle for its very existence. This State has done its share and will continue to do it, in this time of the nation's trial. Whatever may happen in other States, Massachusetts will do her duty, and more than her duty, to preserve the Union in all its integrity. We know not what is before us; we should be prepared for any contingency, and it is a question meriting the gravest consideration,

whether the Commonwealth, under these circumstances, should engage in any new projects involving large outlays of capital which may be needed for more pressing emergencies. Other things can wait, but "the Union, it must be preserved."

PAYMENT OF INTEREST IN COIN.

By chapter 82 of the Acts of 1862 it is provided that the interest of all scrip or bonds of the Commonwealth shall be paid in gold or silver coin. Should this law remain as it now is, there should be a small addition made to the estimate for interest on the funded debt, sufficient to pay the premium on coin. The operation of this law has been different in some respects, from what was probably intended by the legislature. The State in 1837 loaned its bonds to the Eastern Railroad Company to the amount of \$500,000, and to the Norwich and Worcester Railroad Company for \$400,000, each agreeing to pay all the expenses, and the interest as it became due. By the law the treasurer is obliged to pay this interest in coin, for which he has had to pay a large premium, while the railroad companies refuse to refund in coin, and make a tender in United States legal tender notes, which the treasurer is obliged to receive. This subject should receive the attention of the legislature, and the proper remedy be applied.

STATE ALMSHOUSES.

The amount paid for the support of paupers in the State Almshouses the past year, is \$116,729.54. From a most thorough and careful examination of these institutions, I am satisfied that they are most admirably and economically conducted. When we consider that there are on an average more than two thousand inmates, that many of these are sick and disabled in the hospitals, and need nursing and the constant attendance of a physician, that others are insane and idiotic, that all are more or less enfeebled and diseased, that they are comfortably clothed and well fed, that the children are kept in schools taught by able and experienced teachers, it seems a wonder that the total amount of salaries and expenses to the Commonwealth is less than one dollar per week for each individual inmate. These institutions are models of economy and good order, and I know of none where, for the amount

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expended, so much good is accomplished. Were the number of inmates and the annual appropriation equalized in each institution, we should have the means of making a more exact comparison of their respective expenses.

LUNATIC STATE PAUPERS.

By section 11 chapter 223 of the Acts of 1862, the State Lunatic Hospitals are allowed to charge the Commonwealth two dollars and sixty-two cents per week for the board of lunatic State paupers. The expense on this account the past year has been about \$83,000, which has been allowed to the several lunatic hospitals in the State. Many of these persons are harmless, idiotic and incurable. All they need is their food and clothing, comfortable quarters, and reasonable attention. This might be furnished at the State Almshouses, where the cost to the State is less than one dollar per week, and in this way a large sum might be saved to the treasury of the Commonwealth. Had this plan been in operation the past year, it would have made a difference in our expenses on this account of more than \$50,000, a sum more than sufficient in a single year to pay the cost of any additional accommodations that might be required. I recommend this subject to the careful consideration of the legislature.

VALUATION OF THE UNPRODUCTIVE PROPERTY OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

By Resolve chapter 87 of the year 1862, the Auditor was directed "to cause the unproductive property of the Commonwealth to be appraised at its actual value."

In compliance with this Resolve, A. R. Esty, Esq., an architect well acquainted with the cost and value of public buildings was employed, who with the Auditor visited the various institutions of the State, and made a thorough examination of the condition of the buildings and grounds. The property seems to be well preserved, and the land, especially in the case of the almshouses, has been much increased in value since the original purchases. The institutions which are built of wood begin to need some repairs, especially in the floors, but the increase in the value of the land more than compensates for any deterioration in the value of the buildings. In some cases, as at the

Lunatic Hospital at Worcester, and the State Prison at Charlestown, there has been a vast increase in the value of the land owing to the general advance in the value of property in the cities where they are located. In such cases the land may be of no more use to the State than formerly, yet as we were ordered to appraise it "at its actual value," we have put it down at what it is supposed to be worth at the present time. The property of the Reform School at Westborough, and the State Arsenal at Cambridge, we found valued at much more than its real worth, owing in the former case to the fact that no allowance has been made for the loss by fire, and in the latter to a former valuation of a large amount of military stores that have since been removed.

The total value of this kind of property belonging to the Commonwealth was last year reported at \$3,146,320.35, and by the report now made at \$3,091,270.82. A full detail will be found in "general statement" Number V., of this Report.

The case of Rainsford Island Hospital deserves a passing notice. This island was purchased by the Province of Massachusetts Bay for the sum of £730 lawful currency. The deed is dated on the seventh day of December, 1736, and conveys "the Island of Raynsford" to "Wm. Foye, Esq., Treasurer of the Province of Massachusetts Bay, with the timber, trees and stones thereon, in trust nevertheless, to and for the use of the Governor, Council and Assembly of His Majesty's Province of Massachusetts Bay, to be used and improved for an Hospital for said Province." The deed is signed by "John Loring, Sam'l Loring, Caleb Loring, Esq., Benj'n Loring, John Loring, Jr., and David Loring" with their wives respectively, all of Hull.

The island formerly contained eleven acres, one hundred and forty-five rods of land, but the present area is only about seven acres, the easterly end having been washed away by the action of the sea. By an Act approved March 17, 1841, the city of Boston was allowed the use of the island and the buildings thereon, for a quarantine establishment till such time as the Commonwealth should demand possession of the same for its own use. The city continued to use it till 1852, since which time it has been used by the Commonwealth as a hospital for

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State paupers. The title of the State to this as well as to the other property appraised is believed to be unquestionable.

BANKS.

No new banks have been established under the general law during the past year. There are seven organized in this way with a capital of \$3,900,000 and an outstanding circulation on the first of January of \$1,928,931, secured by stocks to the amount of \$2,812,850. By the law of 1862, chapter ninety-five, all the expenses incurred in the Auditor's Department pertaining to these Banks are required to be paid by them, and the amount assessed October first on account of the previous six months was \$458.95. This is believed to be sufficient to pay for the amount of labor performed in the office on their account. A particular detail of the condition of these banks will be found in tabular Statement XVIII. of this Report.

In these remarks I have not entered into the details of the expenditures of the various departments, as these will be found in the numerous tables in this Report.

The books, accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer have been examined as required by chapter fifteen of the General Statutes and are found to be correct.

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STATEMENT IX.—TREASURY RECEIPTS FOR 1862.

NOTE.—The Funded Debt of the Commonwealth has been increased during the year, by the issue of additional Six Per Cent. Scrip for the Union Fund Loan of 1861, \$782,500; by the issue of Five Per Cent. Scrip for the Union Fund Loan of 1862, \$600,000; and Five Per Cent. Scrip for the Back Bay Loan of 1862, \$168,000, amounting in all to \$1,550,500.

The sum of \$100,000 due in 1862 on the Six Per Cent. Scrip of 1856, has been advanced from the avails of the Back Bay Lands Fund set apart by law for that purpose, \$99,000 of which has been paid from the Treasury, thus leaving the net increase in the Funded Debt, \$1,450,500.
