To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

By the fifth and sixth sections of chapter fifteen of the General Statutes, it is provided that "on or before the fifteenth day of January of each year, the Auditor shall submit to the legislature a report, exhibiting a full and accurate statement of the financial condition of the Commonwealth, and of the pecuniary transactions thereof, during the year ending on the last day of the preceding month;" and also, that "he shall include in his report an estimate for the following year, of the ordinary income of the Commonwealth, and other means which he may point out for defraying of expenditures, and shall annex thereto such representations or suggestions as he may deem necessary."

In addition to these provisions of the General Statutes, regard to the duties of the Auditor, it is specially provided by the repealing act of said statutes, that sections 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of chapter 158 of the Acts of 1858 shall be continued in force. These sections are as follows:—

SECTION 2. The annual report of the auditor shall contain a summary statement of the receipts into and payments from, the treasury of the Commonwealth in each year: said report shall also contain a detailed and particular statement of the receipts and expenditures belonging to each year; and for the purposes of this statement the account of receipts shall include all the revenue properly accruing or provided by law during the year, whether any part thereof be unpaid at the end of the year or not: *provided*, that the amount of revenue thus unpaid shall

be included in the account. In like manner, the account of expenditures in the detailed statement, shall include, first, the total expense incurred during the year, for the support of all permanent departments, offices and institutions; and second, all exceptional and special charges, ordered for objects ordered within the year, the account being constructed in such manner as to show the total expenditure actually incurred within the year, whether the same has been paid during the year, or whether it is a part thereof, remain unpaid at the close of the year: *provided*, that the amounts paid and unpaid, shall be properly distinguished. The variations between said summary account and said detailed account, shall be indicated and explained by proper notes and statements.

SECTION 4. The auditor's report, in each year, shall show the aggregate amount of funded debt at the beginning and end of the year respectively, the balance of increase or decrease, and a statement of the cause of such balance; and in like manner, shall show the aggregate amount of the temporary loan, at the beginning and end of the year, the balance of increase or decrease, and a statement of the cause of such balance. The report shall likewise state whether the ordinary expenses of the year have exceeded the income, or the contrary, and show the amount of the balance, with an explanation of the means by which any deficit may have been met, or of the purposes to which any surplus may have been applied.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the auditor to include in his report, the items of all accounts of expenditure, so far as they may be material or interesting to the people of the Commonwealth; and in particular, so far as may be practicable, the various heads of expenditure shall be separated, so as to show the different officers or boards, under whose directions the several portions of the expenditure have been incurred; all salaries and other general charges shall likewise be separated, so as to show the different classes of officers who received the several portions of the expenditure; and no expenditure exceeding five hundred dollars, shall be included under any indefinite head, if it be composed of separate items.

SECTION 6. The auditor's report shall, annually, contain a particular statement of the manner in which the moiety of the income of the school district applicable to educational purposes, has been disbursed.

SECTION 7. The auditor's report shall hereafter state the amount paid to each county, in reimbursement of the costs of criminal prosecutions, in such manner as to show the whole amount charged, the amount retained for fines and forfeitures, and the balance; also, the amount of commissions allowed on such payments, to the treasurer of each county.

SECTION 8. The auditor's report shall hereafter descend to the investments of any portion of the funds belonging to the Commonwealth which may have been made during the year.

SECTION 9. In estimating the value of the shares of Waterbury road stock belonging to the Commonwealth, the treasurer and auditor shall not assign a separate numerical value to the right in the sinking fund; and all railroad shares or other securities shall be reckoned at their market value at the time of making the report.

It will be seen by these provisions that the duty of preparing this Report with all the details required by the statute imposes upon this department a great amount of labor, which renders it almost impossible to have the Report completed by the fifteenth of January as is required by the law.

Every exertion possible is made by the clerks and assistants connected with the office, by working extra hours, and by spending whole nights in hard labor to have it ready for the proper season.

All of the accounts must be kept open till after the first of the month, and then large amounts of the expenses of the year are not rendered till it is too late to introduce them in their proper place. It is therefore not practicable to give the exact expense of the year at the time of making this Report, but a very close approximation is made by a careful estimate of the outstanding demands.

It will be observed that two distinct sets of accounts are required: one giving the actual *payments* in cash from the Treasury during the calendar year, and the other including the *expenses* properly chargeable to the year whether they are paid or not. The first account will of course exactly agree with the report of the Treasurer, while the second is liable to some material variation. This distinction should be kept in mind when consulting the various tables.

The year has been one of uncommon activity in the department. The large disbursements on account of aid to the State of Volunteers, the expenditures for coast defence, the purchase of arms for the militia, the payment of bounties to Volunteers, and the general military expenses, in addition to the ordinary transactions of the year, have brought an amount of business to the office never before known.

It is not given entire satisfaction to all parties under such circumstances was not of course to be expected. Persons who make demands against the Commonwealth do not willingly have them disallowed or reduced in amount, and if this is done it is not strange if they complain. Every effort has been made to secure justice to all parties, at the same time that the treasury is kept properly guarded, and that no errors have occurred it must be ascribed to the fact, that the auditor failed to make proper appropriations, rather than to negligence in this department.

REVENUE AND EXPENSES.

The total amount received into the treasury during the year ending December 31, 1863, was \$7,239,749.18, and the total amount paid therefrom during the same time was \$6,738,099.71, leaving a balance of \$501,649.47 in the treasury. A portion of the receipts and expenditures, were merely nominal as the amount of the bounties paid to Volunteers by the cities and towns was made chiefly by offsets without the actual payment of money. Leaving out of the account this "bounty reimbursement," the total receipts were \$3,915,474.44, and the total disbursements \$3,391,131.86. Of the receipts \$2,425,189.38 were from direct taxes, and the balance \$1,490,285.06 from the State Lottery, insurance tax and various miscellaneous sources.

Of the payments \$1,713,269.86 were for reimbursement to the towns for aid to families of Volunteers, \$180,000 to the State Loan Sinking Fund, and \$324,422.18 for interest on State loans, including the premium on coin, making a sum of \$2,417,692.04. Deducting this sum from \$3,391,131.86, the total disbursements, and it leaves \$1,173,439.82 as the strictly military expenses of the year.

The Commonwealth is therefore in receipt of a revenue, exclusive of direct taxes, more than sufficient for all ordinary purposes, including interest on all loans for State purposes.

The estimated revenue of the Commonwealth for the year ending December 31, 1864, from ordinary sources, exclusive of direct taxes, as found in Statement Number IV. of this Report, amounts to \$1,400,000.

to be provided for by a direct tax.

The tax of last year was assessed for \$2,396,568. It thus be seen that if there are not new and extraordinary expenses allowed by the legislature, the tax may this year be considerably diminished.

While all are willing to bear taxation to the utmost extent that may be necessary for the good of the country and the complete suppression of the rebellion, yet a rigid regard to economy should be observed in every department, that the burdens of the people, necessarily heavy, may be as light as consistent with the public good.

Unnecessary or doubtful measures, causing expense, should be deferred to more favorable circumstances, and our efforts centered on the one grand object of establishing liberty and the control of the government throughout the length and breadth of the land.

MILITARY EXPENSES.

There has been spent by the State the past year on account of the United States for military purposes, \$35,163.52, and the total amount expended and charged to the general government since the commencement of the war is \$3,489,506.57. Of this sum there have been reimbursed from the United States and other sources, \$1,625,188.26, leaving now due the State \$1,864,318.31.

The accounts of these expenses have been carefully made with full details and proper vouchers, and forwarded to the Auditor for allowance by the general government; but by reason of a press of business or neglect of the accounting officer it has been impossible to get any settlement, or any balance on account, during the past year.

The department has made strenuous efforts, and has urged personal exertions at the Treasury Department in Washington, to draw immediate attention to this matter; but thus far it has been in vain.

The only account that has been examined is the first one rendered by the State, embracing the time from April to the 27th of May, 1861. To this some objections were made in regard to the vouchers, that have since been fully supplied. The second account, embracing the expenses for the balance of the year 1861, and the third account for the whole of the year 1862, have not, so far as I have been able to ascertain, been examined at all.

This is a matter of great importance to the State. We are now paying interest, on the amount due, in specie at a high premium, and this fact alone will soon make our demand amount to a formidable sum. The parties who were the agents making the purchases, in allowing and settling the bills, and settling up the accounts, are now where they can be reached to make all needed explanations, and to give any information that may be desired; every thing is now fresh in mind, and can be much better adjusted by those who are familiar with the subject, than by their successors. I do not know that any action is necessary, but the subject is worthy the attention of all who take an interest in the financial affairs of the Commonwealth.

AID TO FAMILIES OF VOLUNTEERS.

There have been allowed during the year to the cities and towns of the Commonwealth as reimbursement for aid rendered to families of Volunteers in the year 1862, \$1,781,099.17. As the accounts are not yet definitely adjusted, but these will increase the aggregate more than a few thousand dollars. The total amount claimed was \$1,874,095.50, the difference being caused by the unsettled accounts, and the items not properly chargeable to the Commonwealth.

The sum already returned as having been paid by cities and towns the past year is \$2,302,151.35, and the balance heard from will probably increase the amount to \$2,400,000.

This sum is considerably larger than was paid during the year 1862, mainly on account of the large number of the months' regiments that have served during a part of the year. As these have now all returned, it is probable that the amount paid for the current year will not exceed that of the last, as the men now being raised will not more than supply their places. It is not likely the State will have a larger number of soldiers in the field, at any one time, than she will have when the last call of the President is filled. And thus if the laws in regard to State aid are allowed to remain unaltered, we may conclude that in this department we have reached the maximum amount of expenditure.

The law may possibly need some alteration as new circumstances arise, but frequent amendments produce irregularity and confusion in administration, and should not be allowed upon the gravest necessity. In any law, however carefully framed, there will be exceptional cases, and these Acts are an exception to the general rule.

This is a noble gift of the Commonwealth to the families of devoted soldiers, who are upholding her honor, and sustaining her principles on the battle-fields in every section of the State. No money spent is better deserved, or more cheerfully paid, and none carries a larger amount of happiness to the desolate homes of her brave Volunteers.

LUNATIC STATE PAUPERS.

The expense of boarding lunatic State paupers at the Lunatic Hospitals for the year 1863 was \$91,545.86. This sum is large, and might, without any detriment to those supported, be very much reduced. The price formerly paid was two dollars and sixty-two cents per week for each inmate. By chapter 214 of the Acts of 1863 it is provided that the price paid "shall not exceed two dollars and twenty-five cents a week for each lunatic." A large portion of these might have been supported at the State almshouses at a cost of only one dollar per week each, had the legislature sanctioned the change.

I hereby call the attention of the legislature to this subject, and my opinions, refer to my report of last year.

TROY AND GREENFIELD RAILROAD, AND HOOSAC TUNNEL.

There has been drawn during the year in favor of the Commissioners on the Troy and Greenfield Railroad, and Hoosac Tunnel, \$75,000, and there has been paid by the treasurer of the Commonwealth, without a certificate, on account of "claims for service, materials and land damages," as allowed by the Commissioners, under section three of chapter one hundred and thirty of the Acts of 1862, \$150,000.

There seems to be some obscurity in regard to the intention of the legislature as to the manner in which this money should be drawn from the treasury.

Section 30 of chapter 15 of the General Statutes, provides that "no money shall be paid from the treasury, but upon the warrant of the Governor," and the same section also provides that "no warrant shall be drawn for the payment of any account or claim, except for the pay rolls of the council, senate, and members of representatives, unless the same is certified by the Auditor." This method has always been adhered to, until the legislature, by section third, of chapter 156 of the Acts of 1862, provided that the governor should draw his warrant upon the treasurer in favor of claimants for materials and damage in the construction of this railroad. The language of the Act places the money in the hands of the governor to be paid by him without the intervention of the Auditor. The same phraseology is used in section two of chapter 214 of the Acts of 1863. This is in direct conflict with the provisions of the General Statutes, but being of subsequent date it must control them.

Another point in connexion with this subject is the manner in which the accounts of disbursements by the State for this purpose shall be kept. By section five of chapter 158 of the Acts of 1858, the Auditor is required to include in his annual report, "a statement of all accounts of expenditure, so far as they may be of interest to the people of the Commonwealth," and this duty can be performed only by having the original vouchers lodged in this department, where they can be examined and drawn for, as is the law in regard to all other accounts. But the practice has been to grant to the Commis-

sioners sums of money in gross, for them to use, and the of the "items" or details of their expenditures are not to be placed in this office.

This subject is most respectfully referred to the legislature for their consideration, and I can only add that whatever plan adopted, it will be equally satisfactory to this department.

CHARLES RIVER BRIDGE, AND WARREN BRIDGE FUND.

The expenses of the Charles River Bridge and Warren Bridge during the last two or three years, have considerably exceeded the income of the fund set apart for their payment. The Charles River Bridge and Warren Bridge Fund, amounting to \$100,000 as established by chapter 451 of the Acts 1854, and chapter 10 of the Acts of 1858, has been from the first fully and amply invested, and its income has been promptly received. But no portion of the principal can be diverted to the payment of expenses accruing in the maintenance of the bridges, the excess of expenses over the income has been the frequent occasion of embarrassment and annoyance, especially to parties holding claims against the Commonwealth, and in some instances a year or more has elapsed before payment could be made. The increased expenditure has accrued mainly from repairs rendered necessary for the proper preservation and safety of the bridges, the excess having thus increased from year to year, until there are now outstanding claims against these bridges amounting to \$3,719.18, for the liquidation of which no income remains in the treasury. This large deficiency, however, is in part occasioned by the use of the income for 1863, in the payment of expenses belonging to the previous year, and also by expenses amounting to about \$500, incurred in the erection of a new building in place of the toll-house destroyed by fire. Thus it appears that there is a constantly increasing deficiency from year to year, and some legislation will be found desirable and necessary to provide for present and future contingencies of this character.

PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.

During the past year this disease has again made its appearance in various parts of the Commonwealth, chiefly in the counties of Norfolk and Middlesex. It has thus far defied all efforts for its extermination, and with the utmost exertions

have been made, it still finds a lurking place in our borders. In the absence of commissioners, the duty of protecting the interests of the people from the ravages of the disease devolved upon the selectmen of the towns, under chapter 220 of the Acts of 1860. By this Act it is provided that four-fifths of the cost of treatment, and four-fifths of the value of the cattle killed shall be paid by the State. But the legislature of 1863 failed to make any appropriation for this purpose, consequently the bills could not be settled by this department. The sum already claimed is \$1,469.72, and other demands will probably increase the sum to a much larger amount. For this expense it will be necessary for the legislature to make an appropriation.

BANKS.

There have been no new banks established under the general law of this Commonwealth during the past year.

The Bank of the Metropolis with a capital of \$200,000 has transferred to its former President, Samuel A. Way, Esq., all his interest in the property of the bank, and he has become sole proprietor of its assets. The bank has now gone into liquidation; its circulation outstanding at the close of business on the 31st day of December, 1863, was \$122,630 which is amply secured by public stocks deposited in this department. The circulation is redeemed as fast as presented, and when it has been returned to the Auditor and burned, the stocks will be surrendered.

The Safety-Fund Bank, also one of the banks under the general law, with a capital of \$1,000,000, has organized under the general law of the United States, as the first National Bank of Boston.

These changes reduce the number of banks under the general law to five, with an aggregate capital of \$2,700,000, and a circulation of \$1,454,445, secured by stocks to the amount of \$1,267,600. A detailed statement of the condition of these banks will be found in tabular statement number eighteen of this report.
