To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

By the 15th chapter of the General Statutes, it is provided that "on or before the 15th day of January of each year, the Auditor shall submit to the legislature a report exhibiting a full and accurate statement of the financial condition of the Commonwealth, and of the pecuniary transactions thereof during the year ending on the last day of the preceding month; and also, that "he shall include in his report an estimate for the following year, of the ordinary income of the Commonwealth, and other means which he may point out for defraying of expenditures, and *shall annex thereto such representations or suggestions as he may deem necessary.*"

In compliance with these provisions, I respectfully submit this Report, with remarks upon the finances of the Commonwealth.

The past year has been one of uncommon importance in the financial transactions of the State, the gross amount of receipts and payments far exceeding those of any other year in its history. The amounts paid as bounty to volunteers, the monthly payments to soldiers who elect to receive the twenty dollars per month instead of bounty, and the large payments to towns and cities of the aid furnished families of volunteers, have, together with other transactions of less importance, swelled the amount of payments to \$25,268,396.30.

The receipts have also been large, arising from loans, general taxes, and the special corporation tax, with other miscellaneous sources, amounting to \$25,289,964.50.

By section five, chapter fifteen of the General Statutes, it is made imperative upon the Auditor to report on or before the 15th day of January of each year a full and accurate statement of the financial condition of the Commonwealth, with an account of all the expenditures in detail, during the year ending on the last day of the preceding month. The large increase in the amount of business of this department in the last few years, renders it almost impossible to comply with the statute in this respect. All of the accounts must be kept open till after the first of January, and then the preparation must be hurried into a few days. Another difficulty arises from the fact that the law requires us to give an account of all the expenses properly belonging to the preceding year, whether paid or not, and as many of the demands are not received till after the 15th of January, it is impossible to place them in the Report. Every effort is made to have it as complete as possible, and an appendix is added each year of those items that are not received in season for insertion in their proper place in the report of the previous year.

REVENUE AND EXPENSES.

The total amount of revenue received into the treasury during the year ending December 31, 1864, was \$5,840,420.50, and the total amount paid therefrom was \$5,065,792.39, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$774,628.11.

A portion of these receipts are rather apparent than real, as \$1,198,187.04 of the corporation tax received into the treasury is to be refunded to the cities and towns. The full details of receipts can be found in Statement Number IX., page 26 of this Report.

In addition to the payments on account of ordinary expenses, there has been paid as bounty and pay of soldiers \$9,718,762.57, which has been met by the Bounty Fund and temporary loans. The estimated revenue of the Commonwealth for the year 1865, from ordinary sources, exclusive of loans and direct taxes, is found in detail in Statement Number IV. of this Report, amounting to \$1,600,000.

From this deduct ordinary revenue, and there remains a balance of \$3,110,000, for which provision must be made.

In this estimate I make no provision for bounty on soldiers as these have been heretofore met by loans.

In addition to the above there is \$75,000 of the bonds of the Eastern Railroad, and \$170,000 of the Taunton Hospital scrip that mature this year. Provision must be made to meet these in gold. The State holds a mortgage on the Eastern Railroad as security for the payment of bonds on them, and the Taunton Hospital scrip is secured by the "Extinguishment Fund," which now consists entirely of shares of Western Railroad stock. A portion of this stock may be sold to meet this demand, or the legislature must provide some other means.

MILITARY EXPENSES.

There has been spent by the State during the past year an account of the United States for military purposes, \$3,529,882.68. Of this sum we have received from the United States and other sources, \$1,625,188.26, including the refund of the direct tax of the general government assessed upon the States for the year 1862, of \$700,894.14. There is, therefore, now due from the United States for military expenses \$1,904,694.42.

Congress by a law approved July 27, 1861, provided for the payment of the military expenses of the several States, to be settled upon proper vouchers, to be filed and passed upon by the proper accounting officers of the treasury.

Under this Act the third auditor of the treasury, in his department these accounts belong, decided that only those

by the State previous to the twenty-seventh day of July, could be allowed. In accordance with this decision an account of all the military expenses of the Commonwealth from the commencement of the war to said 27th of July, with vouchers for all expenditures was prepared and sent to the War Department at Washington in December 1861. This, which by way of distinction we call the first account, amounted to \$1,316,344.79.

By a Resolve approved March 8, 1862, decided that the above quoted "shall be construed to apply to expenses incurred as well after as before the date of the approval thereof." An account of all the expenditures for the government from July, 1861, till the close of that year, was then prepared with proper vouchers and explanations. This second account, amounting to \$1,848,783.06, was immediately sent to the War Department.

In the same manner the account for the year 1862, was prepared and forwarded, amounting to \$199,982.67, and is called the third account. The account for 1863, amounting to \$33,926.52, is now ready to be sent, and is called the fourth account. The expenses for 1864 have not yet been arranged for.

In addition to this there is a claim for expenditures made by E. D. Brigham, Commissary General of Massachusetts, for the sum of \$101,492.46, for the subsistence of troops previous to being mustered into the service of the United States. This account, with vouchers, has also been sent to Washington for allowance.

Of the above credits, \$775,000 of the first item was received from the United States in cash, and \$700,894.14 of the second item was an offset for our portion of the direct tax assessed upon the States by Act of Congress, approved August 5th, 1861.

Strenuous exertions have been made to secure the settlement and payment of these claims, but thus far without effect. The first account is the only one that appears to have received any attention, or been examined at all. To this various special objections were made to sundry items, some of them being mere matters of form, and others asking for explanations and additional vouchers. These were carefully prepared and furnished the department, amounting to three hundred and sixty-one pages of manuscript. At the date of our last information these answers had been examined by the third auditor, and the whole of this first account referred to the second comptroller for a final decision.

The State is paying interest in gold (which it is compelled to purchase in the market at the current rates,) upon the whole of this indebtedness, which makes the question of interest one of great importance. There is no provision yet made by Congress for the reimbursement of any part of the interest so paid, and it is to be feared that it will be difficult to obtain the passage of such an Act. Most of the other States of the Union have expended for the general government less than Massachusetts in proportion to their population, so that the offset of the direct tax of 1861 has nearly paid them for their whole expenditure. This leaves them without any inducement to allow any law to pass that shall give relief to this Commonwealth in the matter of interest. When we consider the history of our claims on the government growing out of the war of 1812-15, we can see the importance of attending to this subject while the facts are fresh in mind, and before the claim for interest shall become so large as to render its allowance impracticable. Had

for the assessment by the United States of a direct tax on several States remained unrepealed, we should have an offset with our account each year until the whole sum was exhausted. In this way, although we should not receive any cash from the United States, we should, at least, be placed on an equality with the other States.

AID TO FAMILIES OF VOLUNTEERS.

The amount allowed to the cities and towns of the Commonwealth for aid to families of volunteers, for the year 1863, was \$2,257,741.19. A small amount still remains suspended for further information, which, when finally adjusted, will probably increase the amount to \$2,325,000. We have allowed on the final adjustment of the accounts for 1862, \$1,625,01, in addition to \$1,781,099.17, already reported, making the total amount allowed for that year, \$1,826,259.18. There has been already returned to this office, as having been paid by the cities and towns the past year, \$2,229,316.84, and eleven towns yet to be heard from will probably increase the amount to \$2,275,000.

The regularity and accuracy of these returns have been much improved since the first accounts rendered for the year 1861, owing, no doubt, to the fact that the city and town authorities have a greater familiarity with the business, and a more perfect understanding of the laws on this subject.

By an Order adopted by the House of Representatives, May 1864, the Attorney-General and the Auditor were required to make a complete codification of the several Acts in aid of families of volunteers and report the same to the next general court."

This duty has been performed, and should the legislature see fit to adopt this report and make it the only law in regard to aid, it would simplify the duties of municipal officers and remove many difficulties that now exist. At the same time I respectfully suggest that any material alteration of the law on this subject would introduce confusion in their administration, where it is of the utmost importance that uniformity should prevail. No law can meet every conceivable case, and

something, after all, must be left to be done by organized societies and private charity.

CORPORATION TAX.

By chapter 208 of the Acts of 1864, "the Treasurer and the Auditor of the Commonwealth" were constituted a board of commissioners to assess a tax upon the various corporations doing business within the limits of this State. This devolved a large increase of duties upon these departments, which made it necessary to organize a special corps of clerks for this particular duty. The legislature failed to make any appropriation for the payment of these, and it is desirable that provision be made at an early day.

The full proceedings under this law will be explained in a special report of the commissioners.

BANKS.

No new banks have been established under the general banking law of this State during the past year, while four of this class have changed their organizations from State to National institutions,—leaving only one, the Revere, that has not taken steps for the change.

The securities of all these banks are retained in this department as a guarantee for their circulation, and are returned to them only as their circulation is returned and destroyed. The whole amount of the bills of these banks outstanding on the first day of January, 1865, was \$1,199,859, secured by stocks to the amount of \$1,503,900.

CLERKS.

I do not feel willing to close this Report without calling your attention to the faithful services of the clerks in this department. Their labors, always arduous, have been much increased during the last few years, and the position calls for an order of talent that cannot be secured at the rate of pay now established by law. The expense of living has much increased, and clerks in banking and mercantile houses, in positions not so responsible, receive double their pay. It is not good policy or economy for the State to employ men of inferior qualifications, and I most

respectfully recommend that their pay be increased to the same amount as last year.
