To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

In compliance with the provisions of the statutes, I have the honor to present the Report of the Auditor of Accounts, it being the twentieth in the series, and exhibiting a statement of the financial condition of the Commonwealth and the pecuniary transactions thereof during the year ending the last day of December, 1868.

The law as modified by the statutes of 1867, chapter 178, in sections 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, prescribes that—

“The annual report of the auditor shall contain a summary statement of the receipts into and payments from the treasury of the Commonwealth for the preceding year; also, a detailed and particular statement of the receipts and expenditures belonging to each year; said detailed statement of expenditures to include, first, the expense incurred during the year for the support of all permanent departments, services and institutions; and second, all special and exceptional charges, incurred for objects ordered within the year, the account being constructed in such manner as to show the expenditures actually incurred within the year, as far as can be ascertained, whether the same have been paid during the year, or whether the whole or part thereof remain unpaid at the close of the year.

“The auditor's report in each year shall show the aggregate amount of funded debt at the beginning and end of the year respectively, the balance of increase or decrease, and a statement of the cause of such balance; and in like manner shall show the

aggregate amount of all temporary loans at the beginning and end of the year, the balance of increase or decrease, and a statement of the cause of such balance. The report shall likewise state whether the ordinary expenses of the year have exceeded the income, or the contrary, and show the amount of the balance.

“It shall be the duty of the auditor to include in his report the items of all accounts of expenditures, so far as they may be useful or interesting to the people of the Commonwealth; and in particular, so far as may be practicable, the various heads of expenditure shall be separated, so as to show the different officers or boards under whose directions the several portions of the expenditure have been incurred; all salaries and other general charges shall likewise be separated so as to show the different classes of officers who receive the several portions of the expenditure; and no expenditure exceeding five hundred dollars shall be included under any indefinite head if it be composed of separate items.

“The auditor's report shall annually contain a particular statement of the transactions of the funds belonging to, or held in trust by the Commonwealth, including new investments of any portion of said funds, which may have been made during the preceding year, and also of the manner in which the moiety of the income of the school fund applicable to educational purposes has been disbursed.

“The auditor shall also include in his report an estimate for the current year of the ordinary revenue of the Commonwealth, and of such other means as he may be able to point out for the defraying of expenditures.”

These aggregates both in receipts and expenses, which, perhaps, any sound accounting system would make necessary in a formal statement, are calculated to convey the impression of an extent of expenditures and corresponding resources which will be materially reduced by an analysis of the transactions.

Such an analysis shows that, of the receipts a considerable amount is immediately re-imbursed or specially appropriated, or is applicable to the reduction of expenses of certain institutions, viz. :—

The foregoing estimates have been carefully made and are believed to be reliable, unless disturbed by some change in the policy of previous legislation.

One item, perhaps, should be excepted from the last remark, viz.: the estimate of \$140,000.00 on the side of revenue from Liquor Licenses, and for tax on sales of liquors. It is a new source of revenue; but while it is provided for by existing laws, the propriety of questioning its permanence, by an officer who has no agency in or responsibility for the making of the laws, is doubtful.

It will appear that a State tax of \$2,000,000, as suggested by His Excellency the governor, in his annual message, would be likely to cover the current expenses of the government, even if the temporary loan should not be funded, as it would clearly appear proper it should be.

The estimate is based, however, upon the assumption warranted and made necessary by the express language of the statute of the last year, that the advance, to the amount of more than \$850,000 on account of the construction of the Troy and Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel, should be re-imbursed to the treasury from the proceeds of scrip or bonds which await only the authority of the governor and council for their issue and negotiation.

PUBLIC DEBT STATEMENT.

The statute already recited prescribes that "the Auditor's Report in each year shall show the aggregate amount of funded debt at the beginning and end of the year, respectively, the balance of increase or decrease, and a statement of the cause of such balance, and in like manner shall show the aggregate amount of all temporary loans at the beginning and end of the

But for this specific direction, the duty might be considered to have been superseded by the statements in the two executive communications already made to the legislature, and that contained in the report of the Treasurer and Receiver-General.

The reason for extending the Western Railroad loan would seem to be to avoid the large expenditures for the purchase of coin with which to redeem it, without the corresponding gain which the premium on the new substituted bonds would yield. The real increase of the debt has resulted mainly from the funding of the temporary debt contracted in the prosecution of the work on the Troy and Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel, by the late issue of the scrip which has been provided for and directed by nearly every legislature since the road came into possession of the State. The loan of bonds to the Boston, Hartford and Erie Railroad, is an entirely new indebtedness.

The difference between the *increase* of the funded debt (\$2,142,980,) and the *decrease* of the temporary loans, (\$997,670.07,) shows the increase of the whole debt to be \$1,214,529.95.

In examining the outstanding obligations of the Commonwealth it is to be considered that a considerable portion of the indebtedness comprised in the funded debt is rather nominal than real. To this class belong all the scrip loaned to or issued in behalf of railroad corporations, except that on account of the Troy and Greenfield, amounting to \$1,468,696. This portion may be regarded so entirely secure that it may practically be left out of the amount of liabilities.

Of the balance, \$22,338,724, provision has been made for much the larger part.

It may be useful to present the different classes of debts in connection with the means provided for their extinguishment, in a statement exhibiting—The amount of the debt.—The amount of the sinking fund, if any, January 1, 1869, and—The sum which at six per cent. semi-annual compound interest would extinguish the debt at maturity, viz.:—

In addition to its own income, this fund is annually increased by dividends on the Western Railroad stock held by the State, by the net proceeds of sales of Back Bay lands, and by an annual tax sufficient to make, with the receipts from the other two sources, a sum equal to three per cent. of the whole debt.

It had large accessions during the last year under special provisions of law, viz.: the surplus of the Union Loan Sinking Fund, balance of the Coast Defence Loan, and receipts from United States and State tax.

It is provided that five per cent. of this amount shall be annually raised by taxation, until the Bounty Loan Sinking Fund is complete, in which case the payments to that fund are to be transferred to this.

This examination would seem to indicate the propriety of a reorganization of most of these funds. While some are inadequate to the purposes of their constitution, others are largely in excess of the amount required.

A computation will show that, in the aggregate, the Funds fall short of the sums required to extinguish the debt at maturity by the amount of about \$915,000. It is true that other provision than the natural increase of the funds is made in some cases; as by taxes, and appropriations from uncertain and varying sources; but the simplest and surest method is that which was adopted in the constitution of the Coast Defence Loan Fund under the statute of the last year.

It is again submitted that to maintain a fund like that of the Union Loan Fund largely in excess of the amount required, and appropriate its income to the revenue; while other kindred funds are insufficient, and if increased, must depend

upon appropriations from the revenue, is unnatural and objectionable. The amount raised by taxation during the past year, and appropriated to the Bounty Loan Fund and Massachusetts War Loan Sinking Fund, was nearly equal to the receipts into the revenue from the Union Loan Fund. When the similar character of these loans is considered, the impropriety is the more obvious. The transfer of the surplus of the Union Loan Fund to the War Loan and Bounty Funds would avoid the payments now required to be provided for by taxation, and nearly perfect those funds. So the transfer of the \$390,500 surplus of the Debt Extinguishment Fund to the similar object in providing for the payment of the loans made in 1861 to fund the debt, and that created for the revision of the statutes, would seem the appropriate course.

This would leave only the Troy and Greenfield Railroad Loan unprovided for. The difference between the small fund now existing, and that required for the purposes of a sinking fund, is about \$900,000. It is suggested that the receipts from the leases of the Southern Vermont road, and of the sections of the Troy and Greenfield road between Greenfield and the tunnel, and between Adams and the State line, which now, under an old general provision, go to reduce the interest on the debt, and that all other income or receipts on account of the Troy and Greenfield Railroad, should be appropriated to the sinking fund.

It appears, by the report of the commissioners in 1863, that the section between Adams and the State line is leased to the Troy and Boston road at an annual rent of \$8,000, none of which has ever been received into the treasury.

In estimating the value of the sinking funds, the difference between the nominal and market value of the securities has not been overlooked; but this difference does not appear to be material except for such as are to be sold; for the interest on Massachusetts securities in her own Funds is paid in currency, and will scarcely yield an income greater than that which is the basis of the sinking funds; beside, the premium derived from the gold-bearing securities has not heretofore been credited to these funds.

The value of two of these funds is, however, materially enhanced by the investment in stock of the Boston & Albany

Railroad to the amount of \$1,009,700, which yields ten per cent. annually, while there is only about \$658,500 invested in five per cent. funds.

This Report is submitted on this day in order to observe the letter of the statute which requires it to be made on or before the 15th day of January, in each year. But I do not hesitate to say that a compliance with the spirit of the provisions respecting the details of transactions required to be furnished in the Report is impracticable and utterly impossible. There are two obstacles to such a compliance, either of which is insuperable. First, many of the transactions required to be reported do not transpire until after the time limited has passed. The other difficulty is, that the original accounts and records which supply the data and materials for the report are not kept in this department, and the time of their completion, so as to be available for the purposes required is not within my control.

I can only earnestly repeat the suggestions made in my two preceding reports, that the restriction as to time be removed, and request the privilege of making such corrections of errors as may be discovered in this while it is going through the press.
