To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

The Act of 1867, chapter 178, section 7, prescribes that, "On or before the 15th day of January in each year, the Auditor shall submit in print, or otherwise, to the legislature, a report exhibiting a full and accurate statement of the financial condition of the Commonwealth, and of the pecuniary transactions thereof, during the year ending on the last day of the preceding month."

With the desire of complying with the spirit as well as the letter of this statute, I have made earnest and unremitting effort to procure the data and arrange and compare and present the statements called for; but I find myself for the fourth time compelled, not so much to ask the indulgence of the legislature for the non-compliance, as to again respectfully remonstrate against an impossible requirement. The statements are presented in the usual form, but they do not furnish a *full and accurate statement*. Such a statement cannot be submitted within the time prescribed unless the Auditor is authorized to keep an accountant in the Treasury Department during the year, whose books will show those transactions which belong to that department, and which furnish the material for the Auditor's Report. Desiring if possible to comply with the requirements of the law which I have in vain recommended should be modified, I have by personal attention to it, kept, in time out of office hours, when the Treasurer's journal was not in use, an account of the transactions independent of the system which has been so long adhered to in this department that as an

incumbent from year to year, I have not felt authorized to change it. The exhibit which this independent account would have afforded might have been useful in showing the same transactions as appearing to the view of different and independent departments. But I did not deem it prudent to make the statement from one view without the opportunity to compare it with that of the other. It is, while endeavoring to make the comparison, that the limit of time is reached, a failure to observe which might be deemed less excusable than the plain avowal that such a literal compliance is rather apparant than real. I do not intimate that there has been any indisposition in the Treasury Department to furnish that free access to the books and papers thereof which the statute gives; only to say that the same books cannot be used by both departments at the same time, and that for the ten days succeeding the close of the financial year those records were necessarily appropriated by that department in the settlement of its own accounts.

I again respectfully recommend that the difficulty be removed, either by extending the time limited for the presenting the report of the Auditor, or by making the financial year end November 30th, or providing that the Treasurer's Department shall furnish to that of the Auditor a daily transcript of its financial transactions.

Beside the usual statements, I designed to present some statements and considerations relating to the duties and powers of the office which I am about to vacate, which, it appears to me, deserve the careful attention of the legislature, as well in regard to the public interest as in justice to my successor; but these, with statements of accounts referred to, must be relinquished, being only partially prepared.

Prefatory to the following tabular statements, I cite the provisions of statutes defining the subjects of the Auditor's Report.

The Acts of 1867, in chapter 178, sections 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, prescribe that,—

"The annual report of the Auditor shall contain a summary statement of the receipts into and payments from the treasury of the Commonwealth for the preceding year; also, a detailed and particular statement of the receipts and expenditures belonging to each year; said detailed statement of expenditures to include, first, the expense incurred during the year for the support of all perma-

nent departments, services and institutions; and second, all special and exceptional charges, incurred for objects ordered within the year, the account being constructed in such manner as to show the expenditures actually incurred within the year, as far as can be ascertained, whether the same have been paid during the year, or whether the whole or part thereof remain unpaid at the close of the year.

"The Auditor's Report in each year shall show the aggregate amount of funded debt at the beginning and end of the year respectively, the balance of increase or decrease, and a statement of the cause of such balance; and in like manner shall show the aggregate amount of all temporary loans at the beginning and end of the year, the balance of increase or decrease, and a statement of the cause of such balance. The report shall likewise state whether the ordinary expenses of the year have exceeded the income, or the contrary, and show the amount of the balance.

"It shall be the duty of the Auditor to include in his report the items of all accounts of expenditures, so far as they may be useful or interesting to the people of the Commonwealth; and in particular, so far as may be practicable, the various heads of expenditure shall be separated, so as to show the different officers or boards under whose directions the several portions of the expenditure have been incurred; all salaries and other general charges shall likewise be separated so as to show the different classes of officers who receive the several portions of the expenditure; and no expenditure exceeding five hundred dollars shall be included under any indefinite head if it be composed of separate items.

"The Auditor's Report shall annually contain a particular statement of the transactions of the funds belonging to, or held in trust by the Commonwealth, including new investments of any portion of said funds, which may have been made during the preceding year, and also of the manner in which the moiety of the income of the school fund applicable to educational purposes has been disbursed.

"The Auditor shall also include in his report an estimate for the current year of the ordinary revenue of the Commonwealth, and of such other means as he may be able to point out for the defraying of expenditures."

RECEIPTS AND PAYMENTS.

The usual tabular statement prepared from the data furnished by the Treasury Department shows the gross receipts for the year 1869, including \$1,161,932.80 cash on hand Jan-

From the same transactions, my account, made up from the Treasurer's blotter and journal, shows the gross receipts in the Treasury, in-

cluding the same balance at the beginning of
the year, to be \$12,002,972 18
And the payments, 9,860,163 61

With a balance of \$2,142,808 57
being very nearly the same as that found by the former state-
ment.

The great difference in the magnitude of transactions pro-
ducing substantially the same results, is accounted for by the
practice in one case of making cross entries whereby the same
item appears several times in the receipts and payments, and
again by the treatment as cash certain securities or bills receiv-
able. I have assumed that, in the financial transactions of the
government, the receipts and payments are understood to mean
cash transactions. An exception to this is in the receipts for
the sales of public lands, which go to increase the amount of
certain funds, notes and mortgages, as follows; viz:—

This sum, provided the security is sound, is an actual receipt,
although it should not properly appear as a cash transaction.

The authority for receiving notes in part payment for sale of
Back Bay Lands is expressly given by statute. In the case of
the South Boston Flats, the authority may perhaps be implied
in the provision that “the manner, terms and conditions of such
sales shall be prescribed by the governor and council.”

A detailed statement of the items making up the remaining
differences in these aggregates is unnecessary in this place. An
example or two will indicate the nature of the difference.

Among the receipts on the Treasurer's accounts

is Boston, Hartford and Erie Railroad Loan, \$3,102,440 00
Conditional Loan Troy and Greenfield Railroad, 340,000 00
where it is apparent that the entry is a nominal one, the trans-
actions being simply an issue of obligations by the Common-
wealth.

Another large item in receipts is Bonds and Mortgages Rail-
road Corporations, \$510,600, which is only a change of securi-
ties appertaining to railroad loans.

It is to be observed, furthermore, that in many of the actual
cash transactions which are included in the foregoing reduced
statement, the receipts and payments do not change the *value*
of the funds to which they relate, as the changes occur in the
interchange of the cash with securities in the processes of
investment.

In classifying the receipts and expenditures
into revenue and fund transactions, a similar
difference occurs. The statement, according
to my view of the character of the transac-
tion, will show the receipts on account of
revenue to be \$8,909,151 52 *
And the payments, 7,836,353 66

Making a balance of \$1,062,797 86

It is true that a considerable part of these amounts denom-
inated revenue is on account of temporary loans; but the
proceeds of these loans have gone into the treasury, and have
been and are subject to draft for the ordinary current expenses
of the government. Moreover, the law authorizing the larger
one, expresses it to be in anticipation of revenue. I have
treated the loan from Baring Brothers, on hypothecation or
State scrip under the Act of last year, as belonging to revenue
account, because the proceeds of the loan have been used to
meet expenses which had previously been paid from the revenue,
and which would have been so paid if the loan had not been
made. I have treated it as cash, because the arrangement was
made with the Treasurer of the Commonwealth on the spot, and
the proceeds were placed to the credit of the Commonwealth,
and subject to sight draft precisely like the cash deposits in
banks at home. The item of premium on exchange of about
\$56,000 in the Treasurer's revenue receipts, is a part of this
loan.

It may be difficult to define what are, strictly speaking,
revenue transactions; but so far as I know, in this State all

except such as relate to the trust and other funds have been designated revenue. The proceeds of these temporary loans are not specifically appropriated either in law or by the practice of the disbursing officer.

That the difference between the foregoing statement and that from the Treasurer's ledger may more fully appear, the principal items of the revenue transactions are here given.

* These items differ from the Treasurer's. \$6,000 from the Alien Passenger Tax is carried directly to the Almshouse Loan Sinking Fund, to which the statute appropriates it.

The difference in Income Union Loan Sinking Fund is the receipts on March 19, the date when the Act appropriating receipts from this source to the Bounty Loan Sinking Fund took effect.

I have placed all the receipts from the Troy and Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel to the interest account because the provisions of the statute appear to me to be direct and explicit in such an appropriation of all receipts from that source.

In the transactions on account of *Revenue* a deduction is to be made from the nominal receipts and payments corresponding to that explained in connection with the funds. As in the case of corporation tax, income State prison and other reformatory institutions, the income from State almshouses, and temporary loan in anticipation of revenue,—the apparent receipts are greatly reduced or altogether overbalanced by the *payments* on the same accounts.

In the payments on account of revenue, the principal items of difference between my statements and the Treasurer's are:—

The expenditures on the foregoing accounts clearly appear to me to be payable from the funds which belong to the revenue account under the classification herein adopted. The public debt, whether permanent or floating, is always payable out of any funds in the treasury not otherwise specifically appropriated. The difference in interest is chiefly on account of Troy and Greenfield Railroad Loan (\$261,176.11). In fact, the most of the accruing interest on this loan during the year has been paid from the cash in the treasury and the remainder in London from the avails of a loan, part of which was applied to pay interest on another loan, and another part of which appears in the receipts on revenue account. So the expenses on the Troy and Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel have been actually paid out of funds in the treasury, and it is difficult to see how else they could have been paid, as there is

no fund applicable to that purpose. It is true, there is a provision by which funds, realized from the negotiation of bonds, ought to be applied to that purpose; but so long as this means has not been availed of, the former practice has been continued of advancing these payments from the revenue.

I have endeavored to explain the difference between the two statements. A *sufficient* reason for undertaking to show a difference would be that the judgment of each public officer must be his own guide in matters committed to his discretion, and that he ought to act in its *exercise*, recognizing his responsibility for an erroneous decision.

The *practical* bearing of this statement appears in the difference which would appear to be in the funds on hand at the commencement of the new year, applicable to the current expenses of the government:—

By one statement there was	\$272,167 44

Estimates for the Current Year.

The statute prescribes that "the Auditor shall also include in his report an estimate for the current year of the ordinary revenue of the Commonwealth, and of such other means as he may be able to point out, for the defraying of the expenditures."

If the interest on the Troy and Greenfield Railroad Loan, amounting to over \$310,000, and the conditional Loan to W. & F. Shanly of \$340,000, should be paid by the negotiation of Bonds authorized for that purpose, the amount would be reduced more than 650,000 00

Leaving \$2,212,157 61
to be provided for by the legislature.

Not less than \$60,000 of this deficiency ought to be supplied by a tax on the life insurance companies incorporated and doing business in this State, and a corresponding proportion from companies in other States doing business in this.

A tax of three-fourths of one per cent. on the assets of our own companies, after deducting real estate, premium falling due, premium notes and interest thereon, and guarantee capital, would yield a revenue of very nearly \$60,000.

It is impossible to perceive the distinction in principle between such a tax and that applied to savings banks. It would be in conformity with the principle of that tax to levy the same rates upon the whole premium actually paid to the life insurance companies.

It is nothing different from the deposits in a savings bank, except as respects the term of repayment to the depositor or his representatives. It should be borne in mind that these companies hold large amounts of stocks and other securities which now escape all kinds of taxation.
