To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

IN compliance with the requirements of law, I have the honor to present the Twenty-Second Annual Report of the Auditor of Accounts, exhibiting a statement of the financial condition of the Commonwealth, and the pecuniary transactions thereof, during the year ending December 31, 1870.

The Acts of 1867, chapter 178, defining the duties of the Auditor and the subject-matter of his Report, prescribe that,—

“The annual report of the Auditor shall contain a summary statement of the receipts into and payments from the treasury of the Commonwealth for the preceding year; also, a detailed and particular statement of the receipts and expenditures belonging to each year; said detailed statement of expenditures to include, first, the expense incurred during the year for the support of all permanent departments, services and institutions; and second, all special and exceptional charges, incurred for objects ordered within the year, the account being constructed in such manner as to show the expenditures actually incurred within the year, as far as can be ascertained, whether the same have been paid during the year, or whether the whole or part thereof remain unpaid at the close of the year.

“The Auditor's Report in each year shall show the aggregate amount of funded debt at the beginning and end of the year respectively, the balance of increase or decrease, and a statement of the cause of such balance; and in like manner shall show the

aggregate amount of all temporary loans at the beginning and end of the year, the balance of increase or decrease, and a statement of the cause of such balance. The report shall likewise state whether the ordinary expenses of the year have exceeded the income, or the contrary, and show the amount of the balance.

"It shall be the duty of the Auditor to include in his report the items of all accounts of expenditures, so far as they may be useful or interesting to the people of the Commonwealth; and in particular, so far as may be practicable, the various heads of expenditure shall be separated, so as to show the different officers or boards under whose directions the several portions of the expenditure have been incurred; all salaries and other general charges shall likewise be separated so as to show the different classes of officers who receive the several portions of the expenditure; and no expenditure exceeding five hundred dollars shall be included under any indefinite head if it be composed of separate items.

"The Auditor's Report shall annually contain a particular statement of the transactions of the funds belonging to, or held in trust by the Commonwealth, including new investments of any portion of said funds, which may have been made during the preceding year, and also of the manner in which the moiety of the income of the school fund applicable to educational purposes has been disbursed.

"The Auditor shall also include in his report an estimate for the current year of the ordinary revenue of the Commonwealth, and of such other means as he may be able to point out for the defraying of expenditures."

The following Summary Statement shows the receipts into and payments from the treasury during the year, being for account of the year 1870, and previous years. It may be observed that the payments are not limited to and do not include the entire expenses of the year 1870; for these, see Statement No. VIII.

In classifying the accounts I have placed the receipts from and payments of temporary loans, and some other accounts not connected with the *funds*, to the revenue account.

These deductions are made because the Act authorizing the tunnel contract provides for the issue of scrip or certificates of indebtedness to meet the entire expenditure under the contract. When the scrip authorized by existing laws shall have been negotiated, these amounts, as also other large amounts heretofore paid from the revenue, will be reimbursed to the treasury.

TROY AND GREENFIELD RAILROAD AND HOOSAC TUNNEL.

The payments upon this account have been made from the ordinary revenue and temporary loans; none of the scrip authorized to be issued for the construction of the tunnel having been negotiated.

The certificates of conditional indebtedness, issued in 1869, to W. & F. Shanly, amounted to \$340,000, payable, from time to time, as the work progresses upon the tunnel, in such manner as to reserve at all times to the State a guaranty fund of not less than \$500,000 for the full performance of the contract. These certificates were issued in sums of \$20,000 each, and seven of them, amounting to \$140,000, have been paid. The remainder will probably become payable during the current year. The payment of the principal of these certificates, exclusive of interest, is a payment *pro tanto* upon the gross sum named in the contract.

STATE AID.

The labor of examining and auditing the accounts of the cities and towns for payments on this account devolves upon this department.

The following table exhibits the amounts claimed by cities and towns for reimbursement, and the amounts paid them from the treasury, from 1861 to the present time; also, the amounts paid from the treasury to non-residents of the Commonwealth:—

By the Acts of the year 1870, chap. 339, the operation of the State aid laws, with certain modifications, is continued to the first day of January, 1873.

The authority to pay State aid to the families of the slain not residing in the Commonwealth at the date of the passage of the Act of 1866, ceased January 1, 1871. Some of these parties have returned to this Commonwealth, and now reside here; but the law does not authorize a continuance of the aid to them. It will be for the legislature to determine whether the law may not properly be amended so as to include this class of persons within its provisions.

It is understood that said railroad corporations have made provision to meet the first two items at maturity; the latter item will be met from the sinking fund applicable to that loan.

The several sinking funds, and other property applicable by existing laws to the payment of the funded debt, at the market value, are estimated at the sum of \$15,030,642.00. (See Statement I.)

A payment of \$100,000 has been made in the purchase of the site for new hospital buildings at Worcester, which, by the terms of the Act authorizing the payment, is to be refunded to the treasury from future sales of land connected with the present hospital property.

The Act of 1869, chap. 446, authorizing the issue of scrip for the purchase of certain lands and rights of riparian proprietors in the South Boston flats, also stipulates, in effect, that the money paid for such purchase, with interest, shall be reimbursed to the treasury from the proceeds of sales of such lands, and of all lands contained in section one of the South Boston flats, as referred to in section 4, chap. 236 of the Acts of the year 1868.

This Report has, necessarily, been prepared with haste. I must therefore beg the privilege of correcting any error that may be found therein while it is going through the press.
