PREFACE.

THE statutes prescribing the matter and form of the Auditor's Report require the following exhibit:—

First.—A summary statement of receipts and payments for the preceding year; also a detailed and particular statement of receipts and expenditures belonging to each year; the statement of expenditures showing in separate classifications the expenses incurred for the support of all permanent departments, services, and institutions, and those incurred for special and exceptional purposes, the account being so constructed as to show the expenditures incurred within the year, as far as ascertained, whether paid or unpaid at its close.

Second.—A statement showing the aggregate amount of funded debt and of temporary loans at the beginning and end of the year respectively, the balance of increase or decrease thereof, and the cause of such balance; also the excess of the ordinary expenses of the year over the income thereof, or the contrary, and the amount of such balance.

Third.—A statement of the items of all accounts of expenditure, so far as they may possess public interest or value, showing by proper classification the various officers or boards, under whose direction the same have been incurred; also of all salaries, likewise separated, so as to show the different classes of officers receiving the same; and no expenditure exceeding \$500 to be included under any indefinite head, if composed of separate items.

Fourth.—A particular statement of the transactions of the funds belonging to or held in trust by the Commonwealth, and also the manner in which the moiety of the income of the school fund, applicable to educational purposes, has been disbursed.

Fifth.—An estimate for the current year of the ordinary revenue of the Commonwealth, and of such other means as may appear available for the payment of accruing expenses.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

THE following pages contain the Thirty-First Annual Report of this department, the same being for the year ending Dec. 31, 1879.

The form and matter of the Auditor's Report are prescribed by statute, and it has been the practice for several years to reprint, in connection therewith, such portions of the law as would give a full understanding of its requirements in relation to the subject.

For the convenience of those who are not familiar with these requirements, the more important provisions of chapter 178 of the Acts of 1867 are summarized in the Preface on a previous page.

A full and comprehensive history of the public debt and of the several sinking funds established for its liquidation, and a careful review of various other matters intimately connected with the finances of the Commonwealth, will be found in the last Report of my immediate predecessor in office, Hon. Julius L. Clarke.

Any suggestions that might be made here would be but a repetition of his elaborate discussion of the same topics. It is, therefore, deemed sufficient to refer all inquirers concerning them to the Auditor's Report for the year 1878.

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This deficit is not the result of extravagance. As will be shown in its proper place, the expenses of 1879 were less than those of the previous year. But the last legislature, in its very laudable desire to lighten the burdens of taxation, reduced the revenue \$500,000 without a corresponding reduction of expenditures. Hence the deficit which the present legislature must provide for.

Comparative Results.

The expenses of 1879, compared with those of 1878, show the following results:—

It will thus be seen that the reduction in ordinary expenses in 1879, as compared with the same in 1878, was \$245,677.47, while the increase in exceptional expenses was \$156,519.58. The exceptional expenses of 1879 were increased by the following items among others:—

But for these items (only the last of which properly belongs to the expenses of that year) nearly \$554,000 would have been saved to the State by the legislation of 1879 and other causes, and by the rigid economy practised by all branches of the public service.

TROY AND GREENFIELD RAILROAD AND HOOSAC TUNNEL.

By the legislation of 1879 (chap. 141) the financial transactions of the Troy and Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel are made to appear on the books of the State Treasurer and of the Auditor. Under the operation of the above statute the following exhibit is made:—

STATE AND MILITARY AID.

The amount reimbursed to cities and towns for the relief of soldiers, sailors, and their dependants, in 1879, is as follows:—

This is the largest sum paid on this account since the year 1870.

The abuses and irregularities in the administration of the statute of 1878, cited above, led to its repeal in January of last year, and the passage of chap. 252, Acts 1879, as a substitute therefor.

This Act divides the expenditures made under its provisions between the Commonwealth and the cities and towns furnishing the assistance required, each bearing one-half the amount paid. A board of three commissioners, consisting of the Auditor, the Adjutant-General (both serving without compensation), and a third person, appointed by the Governor, was established by this Act, to supervise its administration, and that of all other State-aid laws.

Capt. Charles W. Hastings was appointed third commissioner, and his salary was fixed at \$1,500 per annum in accordance with the law. Chap. 301 of the Acts of 1879 is a revision of chap. 192 of the Acts of 1877.

The work required of the commissioners has been extremely arduous and perplexing.

Capt. Hastings has been constantly employed since his appointment, and the other members of the Board almost daily during a considerable portion of the time, in considering appeals from the decisions of the municipal authorities, and various other matters relating to claims under the laws. The Board have received very great assistance from Surgeon-Gen. Dale, who, having been detailed by the Governor for

that purpose, has examined a large number of applicants under the several statutes relating to State aid and bounties. His ability and long experience in his profession, his tender regard for the worthy soldier, and his skill in detecting impostors, have made his services quite valuable in the administration of these laws.

All payments under both statutes are required to be reported monthly, so that any abuses can be corrected, and illegal or improper expenditures immediately stopped. The disbursements under these laws, down to the close of 1879, show the following results substantially:—

Great care has been taken to administer these statutes in that spirit of liberality and patriotism which will not permit the brave and unfortunate volunteers to come to want on account of services rendered in the war of the Rebellion; and it is believed that no worthy soldier or sailor, or dependent relative, has been deprived of the measure of assistance intended by these laws. A saving of \$75,000 may reasonably be expected on account of this legislation.

The table exhibiting the amount of State aid claimed and reimbursed from the treasury of the Commonwealth is brought down to the close of the year 1879.

THE PUBLIC DEBT.

The funded debt is represented by \$20,498,464 in sterling, and \$12,525,000 in federal bonds, and is classified as follows:—

Which is the same as a year ago.

There are no temporary loans to provide for. No addition has been made to the debt during the year, nor has it been reduced.

An instalment of \$220,000 will mature in May of the present year, and will be paid from its own sinking fund, which is sufficient for the purpose. The maturity of the remaining portions of the debt is shown in the following table:—

It is apparent from the above, that, including the amount to be paid the present year, only \$1,308,000 of the funded debt can be retired before 1888.

This fact, and the further consideration quite as important in its bearing upon the industries of the State, that the interest, amounting to nearly \$1,650,000 (which exceeds the ordinary expenses of 1879, \$100,000), is to be raised annually by taxation, may well be remembered when appeals are made to the legislature to involve the Commonwealth in new enterprises, or to spend the people's money for purposes of doubtful expediency.

Of this increase \$359,151.02 is from sales of Back Bay lands; the remainder has accrued from interest on investments.
