The ordinary expenses of the two years differ in amount less than \$3,000, while the exceptional expenses of 1880 exceed those of 1879 nearly \$480,300.

This difference is more than covered by the amount of corporation and national bank taxes refunded by the Commonwealth to the cities and towns, it being about \$557,000 in 1880 in excess of that of the previous year. Strictly speaking, this transaction is not an expense, as the Commonwealth acts merely as the collector of the taxes so refunded.

*State and Military Aid.*

The wisdom of the legislation of 1879 in relation to the payment of State and military aid has been fully demonstrated by the results of the operation of the laws passed in that year.

Under the Acts of 1877 and 1878, the re-imbursements to cities and towns amounted in 1879 as follows:—

Chap. 192, Acts of 1877 . . . . .	\$368,034 76

These laws were repealed in 1879, chap. 301 of the Acts of that year being a revision of the Act of 1877, and chap. 252 of the Acts of 1879 taking the place of chap. 282 of the Acts of 1878.

The law of 1877 was in force till June 1, 1879, five months; and the amount expended in that time was \$145,322.85, or an average of \$29,064.57 per month. Chap. 301 of 1879 took effect June 1; and the payments under it to

at the end of the year, seven months, amounted to \$181,593.66, or a monthly expenditure of \$25,941.95, — a saving of over \$1,000 per month.

Under chap. 282 of the Acts of 1878, from the 17th of May to the end of that year, there was paid \$157,653.46, or \$22,521.92 per month. Under chap. 252 of 1879, the whole amount paid, from April 23 to the close of the year, was \$4,001.20, or \$8,000.15 monthly. One-half of the amount expended, \$32,000.60, was re-imbursed by the Commonwealth.

The present laws are working satisfactorily, and it is hoped that no material change will be made in them. It is quite probable that the case of every deserving soldier, or his dependent relative, is not covered by the provisions of either of these laws. But it would be far better to provide for such cases by special resolve, in favor of each petitioner to the Legislature, than by a revision of existing statutes. Municipal authorities have become familiar with the forms and requirements of these laws. Their returns are made monthly to the commissioners, and are audited at once, and notice is given them of any disallowances. Fraudulent claims and improper payments are immediately detected and stopped, and at the end of each year all accounts are closed.

Under previous laws, there are now seventy-five cities and towns whose accounts have been running from two to ten years, and are now awaiting the proper vouchers to effect a settlement.

These suggestions are made in the confident belief that the best interests of the Commonwealth will be subserved, and at the same time its patriotic purpose to do justice to the recipients of its generous bounty will be carried out, by leaving the statutes on this subject as they are.



Surgeon-General Dale has personally examined nearly three hundred applicants for State aid during the year, and his services have been very valuable in determining the legality of their claims.

The number of persons aided in 1880, under chap. 301, is 7,069; the number aided under chap. 252 is 1,922.

In this connection, the Auditor deems it proper to repeat the suggestion of the Treasurer in his report of last year, to the effect that the Harbor Improvement Loan of \$400,000 be redeemed by the negotiation of a new loan at a lower rate of interest. It was issued as a 5-20 loan under chap. 320 of the Acts of 1872, and is now payable at the option of the Commonwealth. Its payment will not be peremptory

all 1894, so that a large saving in interest can be effected by a new loan at a lower rate than five per cent; and there is no doubt that such a loan can be easily negotiated.

Until within the last year no anxiety has been felt as to the ability of these funds—with their accumulations, and the amounts expected to be realized from other sources pledged for the purpose—to meet every instalment of the debt at maturity. But the resumption of specie payments, and the increasing confidence in the power and the purpose of the National Government to adhere to that policy, have

brought into the market a great abundance of money for investment at exceptionally low rates of interest. Over \$2,000,000 belonging to these funds are now earning but three per cent per annum. They were established on the basis of six per cent; and, if the present rates continue for a series of years, there will probably be a deficit in several of the funds which future Legislatures will be required to provide for. Only one—the “Prison and Hospital Loan Sinking Fund”—is in that condition at the present time.

The provisions of the law for the endowment of this fund have failed, owing chiefly to the inability of the Commonwealth to sell the State Prison property at Charlestown.

The proceeds of such sale, when made, are to be paid into the treasury as a contribution to the fund under chap. 301 of the Acts of 1874. It also provides, that, if the receipts of the fund from this source do not in any fiscal year amount to a sum equal to three per centum of the total amount of scrip then issued, the difference shall be raised by taxation in the next succeeding year.

The contingency has arisen which necessitates a tax, but the amount to be raised cannot be definitely stated at the present time. Probably it will not much exceed \$100,000.
