AUDITOR'S DEPARTMENT, BOSTON, Jan. 15, 1883.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

I submit the annual report of this department for the year ending December 31, 1882. It has been prepared under the same provisions of law that have been in force on that subject since 1867. They are now embodied in chapter 16 of the Public Statutes.

I have endeavored in this report to simplify the information it contains, by separating the transactions on account of the revenue from those on account of the trust and sinking funds. All the tabulated and detailed statements required by the law to be presented, will be found in their appropriate places, and it is hoped that the arrangement will make the report intelligible to all who may seek information in regard to the financial matters of the Commonwealth.

REVENUE RECEIPTS AND EXPENSES.

The following is a summary of the receipts and expenses on account of revenue, for the year, including cash on hand :

In these aggregates are included the corporation and national bank taxes returned by the Commonwealth to cities and towns, etc.

These should be deducted to show the actual expenses; viz., \$2,275,892.99 in 1882, and \$2,243,437.51 in 1881. With these deductions the expenses of 1882 were \$4,444,495.12, and in 1881, \$4,690,965.97, showing that the expenses of 1882 were \$246,470.85 less than in 1881.

The number of indigent soldiers and sailors aided under chapter 252 was 1,889. The minor child of George C. Dow, a member of the Fortieth Regiment of New York Volunteers, was paid under chapter 56 of the Resolves of 1881.

The surgeon-general examined and made a written report upon the cases of 321 applicants for State aid in 1882, and upon these reports, covering all sorts of ailments, the question as to the disability of the applicant was decided by the commissioners. During the year the "Soldiers' Home" at

Chelsea has been opened. By arrangement with several municipal authorities, twenty-five soldiers and sailors now receiving aid from the Commonwealth have been admitted to the "home" under the rules governing that institution. The expense of supporting them there has generally been less than in the places of their settlement under the law. The result thus far seems to have been entirely satisfactory to all parties. So far as I am informed, the "home" is well managed, as well as kindly management. The beneficiaries are well cared for, and are brought under all the pure and wholesome influences that can surround an institution founded in the spirit of Christian charity for the benefit of the worthy and disabled, but homeless defenders of the Republic.

It is probable that \$264,000 will be asked for to complete the double tracking of the Tunnel Railroad, as that was the amount estimated as necessary last year, in addition to the

appropriation then made. Nothing is included for that purpose in the foregoing estimates.

It is expected that the revenue from savings banks in 1883 will be about \$1,000,000, perhaps a little over that sum. It is made up in this way: \$725,000 on their average taxable deposits, exclusive of the tax on national bank stock owned by them, and the balance on such stock so owned, which, under the law, is retained by the Commonwealth, and is credited in the above estimates to the national banks.

How large a state tax may be required to meet the expenses of the current year and provide for the first six months of 1884, it is impossible now to estimate.

The work of the session is just begun. What special grants or extraordinary expenses the legislature may find necessary to make, the few months to come can alone determine.

The Treasurer had in hand at the beginning of the last year \$1,350,000, in round numbers. He was obliged to borrow \$850,000 in addition, in anticipation of the receipts, making a total of \$2,200,000.

He will need as large a sum at least for the same purposes the current year.

The transactions on account of the funds and all matters relating to the debt of the Commonwealth, will be considered in the proper place near the close of the report.
