AUDITOR'S DEPARTMENT, BOSTON, January 15, 1884.

To the Honorable the Senate and House of Representatives.

The following is the annual report of this department for the year ending December 31, 1883: —

CRITICISMS.

Before presenting the usual financial statements, I deem it proper to say a few words in regard to the administration of this office, lest my silence shall be taken as an admission of the correctness of certain strictures upon it, by His Excellency Governor Butler in the late political campaign.

In his address of acceptance before the convention that nominated him for re-election at Springfield, the governor — referring to the auditor — said, “he does his duty so far as I know, but it is not his duty, unless somebody shows him that there is something wrong in the accounts, to investigate any accounts, and I find that sums of money have been drawn from the treasury to be spent by others without any vouchers, a thing which no man who has that duty to do, and who is held strictly responsible for what is done, would allow to be done without investigation.” This criticism is unwarranted in law and unsustained by the practice in this department. The law declares that the auditor “shall examine and scrutinize all accounts and demands against the Commonwealth” that require his approval, and

the practice conforms to the law and allows no claim or demand without a voucher.

I am forced to the alternative of considering either that it was made in ignorance of the law defining the duties of the auditor, and of the manner in which those duties are performed, or that it was made with a knowledge of both the law and the facts in the matter, with the intention of creating in the minds of the voters of the Commonwealth, a suspicion at least, against the honesty and integrity of the auditor. The criticism seems the more remarkable when the fact is, that not a bill, or a claim allowed by the auditor, can be paid from the treasury without the approval of the governor, and a warrant signed by him authorizing the payment. If, therefore, the auditor is careless, negligent, or corrupt in the discharge of his duty, and the Commonwealth suffers by his acts, the governor, it would seem, can hardly escape from a share of the blame attached to the subordinate officer. The law so guards the treasury that any conspiracy to defraud the Commonwealth by its financial officers, or others, must surely fail, unless the governor joins in the conspiracy or neglects to discharge his duty in the premises.

I may remark in this connection that during Governor Butler's administration, one or more experts spent some months under his direction, in comparing the books of accounts of several officers of the State, with the vouchers in this department, at a total expense of nearly \$600, and I have not learned that any error or discrepancy has been discovered, or that any voucher was missing.

Such a criticism uttered by an ordinary politician in the discussions of a heated party contest, would neither deserve nor receive notice in this place, but coming, as it did, from the governor of the Commonwealth, who, the people have a right to expect, will, in his public capacity at least, treat all questions of law and its administration with judicial candor, and every subordinate officer with fairness, it has seemed proper thus to call attention to the matter.

The books of the auditor, and the manner in which he discharges his duties, are always subject to examination by the legislature, and I shall cheerfully welcome any investigation that may be deemed necessary or advisable, to deter-

as to the truth of the charges above referred to, or the integrity of my administration of this office.

ARRANGEMENT OF THE REPORT.

The arrangement of the report is the same as that of last year. The first part presents the results, in aggregate and in detail, of the transactions on account of revenue, and the several tabulated statements required by law.

The public debt, and the transactions on account of the funds, and other matters relating to the finances of the Commonwealth, will be found near the close of the report.

REVENUE RECEIPTS AND PAYMENTS.

Including cash in the treasury, the following is a summary of the receipts and payments for the year on account of revenue:—

Statement No. II., pages 22 and 23, exhibits a general summary of the sources of the revenue.

The revenue payments for the year will be found in Statement No. IV.

These four Statements give a comprehensive exhibit of the financial transactions on account of the revenue for the year 1883.

COMPARATIVE RESULTS.

The auditor is required to make a summary statement of revenue received, and expenses, paid and unpaid, belonging to the years 1882 and 1883. This information is embodied in Statement No. V., covering revenue actually received, and expenses, paid and unpaid, so far as they are known

to this department. The statement shows the following results:—

From these aggregates, the corporation and national bank taxes—collected by the Commonwealth under the provisions of law, and paid over to the cities and towns to which they belong—should be deducted to show actual results:—

The amount for 1882 was \$2,275,892.99, and for 1883, \$2,195,574.65. Making these deductions, the expenses were, for 1883, \$4,730,149.34, and for 1882, \$4,489,418.70, exhibiting an excess in 1883 over 1882 of \$240,730.59.

There will probably be added to the expenses of 1883 about \$90,000 for the completion of work on public buildings from the unexpended appropriations of that year. It is sometimes said that the annual expenses of the State are over \$6,000,000. To correct this error—often made in political discussions—I have introduced here a statement of the principal expenses of 1883, which nearly cover the aggregate given above:

ESTIMATED AND ACTUAL REVENUE.

The following statement shows the estimated and actual revenue belonging to the year 1883, and the sources from which it was derived. From this it will be seen that, aside from the direct State tax of \$1,500,000, the sum of \$2,882,412.57 was raised. Of this amount, \$2,608,594.69 in the aggregate was received from corporations, national banks, insurance companies, State prison, savings banks, liquor licenses, and the Tunnel railroad:—

In view of the needs of the sinking fund to protect the funded debt on account of the tunnel and railroad—and which will appear in another place—it becomes a question of immediate and pressing importance as to the best means to adopt in order to realize the largest benefit from this enterprise.

Average amount paid each person, \$46.62 per year. The number of indigent soldiers who received aid under chapter 301 was 1,956. The average amount paid by the State to each person, was \$40.34 per year, and including amount paid by cities and towns, each received \$80.68 per year. The surgeon-general has rendered efficient and valuable service in the examination of applicants for State aid.

The number of cases that have been reported upon by him during the year is 271.

The legislature of last year having made a grant of \$15,000 to the trustees of the "Soldiers' Home" at Chelsea, for the maintenance of that institution, the Commissioners of State aid decided not to allow further aid from the Commonwealth

to those persons who have formerly received it in the several cities and towns, but who are now supported at the "house."

The provisions of law for the payment of State aid to invalid pensioners and their dependent relatives will expire with the year 1884.

It will therefore be necessary for the present legislature to take action upon the matter, if authority to continue this patriotic and beneficent charity is to exist after that time.

His Excellency the Governor, in his inaugural address, having advised an extension of the time, the Commissioners of State Aid are glad to second the suggestion, as the best course to pursue. Practical experience of over four years has shown that the present law is as nearly perfect as legislative wisdom can be expected to devise for the purposes contemplated. Cases of necessity are rare indeed that are not covered by the present law, and whenever they have appeared, the legislature has shown a willingness to grant relief by special resolves.

Estimates for 1884.

In preparing the schedule of estimates for the current year, I assume that the revenue laws will remain as they now are. Any legislation that abolishes or reduces the present sources of revenue will shift the burden to other classes of property less able to bear it, perhaps, and make a larger direct State tax an imperative necessity.

In estimating the expenses, I am guided by the experience and judgment of those who are most familiar with the necessities of the several branches of the public service.

I have included only such expenses for the current year as are actually needed under existing laws. Last year the sum of \$100,000 was raised by taxation and paid to the Prison and Hospital Loan Sinking Fund, as required by chapter 391 of the acts of 1874.

Careful computations made by the treasurer on the basis of four per cent. per annum, compounded semi-annually, show that a much larger sum should be raised every year, till the maturity of the debt for the payment of which this fund was established, to make the fund what it ought to be. To effect this increase, additional legislation will be required, and, therefore, I have omitted this item in the estimates. Similiar computations made by the treasurer show that over \$668,600 will be required annually till 1891, to meet the deficiency in the Troy and Greenfield Railroad Sinking Fund.

This, then, is the financial condition that confronts the legislature.

The end of the year will show — as appears by the estimates — a deficit of \$161,848.48.

The deficit shown at this time, a year ago, was \$88,578.13. A State tax of \$1,500,000 was levied in 1883.

The treasurer had in hand at the beginning of the year in round numbers, \$1,793,900, and borrowed during the year \$700,000. On the first of January of the present year he has in hand \$1,530,551.36.

It must be apparent to all that a tax of \$2,000,000 will be required to meet the needs of the treasury for the year 1884 and provide for the first six months of 1885, aside

from the wants of the sinking funds above named, and any additional amounts that may result from the legislation of the present year.
