AUDITOR'S DEPARTMENT, BOSTON, JANUARY 29, 1885.

To the Honorable the Senate and House of Representatives.

The Auditor's Department was established by chapter 56 of the Acts of 1849.

By the fourth section of the act, the Auditor was required to submit his annual report to the legislature, on or before the fifteenth day of January in each year.

The same provision has continued in force for thirty-five years, and is section seven of chapter sixteen of the Public Statutes.

The legislature of 1884, by chapter 207 of its acts, repealed said section and passed the following act as an amendment, viz. : —

“On or before the thirtieth day of January in each year, the auditor of accounts shall submit in print or otherwise, to the general court, an abstract of his report for the early use of the legislature, exhibiting a full and accurate statement of the financial condition of the Commonwealth and of the pecuniary transactions thereof, during the year ending on the last day of the preceding month. And his report in detail shall be submitted in print as soon thereafter as may be.”

A very brief statement of the business of the department in the earlier years of its history, in comparison with the present demands upon it, will illustrate the necessity of this change in the law.

The first report of the Auditor for 1849 showed : —

Receipts into the treasury from all sources,	\$1,078,340 85
Payments out of the treasury for all purposes,	\$1,057,406 93

The statements in detail, required by law, of the transactions involved in these aggregates, made a printed pamphlet of thirty-seven pages. It contained, in addition to these matters, a full and comprehensive statement of the financial transactions of the Commonwealth for the eighteen previous years, which swelled the report to seventy-two pages.

The aggregate receipts into the treasury for the first nine years, till 1858, were \$19,705,016.13, and the payments were \$19,508,405.71, and the reports for each year averaged less than fifty-four printed pages.

In 1858, the present financial system, substantially, was instituted, and the duties of the Auditor were thereby very greatly increased. The report for that year showed:—

and the report made a document of two hundred and fifty-seven pages, but it was not submitted to the legislature within the time limited by the law, for the reason that it was impossible to do so.

And since that year, no one holding the office has been able to comply with the law in this regard. Representations to this effect have been frequently made to the legislature by my predecessors in office, but without avail. Consequently, it has been the necessary practice, to submit an abstract of the report, hastily prepared, on the 15th of January of each year, and the full report has followed some months thereafter. In the meantime the business of the office has been constantly increasing.

The report for 1883, in comparison with the aggregates of the reports for the first nine years given above, shows the following results of the transactions of the revenue and the several funds in a single year:—

The report makes a document of three hundred and eighty-three pages.

But relief has come at last, through the amendment of the statute quoted in these remarks, and the Auditor need not be

hereafter a helpless violator of the law defining his official duties in this regard.

I now submit the annual report of this department for the year ending December 31, 1884.

ARRANGEMENT OF THE REPORT.

The first part of the report presents the transactions in aggregate and in detail, on account of revenue, and the several tabulated statements required by law.

The second part exhibits the transactions on account of the funds, the public debt and all matters relating thereto, and a schedule of the productive and unproductive property of the Commonwealth.

REVENUE RECEIPTS AND PAYMENTS.

The following is a summary of the revenue receipts, including the cash in the treasury, and of the payments during the year:—

ESTIMATED AND ACTUAL REVENUE.

In the following table is presented the estimated revenue at the beginning of the year 1884, the amount actually received, and the several sources from which it was derived.

It will be seen that aside from the direct State tax of \$2,000,000, the larger part of the revenue came from corporations, the national banks, savings banks, insurance companies and their agents, State prison, liquor licenses, and the Tunnel railroad:—

The actual revenue for 1884 is obtained from Statement No. II., and shows the net amount received, after making the necessary deductions of taxes returned to cities and towns. The table will be convenient for ready reference for information in relation to the revenue and our system of taxation.

Troy and Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel.

Under the authority given by chapter 48 of the Resolves of 1883, the Governor and Council, during the year 1884, obtained a release to the Commonwealth of the entire right and interest which the Troy and Greenfield Railroad Company had or claimed, in the Troy and Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel, including the Southern Vermont Railroad and the franchises to operate the property.

The amount agreed upon for the release was three hundred thousand dollars.

The amount actually paid during the year in pursuance of the agreement was \$268,504.02; and this amount should appear in the financial statement as a part of the cost of the tunnel enterprise.

No appropriation from the treasury of the Commonwealth is asked for, for the current year.

State and Military Aid.

The provisions of law for the payment of State aid to invalid pensioners and their dependent relatives expired with the year 1884.

To meet this emergency and extend the time, the legislature of 1884 passed the following act, it being chapter 34 of the acts of that year, viz.:—

“The limitation of time for the payment of state aid, named in sections two and nine of chapter 30 of the Public Statutes, is hereby extended to the first day of January, eighteen hundred and ninety; and all the provisions of said chapter in any way relating to the payment of state aid to invalid pensioners and their dependent relatives, shall remain and continue in force as they now are, till the said first day of January, eighteen hundred and ninety.”

The amounts reimbursed by the Commonwealth in 1884, to cities and towns for payments made by them in 1883, on account of State and military aid, are shown in the following statement:—

The average amount paid each person was \$45.33 per year. The number of indigent soldiers who received aid under chapter 252 in 1883, was 1,850. The average amount paid by the Commonwealth to each person, was \$37.66 per year. If the amount paid by the several cities and towns be added to this sum, each person received \$75.32 for the year.

Surgeon-General Holt has been in daily attendance upon the Commissioners, and has rendered faithful and valuable service in the examination of applicants for State aid.

The number of cases reported upon by him during the year is 318.

The aggregate number of persons who received State aid under chapter 301 in 1883, was 379 less than in 1882, and the number who received aid under chapter 252 was 106 less than in the previous year. The reimbursements for 1883 were less than for 1882 by \$33,725.77.

The Commissioners of State aid, with the approval of the governor, as authorized under section 18 of chapter 30 of the Public Statutes, appointed Mr. William P. Innis to visit the cities and towns to investigate the manner in which the laws are administered, and to make a personal examination of the parties receiving assistance from the Commonwealth. His reports from time to time have revealed very marked irregularities and carelessness on the part of city and town authorities. Persons have been paid State aid who are the owners of houses and lands from which they were receiving handsome incomes, or who have considerable deposits in savings banks and other institutions, showing conclusively that the local officers paid but little attention to the plain requirements of the law, that the recipients of State aid must be in necessitous circumstances, in order to claim relief from the public treasury. Officers of cities and towns are

required by the law to make return monthly of the amounts actually paid the previous month. This return is made under oath, and yet several instances have been reported of returns having been sent to the Commissioners month after month, of payments made to different parties, when not a dollar has been paid to them. In one instance it was discovered that over four hundred and fifty dollars had been returned as paid, extending over a period of from one month to nineteen months, and yet no money had passed out of the hands of the treasurer to the parties named in the return. One of these parties has been absent from the Commonwealth for more than a year, and his State aid, amounting to \$76.00, has remained in an envelope awaiting his return.

In all cases of this kind the Commissioners deduct the amount from the return as soon as discovered.

Attention has been called to such irregularities by circular letters to, and personal interviews with, municipal authorities, and it is hoped that such practices will not be repeated.

Estimates for 1885.

The estimated expenses for the current financial year, exceed those for 1884 by more than a half million of dollars.

This excess is due almost entirely to the legislation of last year, the principal items of which are as follows: —

This deficit shows the actual wants of the treasury for the current year, in excess of the estimated revenue.

To this amount must be added whatever sums may be required for special grants, or exceptional expenditures, resulting from the legislation of the present session of the General Court.

It must also be borne in mind, that no provision has been made in the foregoing estimates for the expenses of 1886, in anticipation of the revenue of that year. The treasurer borrowed \$1,100,000 in 1884, to meet similar needs of the public service in that year. This may seem to be a large amount, but it must not be forgotten that since the reduction of the tax on savings bank deposits, the revenue for the first six months of the year has fallen off very materially. The first instalment of this tax, due in June, has been till recent years the main reliance of the treasurer for revenue. The

average amount of the tax for six years previous to 1882, was in round numbers \$1,633,000, one-half of which, say \$800,000, was paid in June of each year. The average amount for the last three years was \$827,000, a reduction of one-half the tax; and the amount received on this account in June, 1884, was in round numbers \$390,000. The whole subject is submitted to the careful consideration of the legislature, without further suggestions, as the amount to be raised by a direct State tax will depend entirely upon the results of its mature deliberation.
