The balance, \$300,854.83, was paid on loans for public buildings, etc.

The expenses on account of the reformatory and correctional institutions show an increase of \$125,311.66 in 1885, over the expenses of those institutions in 1884.

This increase arises from the opening of the Massachusetts Reformatory at Concord.

The income from said institutions was about the same in 1885 as in 1884, being a little more than \$100,000 in each year.

ESTIMATED AND ACTUAL REVENUE.

The actual revenue received in 1885 is obtained from Statement No. II., and shows the net amount after making the necessary deductions of taxes distributed to cities and towns under the law. The cities of Boston and New Bedford have not paid the national bank taxes. When paid, the discrepancy between the estimated and actual revenue from bank taxes will to a great extent disappear. The amount withheld by those cities is over \$500,000.

TROY AND GREENFIELD RAILROAD AND HOOSAC TUNNEL.

No appropriation from the treasury was made for this railroad by the legislature of 1885; but an unexpended balance of the appropriation of the previous year was used, to the amount of a little more than \$25,400, as appears in the appended statement. In the item of payments from the income of the road, the sum of \$23,940.52 is included, on account of certain claims resulting from an accident at North Adams in 1882.

UNCLAIMED DIVIDENDS OF INSOLVENT SAVINGS BANKS, ETC.

Chapter 258 of the Acts of 1883 limits the time for the payment of unclaimed dividends of certain insolvent corporations, deposited by the receivers of such corporations, by order of the court, with the treasurer of the Commonwealth, to two years from the time of such deposit and notice thereof to the parties interested. The following corporations have come under the operation of this limitation during the year, and the amounts paid and unpaid on account of each are shown.

No claims for dividends of the insurance companies above named have ever been presented.

The unpaid dividends of the several savings banks consist of a large number of sums, varying in amounts from three

cents to say perhaps five dollars. The largest single claim is a little more than \$800. The person entitled to it resides in a distant State, is partially insane, and refuses to send the deposit book to this department, or file an application for the money. It is probable that friends of this person will apply to the legislature for the amount due.

The unpaid dividends, as shown, have reverted to the treasury, under the law.

STATE AID AND BOUNTIES.

The following amendments were made to the State Aid law by the legislature of 1885, viz.: Chapter 173 of its Acts provides that all soldiers who were members of regiments and organizations of Massachusetts militia, and known as the three-months troops of the year 1861, are made eligible to receive State or military aid under the provisions, conditions and limitations of chapter 30 of the Public Statutes. Under this amendment, one soldier has been allowed State aid during the year. Chapter 204 provides that State aid may be paid to the widow of any soldier, sailor or marine described in the second section of chapter 30 of the Public Statutes, who was married to said soldier, sailor or marine before the ninth day of April, 1870, and who is otherwise qualified to receive State aid under the provisions, limitations and restrictions of said chapter 30.

Under this amendment fifty-three widows have been allowed State aid during the year.

If to this amount the interest at five per cent. on the State Aid payments should be added, the aggregate would reach over \$59,000,000.

These figures conclusively answer the charge sometimes made, that Massachusetts has not kept faith with the brave men who honored her and immortalized themselves in the carnage of civil war.

The Commissioners of State Aid will ask the legislature for authority to employ more than one person to visit the cities and towns and investigate the manner in which the State Aid laws are administered. The glaring irregularities discovered by the partial investigations they have made in the last two years convince them that greater economy and efficiency will be secured by the employment of additional assistance. A few instances of the careless methods pursued

by city and town authorities in disbursing State aid may be given, as reported to the Commissioners by their special agent, Mr. W. P. Innis.

In one town a poor but deserving soldier died, leaving a widow entitled to State aid. The soldier was buried at the expense of the town, and most of the allowance to the widow for several months was used by the selectmen to pay the burial expenses. In another town a soldier was permitted to sell to a broker, at a large discount, his own State aid and that of his widowed mother, without her knowledge, for five years, in advance, and then went into business in another State. The broker has collected the State aid on an order for nearly five years.

A soldier receiving State aid in still another town, recently started in business in the West, and requested the selectmen of the town to send the amount allowed him to his mother, living in a distant city. It was so sent for one month, but as soon as the fact was made known to the Commissioners the payment was disallowed.

In one of the large cities the official having charge of the disbursement of State aid knowingly paid it to the friends of several deceased widows, for some months, and appropriated to his own use the amount allowed to one deceased widow for seventeen months, forging the signature of the dead to protect himself from discovery in this ghastly business. The whole amount unlawfully paid and appropriated by this official was \$296.

He was arrested and held for trial, but forfeited his bail and left the Commonwealth. These are but samples of the careless and unlawful way in which this noble charity is sometimes administered.

If the legislature will allow the additional assistance needed, the Commissioners believe they can put a stop to all such proceedings.

Estimates for 1886.

In estimating the expenses of the current year, great reliance must of necessity be placed in the judgment and experience of those who have in charge the several departments of the public service.

The estimates of the revenue are based on existing laws, although some embarrassment is occasioned by the opposition of the national banks to the law imposing a tax upon the shares of their capital stock.

Many of the banks have paid the taxes of 1885 under protest, and it is understood that the constitutionality of the law is to be tested in the United States Court.

Assuming that the foregoing estimates are substantially correct, the treasury will be empty at the end of the current year, and there will be outstanding bills and claims against the Commonwealth of \$680,000 or more, with no provision for their payment.

The means to cover this deficit must be supplied by the legislature. It will be required, also, to make provision for the expenses of 1887, in anticipation of the revenue of that year, and to provide for any exceptional expenditures or special grants that may result from the legislation of the present year.

At the beginning of the year 1885 the estimates showed a deficit of \$491,700.11, and there was cash in the treasury \$1,700,000 in round numbers. The direct State tax of 1885 was \$1,500,000. The treasurer borrowed during the year \$1,100,000.

At the beginning of the year 1886 there is an estimated deficit of \$680,000, and there is cash on hand \$1,394,142.98.

The amount of the direct State tax of 1886 can only be determined near the close of the present session of the legislature.

More Room Wanted.

The attention of the legislature is called to the necessity of providing other accommodations for the State Aid department. It now occupies one of the rooms in which the records, vouchers and other papers of the Auditor's department are deposited.

This room should not be constantly open to the public, as the vouchers and other valuable papers on the files are liable to be taken away or destroyed, either by accident or design, by persons who have business with the State Aid Commissioners almost every hour of the day. All the available space is now taken up by desks of the clerical force, and by tables piled with boxes and State aid papers. The cases for the Auditor's files are full, and it is difficult to arrange them in systematic order for ready reference.

As the Auditor's department is the lawful repository of original bills, vouchers and other important and valuable papers, ample provision should be made for their safe keeping and preservation.

In concluding these remarks in connection with the revenue transactions of the year, I deem it proper to mention the fact that Col. Edward S. Davis, who has been a clerk in this department for twenty-four years, has completed his service. He has been a most faithful and efficient officer, has done excellent work in the State Aid department, and retires because the special business in which he has been employed is practically finished.

It is also worthy of notice here that another clerk, — Mr. Benjamin C. Piper, — who has been in the employ of the Commonwealth for thirty-three years, the latter part of the time in this department, is now kept from his desk by a distressing malady which, I regret to say, may permanently retire him from the service. It is but justice to one who has served the public so long, to say that he has been conspicuous

for his industry, his fidelity and his integrity in the several positions which he has occupied.

The Debt and the Several Funds.

The consideration of matters relating to the debt of the Commonwealth, and the transactions on account of the several sinking and other funds, will be found in the proper place, near the close of the report, immediately following Revenue Statement No. VII.
