To the Honorable the Senate and House of Representatives.

I have the honor to present the thirty-eighth annual report of this department, it being for the year ending December 31, 1886.

ARRANGEMENT OF THE REPORT.

The first part of the report exhibits, summarily and in detail, the revenue transactions of the year, arranged and tabulated in exact conformity to the requirements of chapter 16 of the Public Statutes.

The second part shows in like manner the transactions on account of the several sinking funds, also of the trust and other funds, and contains full information upon all matters of interest relating to the public debt.

REVENUE RECEIPTS AND PAYMENTS.

The receipts and payments on account of revenue for the year, including cash in the treasury, are summarily shown in the following statement : —

It will be noticed that the actual net receipts from corporation taxes in the above table were more than \$330,000 less than the estimate, and that the net receipts from bank taxes were more than \$650,000 in excess of the estimate. The difference in the first instance is accounted for by the fact that a large amount of corporation taxes was returned to cities and towns in 1886 that belonged to the city and town settlements of 1885. And in the case of bank taxes, the amount withheld by Boston and New Bedford in 1885 (almost \$550,000) was paid in 1886, and is included in the net receipts stated above.

GENERAL STATEMENT.

The expenses of 1886 are given below in a general grouping, which embraces all the departments and the public purposes for which appropriations were made by the last Legislature.

TROY AND GREENFIELD RAILROAD AND HOOSAC TUNNEL.

Under chapter 74 of the Resolves of 1886, the sum of \$2,543.00 was paid from the treasury to Edward C. Hawkes of Charlemont, in settlement of a suit for damages caused by the placing of infected swine on his premises some years ago, by persons in the employ of the manager of the Troy and Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel. The suit was discontinued without costs to either party upon the payment of the money. No other appropriation from the treasury, chargeable to this railroad, was made in 1886. All other payments were made from its earnings and include a large amount for personal damages, resulting from the accident near Bardwell's Ferry, in April last. STATE AID.

By chapter 39 of the Acts of 1886, it is provided that "All soldiers who were members of the regiments and organizations of Massachusetts volunteer militia known as one hundred days' troops, who were mustered into the service of the United States in the year eighteen hundred and sixty-four, shall be deemed to have served to the credit of this Commonwealth, and are hereby made eligible to receive State and military aid under the conditions, provisions and limitations contained in chapter thirty of the Public Statutes."

Under this act eight soldiers have been added to the list of recipients of State and military aid during the year.

The amounts reimbursed by the Commonwealth in 1886, to cities and towns for payments made by them in 1885, on account of State and military aid, are shown in the following statement:—

The average amount paid by the Commonwealth to each person under chapter 301 was \$44.70.

The number of indigent soldiers and sailors who received aid under chapter 252 was 1,876. The average amount paid by the Commonwealth to each person was \$40.20. Add the amount paid by cities and towns under chapter 252 and the sum received by each person averages \$80.40 for the year.

The number of applicants for State aid examined, and the cases reported upon by Surgeon-General Holt during the year was 343.

The aggregate number of persons who received State aid in 1885 was thirty-three more than in 1884, and the number who were aided under chapter 252 was fifty-one more than in 1884.

The reimbursements for 1885 amount to \$7,107.24 more than for the year 1884.

Chapter 110 of the Acts of 1886 authorizes the Commissioners of State Aid, with the approbation of the Governor,

to appoint one or more persons to examine persons aided under the laws, and investigate the reasons therefor, and all matters relating to the payment of such aid.

Only one person has been employed, or could be appointed under the original law of 1879. During the last year the Commissioners employed three special agents, who visited most of the cities and towns, and made thorough investigations in all cases where there was doubt or uncertainty as to the justice or propriety of granting State aid.

Their work was well done, and produced very satisfactory results.

ESTIMATES FOR 1887.

The estimates of the expenses for the current year are largely based upon the reports submitted to the Auditor by the officers and boards having charge of the several branches of the public service, under the provisions of chapter 41 of the Acts of 1885.

The estimates of the revenue are based upon existing laws in relation to licenses, fees, the income of certain institutions, etc., and the taxation of property.

In the foregoing statement the estimated earnings (\$425,000) and expenses (\$270,000) of the Troy and Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel are included. Since the aggregates were made public in the inaugural address of the Governor, negotiations have resulted in the disposal of that property to the Fitchburg Railroad Company by the Governor and Council, under the provisions of chapter 297 of the Acts of 1885. The title passes to the company February 1 of the present year.

Assuming that the sale will be consummated by the transfer of the title as stated, the following changes may be made in the estimates for the year:—

This deficit is the largest since 1876, and is \$630,555.22 in excess of that of 1886.

The means to cover this deficit must be supplied by the Legislature. The cash on hand is \$568,956.67 less than at the beginning of the year 1886. A direct State tax of \$2,000,000 or more—depending upon the aggregate amount of special expenditures and grants that may result from the action of the present Legislature—will be required to meet the expenditures of the year and make provision for the expenses of 1888, in anticipation of the revenue for that year.

LEGISLATION SUGGESTED.

Chapter 354 of the Acts of 1886 establishes the office of Fire Marshal of the city of Boston. Section 6 of the act is as follows:—

On the 1st of May of each year, on presentation of proper vouchers and accounts, the treasurer of the Commonwealth shall pay to the treasurer of the city of Boston the salary of the said fire marshal, and the expenses incurred during the preceding calendar year in prosecuting his investigations in the manner above mentioned: *provided, however,* that the said payment made by the treasurer of the Commonwealth shall in no case exceed in amount twenty-five per cent. of the tax collected by the Commonwealth on premiums received by insurance companies for writing fire risks in the city of Boston during the preceding calendar year.

The act makes no provision for ascertaining the amount of fire premiums received by insurance companies for writing fire risks in the city of Boston, and there is no law requiring insurance companies or their agents to report the

amount of premiums so received to any department of the government.

Additional legislation is necessary to enable the Auditor to certify to the Governor and Council the amount to be paid to the treasurer of the city of Boston, under the section of the law quoted above. In this connection I would call attention to a provision in an act to incorporate the "Boston Protective Department" (chapter 61, Acts of 1874, section 5), which requires that insurance companies and agents shall semi-annually return to the treasurer of that corporation the aggregate amount of premiums received by them for business done in the city of Boston during the previous six months, to provide the means for defraying the expenses of that corporation. The necessary legislation in regard to the matter in question may be obtained by an amendment of either of the acts referred to above.

Additional legislation seems to be necessary, also, to provide office accommodations for the agents of discharged convicts.

In the original act authorizing the appointment of the agent (chapter 176 of the Acts of 1845) provision was made for an office in the "town of Charlestown or in the city of Boston."

This provision was embodied in chapter 179 of the General Statutes (revision of 1860), and was continued until the present Board of Commissioners of Prisons was established under chapter 294 of the Acts of 1879. By this act the provision for an office was — inadvertently, it is believed — repealed.

There are no rooms in the State House or in the Commonwealth building that can be utilized for the purpose required, and there is no law to authorize the leasing of an office or paying the rent thereof, except the act annually appropriating money for the purpose of assisting discharged convicts. Expenditures of this character should be authorized by an explicit and permanent provision of law.

An increase of the salary of the second clerk in this department is suggested as worthy of the favorable consideration of the Legislature. The gentleman who holds that position served the Commonwealth faithfully on the

battle-fields of the late rebellion, and during recent years has been employed in this department. He is a most capable and efficient officer, and his duties are arduous and constantly increasing. His compensation should be equal, at least, to that of any clerk of the same grade in the service of the Commonwealth.

THE PUBLIC DEBT AND THE SEVERAL FUNDS.

All matters relating to the public debt and the transactions on account of the several sinking funds and other funds and accounts will be considered in their proper place, near the end of the report, immediately following Revenue Statement No. VII.
