To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

I have the honor to present the fortieth annual report of this department, it being for the year ending Dec. 31, 1888.

ARRANGEMENT OF THE REPORT.

The report consists of two parts. The first part exhibits, summarily and in detail, the revenue transactions of the year, tabulated and arranged in exact conformity to the requirements of chapter 16 of the Public Statutes.

The second part shows in like manner the transactions on account of the several sinking funds, also of the trust and other funds, and contains full information upon all matters of public interest relating to the funded debt. And first of revenue transactions.

REVENUE RECEIPTS AND PAYMENTS.

The above table is made from Statement No. I., page 22. The cash in the treasury January 1 was not included in the column of estimates for the year. An examination of the item of actual net revenue from "bank stock taxes" may lead to misapprehension, if not explained. The gross receipts from bank taxes amounted to \$1,062,275.29. The amount distributed to savings banks, etc., under the laws, was \$1,078,952.81, or \$16,677.52 in excess of the amount received. The actual amount of the bank taxes of 1888, so distributed, was \$613,821.40, leaving \$448,453.89 net reve-

nue, as shown above. In addition to the amount of the taxes of 1888 distributed, there was also distributed the sum of \$465,131.41, which sum was held by the treasurer of the Commonwealth at the date of my last report, awaiting the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States upon the question of the constitutionality of our law taxing the stock of national banks. The court sustained the law, and the amount held by the treasurer was distributed, thus swelling the payments on this account to \$1,078,952.81 in 1888, as appears in Statement No. I., on page 25.

GENERAL STATEMENT OF EXPENSES.

The expenses of 1888 are given in a general grouping, which embraces all the departments and the public purposes for which appropriations were made by the last Legislature.

Such details of the business of the year as can be presented within the proper limits of the text, will follow this statement.

PRISON INDUSTRIES.

The State Prison at Boston (Charlestown district) is the only State institution in which the prisoners have been employed under the requirements of chapter 447 of the Acts of 1887.

The books and accounts of the institutions named above, eight in number,—have been kept under my supervision since Oct. 1, 1887, as directed by chapter 87 of the Acts of

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that year. The system adopted has given very general satisfaction to the officers and to all persons having dealings with them. In some of the institutions no material change was necessary, as the books were in good condition and properly kept. In others such changes were made as the law required, in order that, as nearly as possible, the system might be uniform in all of them.

A farm account has been opened and kept at seven of these institutions. It is very simple and requires that the farm shall be charged with everything paid out or furnished for it, and credited with what is consumed at the institution and for cash sales of its products.

The results show a profit in favor of the farm at each institution as follows:—

TROY AND GREENFIELD RAILROAD AND HOOSAC TUNNEL.

The sale of the Commonwealth's interest in the Troy and Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel and in the Southern Vermont Railroad, was completed Feb. 1, 1887, under the authority given to the Governor and Council by chapter 297 of the Acts of 1885. The claims of the Commonwealth for tolls against the Fitchburg Railroad Company, and for rents due from the Troy and Boston Railroad Company, are now in court, and will probably be disposed of during the year 1889. STATE AID AND BOUNTIES.

The limitation of time for the payment of State aid to invalid pensioners and their dependent relatives will expire Jan. 1, 1890. The payment of State aid began with the war of the Rebellion, and has continued without interruption ever since. It will be the agreeable duty of the present Legislature to consider the expediency and wisdom of revising the existing laws, to the end that this patriotic and noble charity may be continued still longer to those who served in that war on the quota of the Commonwealth, and to their families.

The average amount paid by the Commonwealth to each person, under chapter 301, was \$44.57.

INDIGENT SOLDIERS AND SAILORS.

The number of indigent soldiers and sailors who received aid in 1887, under chapter 252, was 1,816. The average amount paid by the Commonwealth to each person was \$40.06.

The cities and towns paid the same amount that was paid by the Commonwealth to each person, making the average \$80.12 for the year.

Surgeon-General Holt examined 282 applicants for State aid during the year.

The aggregate number of persons who received State aid in 1887, under chapter 301, was 6,650. The number in 1886 was 6,471, or 179 less than in 1887. The number of persons aided under chapter 252 in 1887 was 1,816. The number aided in 1886 was 1,809, or 7 less than in 1887. The amount reimbursed for 1887 was \$7,375.44 only, in excess of that for 1886.

TOTAL PAYMENTS OF STATE AID.

As the whole subject of revising the State aid laws will be considered by the Legislature now in session, I submit the following statement—detailed by years—of the amount reimbursed to cities and towns by the Commonwealth, and also the amounts paid directly from the treasury under special resolves, from 1861 to the close of the year 1888:—

Of the balance in the treasury, the sum of \$523,800 was received late in December from the loan at three per cent. authorized by chapter 349 of the Acts of 1888 for the purchase of land in rear of the State House. No provision was made for establishing a sinking fund for the payment of this loan, due in 1901, and therefore the money must appear as a part of the revenue until otherwise disposed of. The value of the land taken under the Act will doubtless exceed the above amount, and payments will be called for as soon as the titles are found to be good.

The deficit, as estimated above, — \$861,455.51, — is \$857,164.38 less than at the beginning of the year 1888. It will be the duty of the Legislature to provide the means to meet this deficit, and, in addition, to provide for the payment of whatever special expenditures may be authorized during its present session.

THE PUBLIC DEBT AND THE SEVERAL FUNDS.

All matters relating to the public debt and the transactions on account of the several sinking funds and other funds and accounts will be considered in their proper place, near the end of the report, immediately following Revenue Statement No. VII.
