To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

I have the honor to present the forty-second annual report of this department, it being for the year ending Dec. 31, 1890.

# ARRANGEMENT OF THE REPORT.

The report is in two parts. Part I exhibits, summarily and in detail, the revenue transactions of the year, tabulated and arranged in exact conformity to the requirements of chapter 16 of the Public Statutes.

Part II shows, in like manner, the transactions on account of the several sinking funds; also of the trust and other funds, and contains full information upon all matters of public interest relating to the funded debt. And first of revenue transactions.

The above table is made from Statement No. I., page 26. The cash in the treasury January 1 was not included in the column of estimates for the year.

The actual revenue shows an excess over the estimates of \$571,988 23. Of this excess \$251,531.77 was on account of Corporation taxes, \$113,060.44 on account of Savings bank taxes, \$68,347.59 on account of taxes on National bank stock, and \$51,309.62 from liquor licenses. The balance of the excess, less than \$100,000.00, came from several other sources. The revenue in detail is shown in Statement No. III.

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The books and accounts of the eight institutions above named have been kept under the supervision of the Auditor since 1887, as is required by chapter 87 of the Acts of that year. Under the system adopted, very satisfactory results have been secured. The receipts and expenditures of each institution are entered in detail, and all information concerning the financial transactions therewith is easily obtained from the officer in charge.

# PRISON INDUSTRIES.

The State Prison at Boston (Charlestown district), the Massachnsetts Reformatory at Concord and the Reformatory Prison for Women at Sherborn have all employed prisoners under the requirements of chapter 447 of the Acts of 1887, during the year 1890.

# BALLOTS FOR THE NOVEMBER ELECTION.

The expense for the printing and distributing of ballots for use at the State election in November last was less than

in 1889. Under chapter 413 of the Acts of 1889, two sets of ballots, "each of not less than one hundred for every fifty and fraction of fifty registered male voters in each voting place," were provided at the public expense. Chapter 436 of the Acts of 1890 reduced the number of ballots to sixty in each set for every fifty and fraction of fifty of such registered voters. The number of official ballots printed under this act was 1,000,000 as against 1,644,200 under the Act of 1889.

Sixteen new ballot boxes were provided; as follows: For the city of Chicopee four boxes, the city of Pittsfield three, the city of Marlborough six, the city of Newton one, and for the towns of Billerica and Royalston one each; but these boxes are not to be included as part of the expenses resulting from the new law. # TROY & GREENFIELD RAILROAD AND HOOSAC TUNNEL.

Nearly four years have elapsed since the sale of this railroad and tunnel by the Commonwealth to the Fitchburg Railroad Company was effected, and the account with this enterprise is not yet closed. There are still outstanding 1,200 shares of the capital stock of the corporation, which the Commonwealth will buy when offered for sale at eight dollars per share, as authorized by chapter 48 of the Resolves of 1883. No shares have been bought during the last fiscal year. In my report for 1889 it was stated that an action was pending in the Superior Court by the Commonwealth against the Fitchburg Railroad Company for rents due under the lease of the Southern Vermont Railroad Company.

Near the close of the year 1890 the case was tried and judgment recovered by the Commonwealth for \$59,395.16 for rent due to May 1, 1887.

The court allowed to be deducted from the claim of the Commonwealth the amount paid for taxes in the State of Vermont, as had been done from the date of the lease.

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The defendant has taken the case to the Supreme Judicial Court on exceptions, so that nothing has been realized to the treasury as the result of the trial. It is gratifying, however, to learn from the Attorney-General that there will be no controversy as to the rent subsequent to May, 1887.

Negotiations are now pending for the sale of the Southern Vermont Railroad by the Commonwealth to the Fitchburg Railroad Company.\*

It will be remembered that the Commonwealth received from the Fitchburg Railroad Company \$5,000,000 in its bonds in payment for the Hoosac Tunnel, in 1887, which, with the interest on them, should at some time be credited to this enterprise; also 50,000 shares of the common stock of said railroad company, par value \$5,000,000, at present of no market value.

# STATE AID.

The following statistics showing the operation of the revised State aid laws were furnished by State Aid Commissioner Capt. C. W. Hastings: -

The disbursements of State and military aid in 1889 amounted to \$403,801.25 as against \$386,549.16 for 1888.

This increase was mostly caused by enlarging the scope of chapter 301, Acts of 1889, which omitted the provisions heretofore embodied in all State aid laws, requiring that widows otherwise eligible should have been married prior to the soldier's or sailor's final discharge from the service, and also that the widow must furnish evidence to show that her husband died of disease or wounds incurred in service after his honorable discharge therefrom.

PUBLIC DOCUMENT - No. 6.

These provisions left out of the law largely increased the applications of widows and widowed mothers, necessitating an increased expenditure.

The reimbursements in 1890 were for payments made by cities and towns in 1889, under the provisions in part of chapter 30 of the Public Statutes and the revised laws, chapters 301 and 279 of the Acts of 1889, which became operative June 1, 1889, and were as follows: -

The average amount paid by the Commonwealth to each person, under chapter 301, was \$43.59.

<sup>\*</sup> The sale was effected Jan. 7, 1891, for \$175,000 in four per cent. bonds of the Fitchburg Railroad Company, due June 1, 1920.

The foregoing figures show an increase of payments to the persons classified as above of \$11,542.85 over the payments of 1888, under chapter 301 of Acts of 1889, and an increase of 290 persons aided over the number aided in that year. The number of dependent fathers and mothers has decreased, and will continue to diminish each year, but the number of widows made eligible by the revision of the law shows a marked increase.

# INDIGENT SOLDIERS AND SAILORS.

There was disbursed to indigent soldiers and sailors in 1889, under the provisions of chapter 30, Public Statutes, and chapter 279, Acts of 1889, the sum of \$81,504.58.

The number thus aided was 1,934, an increase of 107 over 1888. The average amount paid by the State to each person was \$42.14.

The cities and towns paid the same amount that was paid by the Commonwealth, making the average to each person \$84.28 for the year.

There was an increased expenditure in 1889 to this class of cases of \$5,709.24 over 1888.

Many of the recipients are advanced in years, totally unable by disability to earn any part of their living, and require full support outside of public institutions.

The list of these aged and feeble men constantly increases, but after the issue of United States pensions under the law of June, 1890, it is believed that the expenditures under this act (chapter 279) will be considerably lessened.

The number of applicants for State aid examined by Surgeon-General Holt (recently deceased), in 1890, was 223, as against 239 cases in 1889. By his death the Commonwealth lost an able, faithful and conscientious public servant, and the soldier an earnest and constant friend and comrade.

# BURIAL OF VETERANS.

Under the provisions of chapter 395, Acts of 1889, there were eighty-one (81) burials of soldiers and sailors who died without means to defray funeral expenses, involving an expenditure by the cities and towns of \$2,679.56. The average expense of each burial was \$33, and it can, in no case, exceed \$35.

The expense to the Commonwealth under this law, one-half the amount expended for the year 1889, was \$1,339.78.

As time passes, the expenses under this head will naturally increase.

# Estimates for 1891.

The estimates of the expenses for the current year are largely based upon the reports submitted to the Auditor by the officers and boards having charge of the several branches of the public service, under the provisions of chapter 41 of the Acts of 1885.

Chapter 415 of the Acts of 1890 requires the annual appropriation of \$20,000 for certain extraordinary expenses, to be paid in the discretion of the governor and council, and that amount is included in the estimates for 1891.

Chapter 428 of the Acts of 1890 is "an act to promote

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the abolition of grade crossings" of public ways by steam railroads. Under its provisions the Commonwealth may be required to pay not to exceed thirty-five per centum of the cost of such abolition of grade crossing, and must pay at least twenty-five per centum of such costs upon the decree of the court confirming the finding of the commission in charge of the matter.

The amount to be paid by the Commonwealth in any one year (the year beginning with the passage of the act, June 21, 1890), shall not exceed \$500,000 and the total amount it shall pay shall not exceed \$5,000,000. The treasurer is authorized to pay the amount of cost allotted to the Commonwealth from any money not otherwise appropriated, and when requested by the governor and council so to do, to issue and sell bonds and establish a sinking fund for the redemption of the same. These are the more important financial provisions of the act. Under it, steps have been taken to separate grades in several localities on the lines of two of the railroad corporations in the Commonwealth, viz.: The Boston & Albany Railroad Company and the Old Colony Railroad Company. From information received from the officers of these corporations, I am convinced that the Commonwealth will not be required to pay more than \$100,000 under this act in 1891, and that amount will be found in the estimates on that account.

Hon. Marcus Morton resigned his office as Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court in August last (27th), and under the provisions of chapter 162 of the Acts of 1885 he is entitled to receive annually three-fourths of the salary attached to that office (\$6,500) during his natural life from the date of his resignation. No appropriation is necessary under the Constitution and the laws for the payment of the salaries of acting or retired justices of this court, but the amount required is always included in the estimates for each year. Hon. Lincoln F. Brigham resigned his office as Chief Justice of the Superior Court on the thirty-first day of August, 1890, and under chapter 420 of the Acts of 1887 he is entitled annually to one-half of the salary allowed to that officer (\$5,500) from the date of his resignation during his natural life. No appropriation was made by the Legislature

of 1890 in anticipation of this event, and the salary due from the 31st of August to the end of the year has not been paid. The sum required on that account appears as a deficiency in a special report, and the full amount for the current year will be found in the estimates for 1891. In view of the fact that another justice of the Superior Court has reached the age that would entitle him to receive the salary of a retired justice in case of his resignation during the year, I have included the amount required for such salary in the estimates for 1891, so as to avoid the disagreeable necessity of delaying the payment of the salary of an able and faithful retired justice of the court until an appropriation could be made for the purpose by a succeeding Legislature.

This is the condition to-day, as developed by a careful consideration of the wants of the service and the sources of revenue to provide for those wants under existing laws.

With but few exceptions, it is the smallest deficit shown by the annual estimates of the Auditor in the last thirty years.

I cannot anticipate the action of the Legislature, nor see the end from the beginning. To-day a direct State tax of \$1,500,000, which amount is \$250,000 less than the tax of 1890, would be sufficient to supply all the needs of the treasury as disclosed by the estimates, and provide for its necessities till the revenues of 1892 shall be realized. The Legislature of 1890 by new legislation increased the appropriations for public buildings, special grants and gifts, \$496,523 above the estimates for that year. Upon the legislation in a similar direction this year will largely depend the amount of the State tax necessary for the service in 1891.

# SERVICES AND SALARIES.

Considering the amount and the importance of its work, \* this department is the least expensive of any department of the State government.

Here, every financial transaction of the year is scrutinized, verified, analyzed, tabulated and sent out for the information of the people in the Auditor's report. The aggregate amount of these transactions in 1890 was more than \$50,000,000. In 1879, when there was a general reduction of salaries, the aggregate was in round numbers

\$18,900,000. The average amount for fifteen years, or since 1875, has exceeded \$37,250,000 and for the last ten vears these transactions have been more than \$43,000,000.

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These figures represent laborious and brain-wearying clerical work, - work too that cannot be done by mere copyists. The skill and accuracy of expert accountants are required in the handling of these large amounts and in preparing them for publication.

Yet the entire expenses of the department for ten years, since 1879, have averaged a little more than \$9,500 annually. The average ordinary expenses have been even less than this amount. About forty-five hundred dollars have been spent in the last four years in the re-arranging and refiling of vouchers and other papers, and in the binding and indexing of thirtyeight large volumes of Bounty Rolls containing the names of nearly seventy thousand soldiers and sailors who served in the late war of the rebellion. This work was imperatively demanded in order to preserve important and valuable papers from being lost or totally destroyed. Deducting this special expenditure, and the average annual cost of the department since 1879 has been a little more than nine thousand dollars.

I therefore repeat the recommendation in my report for 1889, that the salaries of all clerks in this department be increased, and would suggest that the salaries paid in 1875 would be just and reasonable, viz., first clerk, \$2,200; second clerk, \$2,000 and each of the extra clerks \$1,500. The aggregate of the increase would amount to only \$1,100, which is a mere pittance for the Commonwealth to pay for most valuable and faithful services rendered by these experienced clerks.

THE PUBLIC DEBT AND THE SEVERAL FUNDS.

All matters relating to the public debt and the transactions on account of the several sinking funds and other funds and accounts will be considered in their proper places, near the end of the report, immediately following Revenue Statement No. VII.
