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Annual Report of the Auditor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

AUDITOR'S REPORT, BOSTON, Jan. 30, 1893.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

I have the honor to present the forty-fourth annual report of this department, it being for the year ending Dec. 31, 1892.

ANALYSIS OF THE REPORT.

The report is in two parts. Part I. exhibits, summarily and in detail, the revenue transactions of the year, tabulated and arranged in exact conformity to the requirements of chapter 16 of the Public Statutes.

Part II. shows, in like manner, the transactions on account of the several sinking funds; also of the trust and other funds, and contains full information upon all matters of public interest relating to the funded debt, and first of revenue transactions.

RISE IN INDUSTRIES.

The State Prison at Boston (Charlestown district), the Massachusetts Reformatory at Concord and the Reformatory Prison for Women are the only State institutions in which the prisoners have been employed, under the requirements of chapter 447 of the Acts of 1887, and acts in amendment thereof, during the year 1892.

The books and accounts of the eight institutions above named have been kept under the supervision of the Auditor of the Commonwealth, since 1887, as required by Acts of 1887, chapter 87.

Under the system adopted, very satisfactory results have been secured. The receipts and expenditures of each institution are entered in detail, and all information concerning

the financial transactions therewith is easily obtained from the officer in charge.

The farm accounts required under the law indicate successful management, showing a profit in favor of the farm at the following institutions: -

Acts 1891, chap. 384, provides that the accounts of the boarding houses of the State Normal School, shall be kept under the direction of the Auditor of the Commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of chapter 87 of the Acts of 1887. On visiting the various schools affected by these acts, I find the accounts in good condition, and a disposition on the part of the officers thereof to conform to the requirements of this office.

BALLOTS FOR THE NOVEMBER ELECTION.

Under authority of chapter 413 of the Acts of the year 1889, as amended by chapter 436 of the Acts of the year 1890, there are furnished yearly, for each voting place at which an election is to be held, a number of ballots not less than sixty for every fifty and fraction of fifty registered male voters, and women voters registered to vote for school committee.

In compliance with this act there were furnished to the several cities and towns in the Commonwealth for the year 1890, 1,000,000 ballots at a cost of \$8,953.39; 1891, 1,010,500 ballots at a cost of \$8,175.26; 1892, 1,053,200 ballots at a cost of \$12,740.79.

The increased cost in 1892 was due to the "presidential election" making the ballot double the size of former years,

TROY & GREENFIELD RAILROAD AND HOOSAC TUNNEL.

The account of the Commonwealth with this enterprise is practically closed.

The suit of the Commonwealth against the town of "Williamstown" involving the principal of certain bonds given by said town, to aid in building the Troy and Greenfield Railroad under the old company, was decided in favor of the Commonwealth; the principal, and interest of the bonds have been paid. There still remain outstanding 870 shares of stock of the old company which the Commonwealth is authorized to buy at eight dollars; per share. The transactions for 1892 were as follows: -

STATE AND MILITARY AID.

The following statistics showing the disbursements of State and military aid under chapters 301 and 279, of the Acts of the year 1889, were furnished by Commissioner of State Aid Capt. Charles W. Hastings: -

The disbursements of State and military aid for the year 1891, increased \$53,080.29 over the year 1890.

There were 718 pensioned soldiers, and 100 dependent relatives added to the rolls during the year.

It is believed that the maximum of increase is nearly reached, and that with careful and unceasing investigation, the expense per year will not be very much larger.

The reimbursements made to cities and towns in 1892, were for payments made in 1891, and the exact amounts are herewith given.

The average amount paid by the Commonwealth to each person under chapter 301, was \$43.13.

The foregoing figures show an increase of payments made to persons in 1891, under chapter 301, of \$53,257.75 and an increase of 1,86 persons over the number aided in the previous year, classified as follows: 718 invalid pensioners, 1 widow; and 519 widows.

Since the revision of the law in May, 1889, to Dec. 31, 1891, there were added to the roll of recipients, 1,332 widows, who had not been eligible under the former law to receive aid, thus increasing by at least \$10,000 the disbursements to this class alone.

Dependent fathers and mothers have decreased, but pensioned soldiers, wives and widows, have necessarily increased, owing to the infirmities incident to increasing age.

MILITARY AID TO INDIGENT SOLDIERS AND SAILORS.

The amount disbursed to 2,049 persons of this class in 1891, under provisions of chap. 279, Acts of 1889, was \$88,493.53, a net decrease of \$1,345.41 from amount expended for the same class the preceding year.

The average amount paid by the State to each person, under classes one and two (civil settlements), was \$42.89; under classes three and four (no settlements), \$81.61.

Under the first two classes, cities and towns paid the same amount that was paid by the Commonwealth, making the average payment to each person \$85.71.

Disbursements under this chapter have reached the maximum, and future reports will show a marked decrease, accounted for by the fact that veterans who were granted United States pensions during the year, and more or less back pay, have been (with the exception of roll, etc., relieving cities and towns of so much expense.

The agents, two in number, employed by the Commissioners, were constantly examining the recipient; of aid under both laws, and, in 1891, fully three thousand separate examinations were made. This work will be more closely followed in future, and one new agent has, been recently appointed, who will devote his time wholly to this important service.

The prompt and efficient services of Surgeon General Kittredge, in the examination of applicants for military aid, have greatly assisted the work of the department.

He reports 203 examinations in 1891 and 1892, showing a marked falling off in the number of applicants.

MUNICIPAL EXPENSES OF INDIGENT SOLDIERS AND SAILORS.

Under the provisions of chap. 395, Acts of 1889, the agents reported for the year 1891 the burials of two hundred and thirty-six (236) soldiers and sailors, being 48 deaths in excess of the previous year.

The expense to the State (one-half) was \$1,069.43, and the average cost of burial \$34.49.

The amount to be provided for by taxation is the largest for many years, being \$733,613.04 in excess of that of 1892. The means to cover this amount must be supplied by the Legislature. The cash on hand is \$456,462.18 less than at the beginning of the year 1892. A direct State tax of \$2,000,000 or more depending upon the aggregate amount of special expenditures and grants that may result from the action of the present Legislature will be required to meet the expenditures of the year and make provision for the expenses of 1893, in anticipation of the revenue for that year.

The Legislature of 1892 authorized expenditures for special purposes amounting to \$692,160.87 in excess of the Auditor's estimates.

The expenses of the Commonwealth have been gradually increasing for several years owing to the demand for new buildings for the proper care of the insane, criminals and paupers, as well as for their proper maintenance. The revenue has not been correspondingly increased by taxation or otherwise.

The large amount required to be provided for by taxation disclosed by the foregoing estimates, is partially accounted in the following manner.

It will be observed that there is included in the estimate of expenses a large item of \$815,000.00 unexpended appropriations, a large proportion of which will be expended during the year in meeting outstanding claims. Such appropriations are available for two political years and are required to form a part of the Auditor's estimates.

Some of the expenditures for which appropriations were made in 1892, remaining unexpended December 31, 1892, are as follows :-

There are other appropriations in smaller amounts, remaining unexpended, which swell the amount to the figures first stated.

ABOLITION OF GRADE CROSSINGS.

In the year 1890, chapter 428, an act was passed by the Legislature entitled an "Act to promote the abolition of grade crossings." It provides for the gradual abolition of crossings by railroads at public ways at grade. Section 10 of said act provides that the amount to be paid under the provisions of this act by the Commonwealth, in any one year, shall not exceed \$500,000.00, and the total amount to be paid by the Commonwealth under the provisions of this act shall not exceed \$5,000,000.00; and the treasurer and receiver-general shall pay the amount of cost allotted to the State from any money not otherwise appropriated, and is hereby authorized when requested by the governor and council so to do, to issue and sell bonds from time to time, under such terms and conditions, and with a sinking fund for their redemption as shall best promote the interests of the Commonwealth.

By the provisions of the act the railroad corporations are to pay sixty-five per cent. of the total actual cost and the remaining thirty-five per cent. of said cost is to be apportioned between the Commonwealth and the city or town in which the crossing is situated, *provillecl*, that not more than ten per cent. of said cost shall be apportioned to said city or town.

No appropriation was made in 1890, and no payment made by the Commonwealth. In 1891 an appropriation of \$100,000 was made to carry out the provisions of the act, but no expenditure was made so far as the Commonwealth was concerned.

In 1892, chapter 374, an act was passed providing for the abolition of grade crossings on Chelsea Bridge and Chelsea Bridge Avenue by the Boston & Maine Railroad Corporation. Thirty per cent. of the cost shall be repaid to the Boston & Maine Railroad Corporation by the Commonwealth, and of the amount so repaid to said railroad corporation by the Commonwealth, eighteen per cent. shall be repaid to the Commonwealth by each of the cities of Boston and Chelsea, in three equal annual payments of six per cent. of said amount, as a part of their State tax.

I am informed that the total cost of this work will not be less than \$400,000. Chapter 433 of the acts of 1892 provides for the abolition of certain grade crossings of the Boston and Providence Railroad Corporation in the city of Boston, and also for an issue of stock from time to time, by the Old Colony Railroad Corporation to the amount of \$2,000,000.00 to meet the necessary expenses thereof.

The Commonwealth is to repay to said railroad corporation forty-five per cent. of the cost incurred, and the city of Boston shall repay to the Commonwealth thirty per cent. of the amount repaid by the Commonwealth to said railroad corporation, in twenty equal annual payments of one and one-half per cent. of said amount with interest at the rate of three per cent. per annum.

In 1892 the sum of \$150,000 was appropriated, in addition to the \$100,000 of 1891, making a total of \$250,000; of this amount the sum of \$87,000 has been paid by the Commonwealth.

It will be seen by this statement that the Commonwealth will be called upon during the current year for a large expenditure in this direction. Indeed the Boston & Albany Railroad Corporation, the Old Colony Railroad Corporation and the Fitchburg Railroad Corporation, have at my request, submitted estimates to me, in which it would appear that the amount the Commonwealth will be called upon to pay during the present year, on account of crossings abolished by their respective corporations, will be nearly \$400,000.

The present condition of the treasury is not such as to warrant any appropriation for such purposes, without a large increase in the State tax. It will be noticed in the Auditor's estimates that no provision is made for the expense of abolishing grade crossings. The amount now to be provided for by taxation is \$1,790,059.84, and if the sum of \$500,000 is appropriated for grade crossings, a State tax of at least \$2,500,000.00 will be needed.

I therefore recommend such legislation as may be necessary for the immediate issue and sale of bonds to provide means for carrying out the provisions of the several acts referred to, and the establishment of a sinking fund, with the provision that all premiums received from the sale of said

bonds be paid into said sinking fund, and authorizing the raising each year by taxation and payment into the said sinking fund such sums as will with their accretions extinguish the debt at maturity. I would also recommend that when the bonds are sold, from the proceeds thereof, such amount as may have already been expended be reimbursed to the revenue.
