## Annual Report of the Auditor General.

Auditor General's Department, Boston, Jan. 30, 1894.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

I have the honor to present the forty-fifth annual report of the Department, it being for the year ending Dec. 31, 1893.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE REPORT.

The report is in two parts. Part I. exhibits, summarily and in detail, the revenue transactions of the year, tabulated and arranged in exact conformity to the requirements of Chapter 16 of the Public Statutes.

Part II. shows, in like manner, the transactions on account of the several sinking funds; also of the trust and other funds, and contains full information upon all matters of public interest relating to the funded debt, and first of revenue transactions.

The foregoing table is made from Statement No. I.

The actual revenue shows an excess over the estimates of \$376,599.13. In explanation of this excess I would say that upon the issue of scrip for the abolition of grade crossings, the sum of \$87,056.29 was refunded to the revenue, also \$59,429.31 received on account of the Collateral Legacy tax, for which no estimate was made, and \$10,996.60 received for accrued interest upon the issue of scrip for the Fitchburg Railroad Securities Loan. This will leave the excess \$330,177.32. An inspection of this table will disclose the items from which the difference is made up.

The revenue in detail is shown in Statement No. III.

## PRISON INDUSTRIES.

The State Prison at Boston (Charlestown district), the Massachusetts Reformatory at Concord and the Reformatory Prison for Women are the only State institutions in which the prisoners have been employed, under the requirements of chapter 447 of the Acts of 1887, and acts in amendment thereof, during the year 1893.

The books and accounts of the eight institutions above named have been kept under the supervision of the Auditor since 1887. Under the system adopted, very satisfactory results have been secured. The receipts and expenditures of each institution are entered in detail, and all information concerning the financial transactions therewith is easily obtained from the officer in charge.

Acts 1891, chap. 384, provides that the accounts of the board of trustees of the State Normal Schools shall be kept under the direction of the Auditor of the Commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of chapter 87 of the Acts of 1887. I find the accounts in good condition, and a disposition on the part of the officers thereof to conform to the requirements of this office.

## TROY &amp; GREENFIELD RAILROAD AND HOOSAC TUNNEL.

The account of the Commonwealth with this enterprise is practically closed.

There still remain outstanding 870 shares of stock of the old company which the Commonwealth is authorized to buy at eight dollars per share. The transactions for 1893 were as follows :-

Whenever the Commonwealth shall have realized on the bonds given, and the stock in her possession, received from the Fitchburg Railroad Company, to whom the road and tunnel was sold, with the interest on said bonds, then the cost of the enterprise will be materially reduced.

## STATE AND MILITARY AID.

The following statements, showing the disbursements of State and Military Aid under chapters 301 and 279 of the Acts of the year 1889, were furnished by State Aid Commissioner, Capt. Charles W. Hastings.

The figures and statements cover the expenditures for 1892, - cities and towns being reimbursed from the treasury of the Commonwealth, on or before the first-day of December in the year next after the year in which the expenditure are made.

The above figures show an increase of payments made to persons in 1892, under chapter 301, of \$69,856.17, and an increase of 1,246- persons over the number aided in 1891.

As widows, otherwise eligible, are not now required to connect the death of their husbands with disease or disabilities incurred in the service, the number of cases in this class up to Dec. 31, 1892, have increased to 1,707, involving disbursements of nearly \$ 2,800.

## MILITARY AID TO INDIGENT SOLDIERS AND SAILORS.

Under the Act relating to Military Aid, chapter 279, Acts of 1889, there was disbursed to 1,550 soldiers and sailors the sum of \$132,252.38, one-half of which sum (\$66,126.19) was reimbursed by the State, a net decrease of \$22,367.34 from the amount expended for the same the preceding year.

This marked decrease was mostly caused by the men receiving United States pensions, rendering further aid under this statute unnecessary.

The Commissioners have now three agents who are constantly employed in visiting cities and towns, making thorough investigations in all cases where there is a doubt or uncertainty as to the justice or propriety of granting State Aid.

Their work is well done, producing satisfactory results. Hundreds of cases are examined at the Commissioners' office, which is totally inadequate in size and convenience for the work.

The medical examinations made by Surgeon General Kittredge in the 141 cases sent to him have been of very great value to the department, and his kindly demeanor toward sick and destitute applicants is held by them in grateful remembrance.

In accordance with the provisions of chapters 279 and 301 of the Acts of 1889, the payments of Military and State Aid to invalid pensioners and the dependent relatives of deceased soldiers and sailors will cease after Dec. 31, 1894,

unless the Legislature, by a further enactment, shall provide for their continuance.

In view of the advanced age and slender resources of the great majority of the persons receiving aid, and believing that it is the purpose of the Commonwealth to deal justly, and even liberally, with the recipients of its bounty, the Commissioners recommend such legislation as will continue the two statutes substantially as they now exist.

#### BURIAL EXPENSES OF INDIGENT SOLDIERS AND SAILORS.

Under the provisions of chapter 395, Acts of 1889, there were three hundred and four (304) burials of soldiers and sailors in 1892 who died without means to defray funeral expenses, at an expense of \$5,295. These figures show an increase of sixty-eight (68) cases and an increased expenditure of \$1,274.44.

Average cost to the State for each burial, \$17.42.

The amount to be provided for by taxation is less by \$355,445 77 than was the amount as appears by the Auditor's estimates in 1893, and unless some extraordinary expenditures are authorized by the present Legislature a direct State tax of \$2,000,000 will be ample for the expenditures of 1894.

It will be observed that there is included in the estimate of expenses a large item of \$1,011,000 unexpended appropriations, a large proportion of which will be needed during the present year in meeting outstanding claims. Such appropriations are available for two political years and are required to form a part of the Auditor's estimates.

There are other appropriations in smaller amounts, remaining unexpended, which swell the amount to the figures first stated.

#### MEDFIELD INSANE ASYLUM.

Chapter 445, Acts 1890, provided for the appointment of three commissioners, "with full power to purchase or bond, subject to the approval of the Governor and Council, suitable real estate in the eastern part of the Commonwealth consisting of not less than three hundred acres of land, suitable for all sanitary purposes as a site for an asylum for the chronic insane, for one thousand patients." They were authorized to procure plans, specifications, etc. The sum of \$30,000 was appropriated, and of this sum \$22,673.16, for land, etc., was expended, and the commissioners made their report. By chapter 425, Acts of 1892, authority was given to build an asylum for the chronic insane on the land purchased, for one thousand patients, "substantially in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates submitted by the commissioners appointed under authority of

chapter 445, Acts of 1890." Five hundred thousand dollars was authorized to be paid from the treasury of the Commonwealth to meet the expense of building said asylum, in addition to any compensation and expenses of the trustees. Under this Act the sum of \$76,803.19 has been expended.

Acts 1893, chapter 395, authorized further expenditure of \$200,000, making a total of \$700,000 authorized up to the present time for building said asylum.

To meet these expenses will require quite a large State tax, possibly fully as much as that of 1893. In view of these facts, I would therefore suggest us to whether, in the present financial condition of the country, it would not be wise for the Legislature to provide a loan for the purpose of meeting the expense of building this asylum, with a provision for sinking fund, and also provide for reimbursement to the treasury of such amounts as have already been expended.

Chapter 425, section 1, Act of 1892, provides for compensation for the building committee up to July 1, 1894. If this is to be continued, it will be necessary to have some further legislation upon the matter.

#### STATE PRINTING,

Considerable doubt having arisen in the minds of State officials as to whose duty it was to supervise the printing done under a contract with the Wright & Potter Printing Company, the following law was passed by the Legislature:

[Cm.P. 287.]

#### AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE SUPERVISION OF STATE PRINTING.

*Be it enacted, etc., as follows:*

SECTION 1. The secretary of the Commonwealth shall, in addition to his other duties, supervise the state printing. The auditor of the Commonwealth shall cause to be measured all the printing done under the state printing contract, and no bills for printing shall be allowed unless they are found to be in strict conformity to said contract. In order to properly carry out the provisions of this act the auditor may employ an expert in printing, and may expend annually for such service a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage. [Approved May 3, 1893.]

In accordance with the authority given by this act, the auditor has employed an expert whose duty it is to measure all the printing done under the contract. This has been faithfully done and no bill is now allowed unless it is found to be in strict conformity to said contract. The arrangement has worked well and so far satisfactorily to all parties concerned, and the interests of the Commonwealth are fully protected.

The large increase in the work in this department seems to warrant the Auditor in asking that the appropriation for extra clerical assistance be increased sufficiently to enable the employment of a type-writer and messenger. The amount allowed by law for extra clerical assistance is now \$500. I would recommend that the amount be increased to \$2,500 for the purposes above stated.
