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Annual Report of the Treasurer.

Boston, Jan. 30, 1895

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

I have the honor to present the forty-sixth annual report of this department, it being for the year ending Dec. 31, 1894.

STATEMENT OF THE RESULTS.

The report is in two parts. Part I. exhibits, summarily and in detail, the financial transactions of the year, and conforms to the requirements of chapter 11 of the Public Statutes.

Part II. shows, in like manner, the transactions on account of the several sinking funds; also of the trust and other funds, and contains full information upon all matters of public interest relating to the funded debt, and lists of revenue transactions.

The foregoing table is made from Statement No. I.

The actual revenue shows an excess over the estimates of \$933,148.15. In explanation of this excess I would say that upon the issue of set-off for the Medfield Insane Asylum Loan, the sum of \$129,1165.77 was refunded to the revenue, also \$239,368.55 received on account of the Collateral Legacy tax, for which no estimate was made, and \$174,518.76 received for accrued interest on Medfield Insane Asylum Bonds and for premium on sale of bonds of the Metropolitan Sewerage and Metropolitan Parks Loans carried to the interest account of those loans. This will leave the excess \$389,894.87. An inspection of this table will disclose the items from which the difference is made up.

The revenue in detail is shown in Statement No. III.

The statement shows that the actual expenses of 1894 exceeded those of 1893 by \$2,131,777.04.

Prison Institutions.

The State Prison at Boston (Charlestown district), the Massachusetts Reformatory at Concord and the Reformatory Prison for Women are the only State institutions in which the prisoners have been employed under the requirements of chapter 447 of the Acts of 1887, and nets in management thereof, during the year 1894.

The books, and accounts of the eight institutions above named have been kept under the supervision of the Auditor since 1887, as is required by chapter 87 of the Acts of that year. Under the system adopted, very satisfactory results have been secured. The receipts and expenditures of each institution are entered in detail, and all information concerning the financial transactions therewith is easily obtained from the officer in charge.

The farm accounts required under the law indicate successful management, showing a profit in favor of the farm at the following institutions :-

Acts of 1891, chapter 384, provides that the accounts of the boarding houses of the State Normal Schools shall be kept under the direction of the Auditor of the Commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of chapter 87 of the Acts of

1887. I find the accounts in good condition, and a disposition on the part of the officers thereof to conform to the requirements; of this office.

TROY & GREENFIELD RAILROAD AND HOARAC TUNNEL.

The account of the Commonwealth with this enterprise is practically closed.

There still remain outstanding 770 shares of stock of the old company which the Commonwealth is authorized to buy at eight dollars per share. The transactions for 1894 were as follows :-

Whenever the Commonwealth shall have realized on the bonds given, and the stock in her possession, received from the Fitchburg Railroad Company, to whom the road and tunnel were sold, with the interest on said bonds, the net cost of the enterprise will be materially reduced.

In this connection it may be proper to say that this office has been called upon several times within the past two years for information as to the amount of money loaned to railroad corporations. The following is a statement of amounts loaned by the Commonwealth to railroad corporations, so far as they appear from the books and documents on file in the Auditor's office: -

March 20, 1837, a law authorized the issue of scrip in aid of the Norwich & Worcester Railroad Corporation, to the amount of \$700,000 00

A mortgage was given on the property of the Corporation, dated July 1, 1837. This loan was paid in 1877, and all interest thereon also.

April 18, 1837, a loan was authorized by the General Court in aid of the Andover & Laverhill Railroad Corporation, to the amount of 100,000 00

A mortgage was given. The loan was paid in 1857 by the Boston & Lowell Railroad Company.

April 18, 1837, scrip was issued by the Treasurer and Receiver-General in aid of the Eastern Railroad Corporation, to the amount of \$50,000 00

A mortgage was given by said Corporation dated April 23, 1837. It appears that in 1857, by authority of Chapter 220 of that year, a new loan was issued, but the claim to this mortgage was not waived but held as security for the payment of the loan. This loan, with the interest thereon, was paid as it became due, and it does not appear that the Commonwealth lost any money by the operation.

April 17, 1838, the Treasurer was authorized to issue scrip in aid of the Nashua & Lowell Railroad Corporation, to the amount of 50,000 00

I do not find that this loan was ever used or that the Railroad received the money, although in the Auditor's report for 1841, in a summary of expenditures from 1831-40, I find this item: "1831-40, Nashua & Lowell Railroad, 4,375." This amount appears to have been paid from the Treasury of the Commonwealth. I also find in the same table, "1840-1-1, New Bedford & Taunton, 3,750; 1841-1, 2,500." These amounts appear to have been paid from the Treasury of the Commonwealth.

Under authority of Chapter 115 of the Acts of 1839 the sum of 50,000 00

was loaned to the Boston & Portland Railroad Corporation which sum was payable in twenty years, bonds being issued for the same. The Boston & Maine Railroad Corporation paid this loan in 1858, one year in arrears. The interest was promptly paid.

In 1841 and 1842, loans were made to the Lowell & Haverhill Railroad Corporation in aid of the Lowell & Haverhill Railroad Corporation. Total amount of loans 400,000 00

The amount subscribed for stock in said Railroad. The loans have not been paid, and the interest thereon. The State will be wincing on her stock and to-day owns a number of Boston & Albany Railroad Company bonds, which were cancelled for the stock held.

Under authority of Chapter 202, Acts of 1860, the Commonwealth issued \$200,000 five per cent. bonds, and purchased the so-called Southern Vermont Railroad, and leased it to the Troy & Boston Railroad Corporation at an annual rental of 12,000 00

and afterwards the amount of local taxation was deducted from the rent. The bonds matured in 1870 and were paid out of the Sinking Fund. In 1871 the road was sold to the Fitchburg Railroad Company for 100,000 00 the Commonwealth taking a four per cent bond therefor. The rental has not been paid in, and it is not likely the State will lose anything by this transaction.

From July 1, 1868, to July 1, 1869, scrip was issued in aid of the Boston, Hartford & Erie Railroad Company, now called the New York & New England Railroad Company, to the amount of \$3,618,729 40
 The interest paid on said loan to Jan. 1, 1891, amounts to 4,267,348 45
 Total, \$7,886,077 85

The Slate at one time held, in stock or this road, \$3,600,000 00

A portion of said stock was sold for \$43,956 25
 The balance was exchanged for bonds, and the bonds sold for 1,657,800 00
 Total, \$1,701,756 25

It is proper to state here that the Commonwealth paid heavy premiums in gold and exchange in the redemption of some of these bonds and the payment of interest thereon, and some of the railroads refused to pay said premiums on the ground that they did not agree to pay the bonds in gold.

The only other railroad enterprise that the Commonwealth entered into was the Troy & Greenfield Railroad and Hooe Tunnel, which was built under contract by the State and not by any appropriation, and consequently the expense of this enterprise does not come within the limit of this statement, which is for money loaned and appropriations to aid them in building their railroads.

STATE AND MILITARY AID.

The disbursement of State and military aid under chapters 301 and 291 of the Acts of the year 1885, by the cities and towns of this Commonwealth, as per official report of State Aid Commissioner, Capt. Charles W. Hastings, for the year 1883, were as follows, cities and towns being reimbursed from the treasury of the Commonwealth, on or before the first day of December in the year next after the year in which the expenditures were made: -

The above figures show an increase of payments made to persons in 1893 of \$29,507.68, and an increase of 383 persons over the number aided in 1892.

The revision and re-enactment of the State aid laws in 1889 left out the provision requiring widows and mothers to prove that the death of the husband or son was caused by disease or wounds incurred in the service. This naturally enlarged the scope of the law, and widows and mothers to the number of 1,975 have been admitted to the roll, involving the expenditure of not less than \$90,000 per annum.

MILITARY AID TO INDIGENT SOLDIERS AND SAILORS.

Under the net relating to military aid, chapter 279, Acts of 1889, cities and towns have disbursed to 1,167 soldiers and sailors the sum of \$107,658.18, one-half of which sum (\$53,813.09) was reimbursed by the State, making a net decrease of \$12,211.30 from the amount expended for this class in the year 1892; also a decrease of 383 cases. The above decrease is the result of the death of many invalid soldiers and sailors heretofore receiving military aid, also to the reception of pensions from the United States by others, rendering a continuance of aid under this act no longer necessary.

The agents of the Commissioners have been diligently employed prosecuting general examinations of the entire lists of the recipients of aid under both laws in many cities

and towns; also conducting special examinations in many cases where there was the least doubt as to the actual necessity for the aid.

Careful reports are written out by the agents in all cases, and submitted to the Commissioners for examination and decision.

These reports, filed with the original papers, form a complete history of each case to date, and are valuable for subsequent examinations.

There were one hundred and seven (107) cases of applications for military aid sent to Surgeon-General Kittredge for medical examination during the year 1893.

This service of Dr. Kittredge was most satisfactory and valuable to the Commissioners, enabling them to rate the amount of aid on the disability as determined by the examination.

BURIAL EXPENSES OF INDIGENT SOLDIERS AND SAILORS.

Chapters 305, Acts of 1880, and 184, Acts of 1882, authorize an expense not exceeding \$35 in the case of any honorably discharged soldier, sailor or marine dying without means to defray the expense of burial.

If dying in a State institution or in the Soldiers' Home in Chelsea, the State reimburses the whole expense of \$31; in all other cases one-half.

Under the provisions of the above laws there were three hundred and forty-eight (348) burials at an expense to the State of \$4,060.77. Increase in number of burials in 1883, forty-four (44), and in expense \$764.16 over same items in 1882. Average cost to the State for each burial, \$17.41.

The amount to be provided for by taxation is less by \$461,365.58 than was the amount as appears by the Auditor's estimates in 1894, and unless some extraordinary expenditures are authorized by the present Legislature a direct State tax of \$1,500,000 will be ample for the expenditures of 1895.

It will be observed that there is included in the estimate of expenses a large item of \$910,000 unexpended appropriations, a large proportion of which will be needed during the present year in meeting outstanding claims. Such appropriations are available for two political years, and are required to form a part of the Auditor's estimates.
