## ARRANGEMENT OF THE REPORT.

The report is in two parts. Part I. exhibits, summarily and in detail, the revenue transactions of the year, tabulated and arranged in exact conformity to the requirements of chapter 16 of the Public Statutes.

Part II. shows, in like manner, the transactions on account of the several sinking funds; also of the trust and other funds, and contains full information upon all matters of public interest relating to the funded debt.

The foregoing table is made up from Statement No. 1. The total revenue shows an excess over the estimates of \$4,988.31. This fact is largely due to the fact that the receipts have been very much larger than was anticipated. The amount accruing to the Commonwealth on account of the corporation tax shows an excess over the estimates of \$18,225.72; the collateral tax, of \$1,427.11; and receipts for liquor licenses, of \$57,090.00. An inspection of this table will disclose the items from which the difference is made up. The revenue in detail is shown in Statement No. 11.

COMPARATIVE RESULTS.

The following is a summary of the expenses, paid and unpaid, belonging to the years 1894 and 1895, so far as they have been presented or are known to this department:--

PRISONS INDUSTRIES.

The State Prison at Boston (Charlestown district), the Massachusetts Reformatory at Concord and the Reformatory for Women are the only State institutions in which the prisoners have been employed, under the requirements of chapter 447 of the Acts of 1857, and acts in amendment thereto, during the year 1895:

The books and accounts of the eight institutions above named have been kept under the supervision of the Auditor since 1887, as is required by chapter 87 of the Acts of that year. Under the system adopted, very satisfactory results have been secured. The receipts and expenditures of each institution are entered in detail, and all information concerning the financial transactions therewith is easily obtained from the officer in charge.

Article 384, chapter 384, provides that the accounts of the boarding houses of the State Normal Schools shall be kept under the direction of the Auditor of the Commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of chapter 87 of the Acts of 1887. I find the accounts in good condition, and a disposition on the part of the officers thereof to conform to the requirements of this office.

THE TROY AND GREENFIELD RAILROAD AND HOOSAC TUNNEL.

The account of the Commonwealth with this enterprise is practically closed.

There still remain outstanding 650 shares of stock of the old company which the Commonwealth is authorized to buy at eight dollars per share. The transactions for 1895 were as follows: -

Whenever the Commonwealth shall have realized on the bonds given, on the stock in her possession, received from the Troy and Greenfield Railroad Company, to whom the road and tunnel were sold, with the interest on said bonds, the net cost of the enterprise will be materially reduced.

STATE AND MILITARY AND BURIAL EXPENSES OF INDIGENT AND PENSIONLESS SOLDIERS AND SAILORS OF THE LATE WAR.

The following statements, showing the disbursements of State and Military Aid, and the burial expense of indigent Soldiers and Sailors, were furnished by Capt. Charles W. Hastings, Secretary of the Board of Commissioners of State Aid. The provisions of law providing for the payment of State and Military Aid, embodied in Chapters 301 and 279, Acts of 1889, were to expire with the year 1894.

To meet this emergency and provide for continuance, the Legislature of 1894 made a careful revision of the two laws, extending the time limit to Jun. 1, 1900, and preserving the same chapter numbers; - i. e., - Chap. 301, State Aid; and Chap. 210, Military Aid.

The only essential alteration in the two laws, was in adding to the list of persons eligible to apply for Aid, members of the Military organizations of the Volunteer Militia of Massachusetts known as the "Boston Cadets," the "Salem Cadets," the 8th Battery of Light Artillery, Co. "B" of the 7th Regt. of Infantry, mustered into the service of the United States between the first day of May and the first day of October, 1862, and certain men who served in the United States Navy or Army during the war of the rebellion, having been appointed or enlisted in said Navy or Army, while residents or citizens of Massachusetts and actually residing therein.

This enlarging the scope of the laws, by creating a new class of recipients hitherto ineligible, increased the annual expense by several thousand dollars.

With these amendments, it would seem that every man who served in the Army or Navy, and could connect himself with Massachusetts, has been provided for by general legislation.

Under the operation of these laws, there was reimbursed to cities and towns in 1885, for payments made in 1894, as follows: -

These figures show an increase of expenditures under this chapter of \$76,413, and an increase of 471 cases over the number aided in 1893.

A portion of this increase is attributable to the reception of certain citizens or residents of Massachusetts, who enlisted in the regular Army or Navy of the United States, just before and during the war of the rebellion, who were not credited on the quota of this State, but were made eligible to receive State Aid under the revised law of 1894.

"While there is at present a steady increase of new applicants of the invalid pensioner and widow classes, it is predicted that in the near future these will be offset by the increased number of deaths among the aged pensioners and widowed mothers, and that soon the expenditures under this law will show a general decrease.

Chapter 271, Acts of 1894, is substantially the same law first enacted in 1879, and to distinguish it from the State Aid law, is called "Military Aid." It differs from "State Aid" in being confined exclusively to the living Soldier or Sailor, having no settlement in some city or town in the Commonwealth; in being limited in amount to what the authorities may deem reasonable relief, which may be full or partial support, as the case demands; and in the reimbursement by the Commonwealth of only one-half the amount expended by the municipality.

Under this Act, there was expended by cities and towns for the relief of 1,144 disabled and indigent Soldiers and

sailors, the sum of \$116,611.04, one-half of which amount, \$58,307.02, was reimbursed by the Commonwealth. There was a slight increase in the number of persons aided, and an increase of \$4,463.93 in the amount expended in 1894 over 1893.

Many of the veterans having become aged and infirm, require increased expenditure for their maintenance and relief; but the receipt of U. S. Pensions, and the opportunities for admission to National Homes and the Soldiers' Home in Chelsea, Mass., will naturally help to lessen the expense under this law.

Commissioner General Burrell was in attendance two days of each week, to examine applicants for Military Aid, and his thorough examination of the two hundred (200) applicants sent to him, was of great service to the Commissioners in determining the nature and extent of the applicants' disabilities.

Three Agents have been steadily employed in visiting cities and towns from Cape Cod to Berkshire County, examining into the methods of disbursing Aid under both laws, correcting faults of administration, and likewise investigating the financial resources and disabilities of recipients. About five thousand (5,000) individual cases were examined during the year.

Of the three hundred and twenty-one (321) towns, only twelve (12) made no payment under either law.

*Burial of Indigent Soldiers and Sailors.*

Chapter 395, Acts of 1889, as amended by chapter 62, Acts of 1894, provides that the whole amount of expense of burial of a deceased indigent Soldier or sailor, not exceeding \$35.00, shall be reimbursed by the Commonwealth. As the first law provided that one-half of the expense of burial should be borne by the city or town, the present law will naturally double the expense to the Commonwealth.

There were three hundred and fifty-seven (357) burials reported in 1894, involving an expense to the Commonwealth of \$9,855.90, averaging a little more than \$27.50 per burial.

The amount to be provided for by taxation is more by \$1,982.37 than was the amount as appears in the Auditor's estimates in 1895; however, unless some extraordinary expenditures are authorized by the present Legislature, a direct State tax of \$1,500,000 will be ample for the expenditures of 1896.

It will be observed that there is included in the estimate of expenses a large item of \$1,200,000 unexpended appropriation, a large proportion of which will be needed during the present year in meeting outstanding claims. The appropriations are available for two political years and are retained to form a part of the Auditor's estimates.

LEGISLATION SUCCESSFUL.

Chapter 431 of the Acts of the year 1888, as amended by Chapter 200 of the Acts of the year 1890, provides for aiding small towns to provide themselves with school superintendents. Certificates are sent to this office signed by the chairman of the Board of a joint committee of the towns forming the union. We have no means of knowing if such a union is organized, and it is often difficult to get a proper and satisfactory statement of the facts. I would respectfully recommend that the act be amended, so that the certificate required by the auditor be first forwarded to the State Board of Education for their approval before being presented to the department for payment.

Chapter 865, Acts of 1888, being an act in relation to the evidence given in inquests, provides that "when it is just and reasonable to believe that an inquest to be held by him relates to a death by accident upon a railroad, of a passenger or employee or of a traveler upon a public or private way at a railroad crossing, it shall be his duty to cause a verbatim report of the evidence given before him to be made. The accuracy of such report shall be sworn to by the person making it and the report and the reporter's bill shall be

services after each has been examined and approved in writing by such justice, shall be forwarded without unnecessary delay to the board of railroad commissioners; such bill shall be paid by the Commonwealth, and shall be assessed upon the corporation or corporations owning or operating the road or roads upon which the accident happened, and shall be collected as provided for in section 12 of chapter 112 of the Public Statutes."

This act provides for forwarding all the papers in the case to the Railroad Commissioners, but does not provide for their approval of such bills as may be incurred in taking the bill, and it is very difficult for this office to secure proper bills for allowance in these cases. I would suggest that this act be amended so as to require the approval by the Railroad Commissioners of all bills for reports of expenses, under this act, before they are sent to the Auditor for payment.

The work in this department has increased to such an extent that it is impossible to properly handle it without additional clerical assistance. Chapter 217, Acts of 1883, relative to the supervision of state printing, authorized the employment of an expert in printing and the expenditure therefor of the sum of one thousand dollars annually.

I respectfully recommend that this act be amended by authorizing the Auditor to expend for such purpose the sum of fifteen hundred dollars, and giving him authority to employ such expert in the clerical work of his department. To make this expert a permanent clerk will relieve the department very much and save the employment of another clerk for some time to come.

#### DUTIES OF THE AUDITOR.

Section 11 of chapter 114 of the Public Statutes says; The Auditor "shall annually, in the month of January, examine the books, accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer. . . ."

The books, accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer were examined by the Auditor during the month of January as required by law, and found to be correct. The receipts, payments and bonds were found to conform to the records kept in the Auditor's department.
