PRISON INDUSTRIES.

The State Prison at Boston (Charlestown District), the Massachusetts Reformatory at Concord and the Reformatory Prison for women are the only State institutions in which the prisoners have been employed, under the requirements of chapter 447 of the Acts of 1887, and nets in payment thereof, during the year 1896.

The books and accounts of the seven institutions above named have been kept under the supervision of the Auditor since 1887 as required by chapter 87 of the Acts of that year. Under the system adopted, very satisfactory results have been secured. The receipts and expenditures of each institution are entered in detail at all information concerning the financial transactions therewith is easily obtained from the officer in charge.

Acts 1891, chapter 384, provides that the accounts of the boarding-houses of the State normal school shall be kept under the direction of the Auditor of the Commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of chapter 87 of the Acts of 1887. I find the accounts in good condition, and a compliance on the part of the officers thereof to conform to the requirements of this office, as the law provides.

TROY & GREENFIELD RAILROAD AND HOOSAC TUNNEL.

There still remain outstanding 659 shares of stock of the old company, which the Commonwealth is authorized to buy at eight dollars per share. The transactions for 1896 were as follows: -

The last issue of bonds became due Sept. 1, 1897, at which time all expenditures on account of the Troy & Greenfield Railroad and Hoosac Tunnel will cease; the only thing remaining to be paid will be the stock referred to. The Commonwealth now holds the Fitchburg Railroad Company bonds, drawing interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum. These will undoubtedly be paid at maturity the proceeds of which, as well as the amount realized from the sale of the common stock of said railroad company, will be used for the enterprise.

STATE AND MILITARY AND BURIAL EXPENSES OF INDIGENT OR FRIENDLESS SOLDIERS, SAILORS AND MARINES OF THE LATE WAR.

The disbursements of State and military aid, under chapters 301 and 279 of the Acts of 1894, and chapter 395, as amended by chapter 62, Acts of 1894, by the cities and towns of this Commonwealth, as per official report of the Commissioner of State Aid, Capt. Charles W. Hastings, were for the year 1895, reimbursements being made on or before the first day of December in the year next after the year in which the expenditures are made.

The above figures show an increase of expenditures under chapter 301 of \$21,000, and an increase of 504 cases for the year 1895, averaging less than two new applicants for each city and town in the Commonwealth.

A law (chapter 301) entitled "An Act to make certain army nurses eligible to receive State aid" was enacted by the General Court of 1894, and took effect May 1, 1895. Under its provisions, women appointed by the proper authorities of the United States, or by authority of the Governor of the Commonwealth, "to serve in the United States Army as nurses in the army hospitals of the United States during the war of the rebellion, shall be eligible to receive State aid under the provisions, rules and limitations of chapter 301, Acts of 1894; provided, that the applicant shall have been an actual resident of this Commonwealth for three consecutive years next prior to date of application, and provided, that the municipal authorities of the city or town and the commissioners of State aid are satisfied that justice and necessity require the granting of assistance; the aid not to exceed \$4 a month.

There were three applicants under this law, and all were found to be eligible and worthy of assistance. There were not many regularly appointed army nurses now living, and comparatively few of those surviving will be likely to apply for State aid.

Under chapter 279, which is designated as military aid, there was expended by cities and towns for the relief of 1,272 disabled and indigent soldiers and sailors the sum of

\$112,524, one-half of which amount (\$56,252.11) was reimbursed by the Commonwealth.

The number of military aid cases increased to 88 during the year, but the expenditures decreased \$2,044.91. The death of quite a number of extremely helpless veterans who required full maintenance, nursing, medical attendance, etc., partly accounts for the decrease, and it is safe to assume that the expense to the State under this law will gradually lessen from year to year.

Surg. Gen. Herbert L. Burrell resigned in April, 1895, and was succeeded by Dr. Edward J. Forster, who carried on the examinations for the remainder of the year. To both of these officials the Commissioners of State Aid are greatly indebted for advice, and timely suggestions connected with the medical examinations of applicants for military aid.

Burial Expenses of Civil War Soldier and Sailors

Under the provisions of the law, chapter 395, as amended by chapter 62, Acts of 1894, there were buried 399 indigent soldiers and sailors, involving an expense to the Commonwealth of \$13,834.80, averaging not quite \$35.00 to a man. The expenses under this law will show steady increase for some years to come.

In March, 1895, the commissioners decided to appoint a female agent, qualified as stenographer and typewritist, and through the Civil Service Commission secured the services of Lena G. Bailey, who has developed an aptitude and efficiency in the line of her duties that promises the best results.

William K. Spring, being unable on account of failing health to continue his official duties as agent of the Board, was succeeded by Francis A. Bicknell, also a veteran of the late war, who commenced his duties the first of the year, and has proved a faithful and capable officer.

The agents are constantly at work investigating recipients of aid in cities and towns of the State, correcting errors in the methods of disbursements, and adjusting payments in the interests of economy and fairness to those receiving assistance.

The amount to be provided for by taxation is more by \$762,093.71 than was the amount as appears by the Auditor's estimates in 1896. Should the present Legislature authorize appropriations in accordance with the estimates herein presented, it is evident that a State tax of at least two millions of dollars will be necessary to meet this proposed expenditure in excess of the estimated receipts.

It will be observed that there is included in the estimate of expenses a large item of \$800,000 unexpended appropriations, a large proportion of which will be needed during the

present year in meeting outstanding claims. Such appropriations are available for two political years, and are required to form a part of the Auditor's estimates.

Some of the expenditures for which appropriations were made in 1896, remaining unexpended Dec. 31, 1896, are as follows:-
