.ARRANGEMENT OF THE REPORT.

The books and accounts of the seven institutions above named have been kept under the supervision of the Auditor since 1887, as is required by chapter 87 of the Acts of this year. Under the system adopted, very satisfactory results have been secured. The receipts and expenditures of each institution are entered in detail, and all information concerning the financial transactions therewith is easily obtained from the officer in charge.

Acts 1891, chapter 38-1, provides that the accounts of the boarding houses of the State normal schools shall be kept under the direction of the Auditor of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 87 of the Acts of 1887. I find the accounts in good condition, and a provision on the part of the officers thereof to conform to the requirements of this office, as the law provides.

STATE AND MILITARY AID AND BURIAL EXPENSES OF INDIGENT OR FRIENDLESS SOLDIERS, SAILORS, AND MARINES OF THE LATE WAR.

The following statements, showing the disbursements of State and military aid, and for the burial of indigent soldiers and sailors, under chapters 301 and 279 of the Acts of the year 1894 and chapter 279 of the Acts of 1896, were furnished by State Aid Commissioner Charles W. Hastings, and cover the expenditures under those chapters for the year 1896, reimbursements being made to the cities and towns on or before the first day of December in the year next after the year in which the expenditures were made.

The above figures show an increase of payments made to the classes before mentioned, in 1896, of \$27,907.33, and a net increase of 493 persons over the number aided in 1895.

Under chapter 27B, Acts of 1894, known as military aid, cities and towns expended for the relief of 1,091 indigent and disabled soldiers the sum of \$104,202.98, on half of which amount, \$52,101.49, was reimbursed by the Commonwealth.

The number of military aid cases decreased during the year 1896, and expenditures decreased \$4,160.62.

Applications for military aid will gradually decrease, as men will receive pensions, and then, if further aid is deemed necessary, State aid can be granted under chapter 301.

The medical examinations of applicants by Surgeon-General Edward A. Forster, who died May 15, 1896, and Surgeon-General Robert A. Blood, who succeeded him May 15, 1896, have been of much assistance to the commission in determining the nature and extent of the disability, and the amount of aid to be awarded.

Burial Expenses of Indigent Soldiers and Sailors, and their Wives and Widows.

The law relating to the burial expenses of soldiers was amended by the Legislature of 1896, and chapter 219, April 14, 1896, was substituted. This chapter, entitled "An Act to amend chapter 219, relating to the burial of soldiers," provides that the burial agent must be notified within one week of the date of death, and if upon notification he shall find the deceased was eligible to receive the benefits of the act, he may authorize an expense not exceeding \$35.

It also provides for the burial expenses of 61 towns, wives and widows, provided they were notified prior to the final discharge of the soldier from the service.

Under the provisions of this law there were returns of 15 burials, including 15 widows and 5 wives; involving an expense to the Commonwealth of \$16,678.25.

The increase of burials in 1896 over 1895 was 81, and increased expense of \$2,843.45.

Of the 352 cities and towns, there are only 10 towns that pay neither State nor military aid, and 301 cities and towns have appointed burial agents.

The three agents of the commissioners have been steadily employed in visiting the different municipalities, examining into the methods of disbursing aid and the burial of soldiers, correcting faults of administration and making personal examinations of recipients. It is intended to have every city and large town visited and the disbursements for State aid thoroughly examined once in two years, and oftener if possible. About 5,000 individual cases were examined during the year 1896.

The amount to be provided for by taxation is less by \$1,155.24 than was the amount as appears by the Auditor's estimates in 1897. Although the estimated expenses for 1898 are \$171,307.89 more than those of 1897, the estimated revenue for 1898 is \$147,527.53 more than in 1897, but the cash on hand Jan. 1, 1898, is \$420,935.60 more than was the cash on hand Jan. 1, 1897. It is apparent by these figures that with due economy the Legislature of the present year can close its session with a State tax of about the same as the year 1897, that is to say, \$1,750,000. It will be observed that there is included in the estimates of expenses a large item of \$25,000 unexpended appropriations, a large portion of which will be needed during the present year in

meeting outstanding claims. Such appropriations are available for two political years, and are required to form a basis of the Auditor's estimates.

DUTIES OF THE AUDITOR.

Among the other duties devolving upon the Auditor, Accounts are the following :-

Section 6 of chapter 16 of the Public Statutes says: "The Auditor shall annually, in the month of January, examine the books, accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer." The books, accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer were examined by the Auditor during the month of January, 1894, and found to be correct. The payments and bonds were found to conform to the records kept in the Auditor's department.

By chapter 279 of the Acts of 1894, section 9, the Auditor of the Commonwealth is a member of the State Judicial Commission, and considerable time has been devoted during the past year to the consideration of State and military aid cases.

And chapter 179 of the Acts of the year 1894 intrusts the Auditor with the duty, in connection with the Secretary of the Commonwealth and Adjutant-General, of acting upon claims for unpaid bounties. A very large number of claims have been presented during the past year to the commission, involving a great deal of labor and research, which has added very materially to his duties.

LEGISLATION SUGGESTED.

The appropriation for clerical services in this department outside of salaries fixed by law amounts to \$1,500 (Acts 1894, chapter 397), out of which is paid a stenographer and messenger. The work of this department has increased to such proportions as to make it necessary to employ extra assistance during the fall and winter; and I feel justified in asking that the Legislature increase the amount for clerical assistance in this department to the sum of \$3,000 annually.
