#### Prison INDUSTRIES.

The State Prison at Boston, the Massachusetts Reformatory at Concord, the Reformatory Prison for Women at Sherborn and the State Farm at Bridgewater are the State institutions in which prisoners have been employed during the year 1900 under the requirements of chapter 447 of the Acts of the year 1887, and acts in amendment thereof.

The books and accounts of the seven institutions above named have been kept under the supervision of the Auditor, as is required by chapter 87 of the Acts of the year 1887. Under the system adopted, very satisfactory results have been secured. The receipts and expenditures of each institution are entered in detail, and all information concerning the financial transactions therewith is easily obtained from the officer in charge.

Acts of 1891, chapter 384, provides that the accounts of the boarding-houses of the State normal schools shall be kept under the direction of the Auditor of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 87 of the Acts of 1887. I find the accounts in good condition, and a disposition on the part of the officers thereof to conform to the requirements of this office, as the law provides.

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1. ~~MILITARY~~ AND STATE AND BUREAUAL EXPENSE OF INDIGENT SOLDIERS, SAILORS AND MATRONS OF THE CIVIL WAR AND THE WAR WITH SPAIN.

State Aid Commissioner Charles W. Hastings, its secretary of the Board, furnishes the following report, showing the disbursements of State and military aid on account of the civil war and the war between the United States and Spain, also the expenses for burial of indigent soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows, for the year 1899, reimbursements for the same being made to cities and towns on or before the first day of December, 1900.

The two laws providing for the payment of State and military aid were not to continue after the year 1899; and the Legislature of that year provided, by enactment, two carefully revised statutes, chapter 374 (State aid) and chapter 372 (military aid), to take the place of the laws about to expire.

These laws went into effect on the first day of July, 1899, and repealed the sections of chapter 561 of the Acts of the year 1898 relating to aid for soldiers of the war with Spain, providing, in the new laws, State and military aid for soldiers of the Spanish and civil wars on equal terms.

Disbursements under the above laws and for the burial of indigent soldiers, their widows and mothers, were made as follows:-

Military aid was extended to 948 soldiers and sailors of the civil war, at an expense to the State of \$49,670.70, - a decrease of \$119.28, and a decrease of 40 in the number of recipients, from 1898.

It will be observed that the falling off in the number aided is greater in proportion to the lessened expense. This is for the reason that as the men grow older they become more helpless, and require, individually, a larger amount of aid.

Military aid to veterans of the civil war will decrease gradually from year to year.

The war with Spain ended by official proclamation on the 11th of April, 1899, and all State aid to the dependents of soldiers and sailors then in service ceased with the payments for that month.

There was much sickness among the men after muster out, and aid was extended to those without means of maintenance, the close of the year showing 338 names on the roll of military aid. Malarial poisoning was the prevailing disability, but quite a number developed consumption, and were sent to the State Sanatorium at Rutland, Mass., where the treatment seemed to work decidedly favorable results.

There will be a marked reduction in the list of wives, mothers, fathers and children after 1899 ; but the military aid, which applies solely to the living volunteer himself, will, for obvious reasons, gradually increase.

k Surg.-Gen. Robert A. Blood was in attendance two days of each week to examine applicants for military aid, and his services were of great assistance to the commissioners in determining the nature and extent of the applicants' disabilities.

Four agents, three male and one female, have been constantly employed investigating the condition and needs of applicants, visiting cities and towns to correct errors of administration in awarding aid, and the burial of soldiers.

The law of April 21, chapter 356, Acts of 1898, charged the Commissioners of State Aid with the duty of investigating and deciding cases of appeal of applicants for soldiers' relief from the action of the municipal authorities where they failed to furnish such relief. Much additional work was involved in looking up these appeals and getting at the bottom of the trouble; but the decisions of the Board, after due examination of the merits in each case, have been generally satisfactory to all concerned. About 5,000 examinations of all kinds were made during the year.

Of the 353 cities and towns comprising the Commonwealth, only 3 small towns make no disbursement of either State or military aid.

#### *Burial Expenses of Indigent Soldiers and Sailors and their Wives and Widows.*

Cities and towns were reimbursed for burial expenses of 630 soldiers and dependents, to the amount of \$21,949.42, - an increase of 64 cases over 1898 and \$2,294.80 in expense. Average cost to the State per burial, \$34.84.

## STATE PAY TO SOLDIERS IN THE LATE SPANISH WAR,

Under authority of chapter 561 of the Acts of the year 1898, there was allowed and paid out of the treasury of the Commonwealth, to each non-commissioned officer, soldier, sailor or marine, including members of the Massachusetts militia and residents of Massachusetts mustered into the regular army or navy or into the volunteer brigade of engineers, the sum of \$7 per month during the war between the United States government and the kingdom of Spain. Up to Jun. 1, 1901, there has been paid out on this account the sum of \$684,293.37.

## BOUNTIES TO MASSACHUSETTS SOLDIERS IN THE WAR OF THE REBELLION.

Chapter 179, Acts of 1897 (repealed in 1898), and chapter 525, Acts of 1898, provide for the payment of bounties in certain cases, from the treasury of the Commonwealth, not exceeding \$125 in each case, to Massachusetts soldiers in the war of the rebellion. Under these acts, 2,257 applications were filed, of which number 51 were duplicates. Of the 2,206 original claims, 777 have been allowed and paid, involving an expenditure of \$96,598.43. leaving an unexpended balance of all appropriations of \$22,801.57.

Of the \$92,780.16 allowed for bounties, \$2,000 were paid by the Treasurer direct to the attorneys of record in the respective cases, as provided for in the law, thus showing that the actual amount received by the soldiers themselves or their beneficiaries under the provisions of the law was \$90,720.16.

The estimates of the expenses for the current year are largely based upon the reports submitted to the Auditor by the officers and boards having charge of the several branches of the public service, under the provisions of chapter 41 of the Acts of 1885.

From these figures it will be noticed that the cash on hand Jan. 1, 1901, is but \$572,527.33, which is very much less than the amount that was carried over last year, and in fact for several years. It is accounted for in part owing to the failure to collect the assessment provided by law for expenses of parks in the metropolitan park district.

During the early part of last summer a commission was appointed to determine the proportion of assessment for interest, sinking fund requirements and maintenance for the park system, in accordance with chapter 419 of the Acts of

1899. This commission held a large number of meetings, and finally made a report to the court. There were quite a number of cities and towns in the Commonwealth which appeared before the court and objected to the apportionment, but the judge before whom this apportionment was argued approved the findings of the commission; thereupon one town petitioned for a further hearing in the matter before the full bench of the supreme court. This matter was argued, as I understand, late in December, but no decision was reached.

In the estimates of the Auditor for the year 1900 was the sum of \$406,250 for interest and maintenance on account of parks and boulevards. It was fully expected, and the law provided, that this amount should be assessed and collected; but for some unaccountable delay the Treasurer was unable to assess the amount, hence the cash on hand Jan. 1, 1901, was reduced by this amount. It is supposed that the court will render its decision during the present year, and, if the commission is sustained, the assessment of the metropolitan park district for the year 1901 will cover the two years, - that is to say, 1900 and 1901, - and in the Auditor's estimates of receipts for the present year will be found the assessments on the metropolitan park district for these two years.

#### DUTIES OF THE AUDITOR.

Among the other duties devolving upon the Auditor of Accounts are the following :-

Section 6 of chapter 16 of the Public Statutes says : " The Auditor shall annually, in the month of January, examine the books, accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer." The books, accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer were examined by the Auditor during the month of January, as is required by law, and found to be correct. The receipts, payments and bonds were found to conform to the records kept in the Auditor's department.

By chapter 279 of the Acts of 1894, section 9, the Auditor of the Commonwealth is a member of the State Aid Commission, and considerable time has been devoted during the past year to the consideration of State and military aid cases. And chapter 179 of the Acts of the year 1897 intrusts the

Auditor with the duty, in connection with the Secretary of the Commonwealth and the Adjutant-General, of acting upon claims for unpaid bounties. A very large number of claims has been investigated during the past year by the commission, involving a great deal of labor and research, which has added very materially to the duties of the Auditor.
