STATE AND MILITARY AID.

By chapter 192 of the Acts of 1902 the Board of Commissioners of State Aid and the office of State Pension Agent were abolished, and the law provided for the appointment of a commissioner and deputy commissioner of State Aid and Pensions. This took effect March 19, 1902, thereby relieving the Auditor from any further duty in reference to questions of State aid. The present commissioner, which is known as the Commissioner of State Aid and Pensions, will report its doings to the present Legislature.

ABOLITION OF GRADE CROSSINGS.

There has been issued during the present year scrip for the abolition of grade crossings, under authority of chapter 535 of the Acts of 1896, amounting to the sum of \$300,000. The total amount issued under chapter 428 of the Acts of 1890 is \$5,000,000, and under chapter 433 of the Acts of 1892 and chapter 257 of the Acts of 1896, \$3,000,000, making a total issued up to the present time of \$8,300,000.

The expenditures for this purpose up to Jan. 1, 1903, under authority of chapter 428 of the Acts of 1890, amount to \$5,378,471.82. The available cash balance under this act Jan. 1, 1902, was \$953,346.92. There has been received from cities and towns during the present year the sum of \$190,867.14; to which add the proceeds of the loan issued under chapter 535 of the Acts of 1896, \$300,000, and also the amount transferred to this loan under authority of chapter 507 of the Acts of 1902, \$400,000, making a total of \$1,844,214.06.

Expenditures for abolitions during the present year amount to \$523,702.05, leaving available Jan. 1, 1903, for the further abolition of grade crossings, \$1,320,512.01.

The Treasurer has authority for a further issue of bonds under chapter 535 of the Acts of 1896, to reimburse the original \$5,000,000 loan, so called, for the expenses of the crossing on Congress Street. This crossing up to the present time has cost \$945,893.67, and there has been repaid and remains to be paid

by the city of Boston on this account the sum of \$74,239.62, making the net cost to the Commonwealth \$871,654.05. This will enable the Treasurer, as the needs become apparent, to make a further issue of bonds to the amount of \$571,654.05, which, added to the \$1,320,512.01, will make available for the abolition of grade crossings, without any further issue of bonds, \$1,892,166.06.

There was authorized in 1902, by chapter 440, a further issue of bonds for this purpose to the amount of \$5,000,000, as an addition to the original loan of 1890; but as the act provides that the amount expended in any one year shall not exceed \$500,000, the amount available at the present time would seem to be sufficient for several years without any additional issue of bonds.

MASSACHUSETTS WAR LOAN.

During the present year, under authority of chapter 561 of the Acts of 1898, an additional issue of scrip was made of \$5,000, with interest at the rate of 3 per cent. per annum. This was issued to meet the State pay of certain soldiers who for some reason or other had failed to file their claims previously. The total issue of bonds on this account up to the present time is \$1,235,000.

METROPOLITAN PARKS LOAN.

During the present year scrip has been issued, under authority of chapter 172 of the Acts of 1902, to the amount of \$450,000, with interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum. This sum adds to what is known as the metropolitan parks loan, series two. This makes a total issue of scrip for park purposes of \$1,030,000, divided as follows:—

For park purposes,	\$7,555,000 00
For boulevards,	3,475,000 00

One-half of the amount for boulevards is to be paid by the State at large, the balance by the metropolitan district.

The first assessment levied and collected by the Treasurer and

Receiver-General from the metropolitan parks district was paid into the treasury of the Commonwealth on the tenth day of December, 1902; it was for the years 1900, 1901 and 1902, and amounted to \$1,708,239.26, and the following is the detail by years of the amount received from each city and town in the district:—

METROPOLITAN SEWERAGE LOAN.

There has been issued during the present year the following additional scrip : —

Under authority of chapter 424 of the Acts of 1899, to continue the work on the high-level sewer, the sum of \$864,000.

The total amount of scrip issued to Jan. 1, 1903, for the construction of sewers, is \$11,169,912.

METROPOLITAN WATER LOAN.

Under authority of chapter 488 of the Acts of 1895, additional scrip has been issued to continue the work upon the metropolitan water system to the amount of \$3,500,000, making a total issue of scrip to Jan. 1, 1903, of \$34,500,000.

Under authority of this act the Treasurer and Receiver-General assessed and collected from the cities and towns in the metropolitan water district the sum of \$1,546,081.23, divided as follows : —

PRISONS AND HOSPITALS LOAN.

Chapter 434 of the Acts of 1902 authorized the issue of scrip to the amount of \$556,800, for a term not exceeding thirty years, for the construction and enlargement of certain public buildings which were named in the act. Under authority of this act the Treasurer and Receiver-General issued scrip to that amount, with interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum. These bonds become due Nov. 1, 1931. This loan was issued to carry out what seems to be the policy of the Commonwealth, — to provide more economically for the annual increase in the number of insane by providing for increasing the capacity of the existing hospitals

rather than to establish any new institutions. The total issue of bonds under the various acts for these purposes up to Jan. 1, 1903, amounts to \$921,600.

STATE HOUSE LOAN.

Under authority of chapter 537 of the Acts of 1901 there has been a further issue of scrip to the amount of \$75,000, to meet the expenses in connection with improving the tract of land around the State House. These bonds were issued at the rate of 3 per cent. per annum, and mature Oct. 1, 1918.

The total issue of scrip for all purposes in connection with the construction and remodelling of the State House up to Jan. 1, 1903, amounts to \$6,410,000. Of this amount, bonds amounting to \$2,335,000 became due and were paid July 1, 1901, leaving now outstanding scrip amounting to \$4,075,000.

STATE HIGHWAY LOAN.

Under authority of chapter 246 of the Acts of 1902 scrip to the amount of \$375,000 was issued for the construction of State highways, bearing interest at the rate of 3 per cent. per annum on \$10,000 and $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum on \$365,000. This scrip becomes due April 1, 1932, and makes the total issue of scrip for highway purposes up to Jan. 1, 1903, \$3,825,000.

The total amount of loans authorized by the Legislature up to date is \$4,500,000.

The total expenditure up to Jan. 1, 1903, for highways, which includes the expenses of the temporary commission and of the permanent commission, from appropriations and loans, amounts to \$4,395,630.17. This does not include any appropriations for interest on the loans or for sinking fund requirements.

PORTRAITS.

Chapter 19 of the Resolves of 1902 authorized the expenditure of a sum not exceeding \$500 for procuring the portraits of all the Auditors who have served the Commonwealth from the establishment of the office in 1849 up to and including the year 1902. The search for likenesses of my predecessors in this office proved a very interesting one, and I am happy to state that it was successful, and that their portraits are now upon the walls of this department. The expense incurred was \$300.

LEGISLATION SUGGESTED.

STATE INSTITUTIONS.

The various insane asylums and hospitals and the Hospital for Dipsomaniacs and Inebriates, the Hospital for Epileptics, State Sanatorium and the School for the Feeble-minded have been carried on during the present year under authority of sections 127 and 128 of chapter 87 of the Revised Laws.

Section 127 provides for an estimate to be filed with the Auditor of the Commonwealth, and an appropriation is made, determined by estimating at the rate of board fixed by law upon the average daily number of State patients for the preceding year plus the average annual increase for the preceding five years. This arrangement seemed to work very well during a large portion of the year, but inasmuch as the receipts, which the law provides shall be turned into the treasury of the Commonwealth and out of which are to be paid the expenses of running the institutions, in addition to the amount appropriated from the treasury of the Commonwealth, are received for the most part from cities and towns, and are payable quarterly, some of the institutions find themselves entirely out of money in the last month or two of the year, and have nothing with which to pay their outstanding bills.

Section 6 of chapter 87 provides that the State Board of Insanity shall have general supervision over all these hospitals, as well as the State Colony for the Insane, and also provides that on and after the first day of January, 1904, the Commonwealth shall, subject to the provisions of section 2 of chapter 451 of the Acts of the year 1900, have the care, control and treatment of all insane persons, the care of whom was vested by the provisions of law in force on the eleventh day of July in the year 1900 in the Commonwealth, in the cities or towns or in any board of officers thereof, or who may be committed to the asylums or institutions of the Commonwealth for the care of the insane. And it further provides that no city or town except Boston shall establish such an asylum or institution, nor, after said first day of January, maintain the same or be liable for board, care, treatment or act of any insane person.

The practical operation of this section is that the Commonwealth, on and after Jan. 1, 1904, assumes the care and cost of support of all the insane in cities and towns except Boston, and inasmuch as a large proportion of the receipts of the various hospitals comes from the cities and towns, which, after 1904, will be entirely cut off, the Commonwealth will be called upon to appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to pay nearly the entire running expenses of these various institutions.

Now I respectfully recommend to the Legislature that sections 127 and 128 of chapter 87 be amended so as to provide for an annual appropriation out of the treasury of the Commonwealth to meet the expenses of the various institutions provided for by these sections, and at the same time to provide for the payment into the treasury of the Commonwealth of their entire receipts.

METROPOLITAN PARKS LOAN SINKING FUND.

In 1894 the Auditor recommended in his report that the sinking fund known as the metropolitan parks loan sinking fund be maintained for the purpose of paying at maturity all loans issued for parks and boulevards. In compliance with that recommendation the Legislature enacted in 1895 chapter 283, which provided for the consolidation of the sinking funds for park purposes and boulevards into one sinking fund. It seemed at that time wise to do this, but experience has shown that it was a mistake. One-half of the expense of boulevards is paid out of the general tax levy, and it has been found difficult to handle the sinking fund in such a way as to readily ascertain what proportion is applicable to the bonds issued for boulevard purposes. I would therefore respectfully recommend the repeal of chapter 283 of the Acts of 1895, and the passage of a law authorizing the Treasurer and Receiver-General to establish a new sinking fund, to be known as the metropolitan parks loan sinking fund, series two, and to authorize the transfer from the metropolitan parks loan sinking fund of such portion of the cash and securities as shall be determined to properly belong to the proposed new sinking fund. In consultation with the Treasurer and Receiver-General I find that he is in full accord with this recommendation, and will refer to the subject in his annual report.

RETURNS OF RAILROAD COMPANIES.

Chapter 438 of the Acts of 1902 provides, in section 5, that after the first day of April in the year 1903 the cost of printing and publishing various public documents shall be charged to and paid from the appropriation of the department from which they are issued. Under this law the cost of printing and binding the report of the Railroad Commissioners will be paid from an appropriation made for the expenses of the Railroad Commissioners and assessed upon the railroad companies. Section 84 of chapter 111 of the Revised Laws provides: "At the time of making such annual returns, each railroad corporation shall pay to the treasurer and receiver-general twenty dollars, which shall be applied to the payment of the expense of printing and binding the returns of the several railroad corporations." Insomuch as by chapter 438 of

1902 the entire expense of printing the report, including the returns, is to be borne by the railroad companies, I respectfully recommend that section 84 of chapter 111 of the Revised Laws be repealed.

DUTIES OF THE AUDITOR.

Among other duties devolving upon the Auditor of Accounts is the duty of annually examining the books, accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer and Receiver-General. This duty has been performed during the past year, and I am pleased to certify that I found the books, accounts and vouchers in excellent shape, and the cash and securities, as shown by the books of this department, to be correct.

In my last annual report I called attention to the fact that the Auditor, by virtue of his office, was a member of several commissions, and I respectfully suggested the expediency of legislation to relieve him from service upon some of these. Legislation has since relieved him from service upon the State aid commission and from the duty of examining as to the introduction into reports of maps, plans, etc. The experience of the past year has strengthened an opinion which I had already formed, that some change should be made in the commission on voting machines and ballot-boxes. My service on those commissions has clearly demonstrated that such duties should be entrusted to other hands, and I believe that the Commonwealth should follow the example of other States, where perhaps the matter has received even greater attention than here, and should establish a commission specially qualified by experience to pass upon mechanical devices of these sorts, said commission to receive compensation at the hands of those who present the machines for examination.

As I said in my last report, the responsibilities of this department have so largely increased during recent years that it would seem that the duties incident thereto, if properly attended to, should require all of the time of its head, and I again suggest the expediency of legislation relieving the Auditor from service at least upon the two commissions specially referred to.

ADDITIONAL CLERICAL ASSISTANCE.

In my last annual report, referring to the increase of the work of this department, I respectfully recommended legislation authorizing me to expend \$1,000 for clerical assistance in addition to the amount then authorized by law. My request was granted, but the experience of the past year has demonstrated that the amount appropriated is insufficient, and I respectfully recommend a further increase of \$500.

IN CONCLUSION.

Section 17 of chapter 6 of the Revised Laws provides that the Auditor shall prescribe the number and form of all analytical and subsidiary accounts which shall be made from the accounts of record kept at each institution. Investigation of the methods pursued at the various institutions of the Commonwealth developed the fact that various systems were in use, and it seemed to me desirable that a uniform system should be formulated for all of said institutions. I gave to the subject considerable time and thought, and arranged a system which I believe will show clearly, under proper departments, the expenses of each institution, and make it possible to compare one with another, the accounts being kept upon a uniform basis. This system has been in use for more than a year, as many of the institutions adopted it to take effect at the beginning of their year, that is, upon Oct. 1, 1901. It has seemed to work well, and the reports of the institutions and the details as shown in the report of this department will, I think, establish that fact. I desire to acknowledge that in formulating the system I received valuable aid from Dr. Copp, executive officer of the Board of Insanity.
