## Estimated Revenoe and Receipts.

The estimates of the revenue are based upon existing laws in relation to licenses, fees, the income of certain institutions, etc., and the taxation of property and corporate franchises, and the estimates of receipts upon tares, etc., as provided by law.


It is evident from these figures that a State tax of at least $\$ 2,500,000$ must be levied, unless the General Court provides

## Massachusetts War Lonn.

During the year 1903, uncler authority of chapter 561 of the Acts of 1898 , bouds were issued to the amount of $\$ 5,000$, bearing interest at the rate of 3 per cent. per anuum. This issue was renclered necessary to provide for the State pay of certain soldiers who had failed previously to file their claims. The total issue of this loan up to Jan. 1, 1904, is $\$ 1,240,000$.

## Metropolitan Parks Loan.

During the year bonds to the amount of $\$ 465,000$ have been issued, under authority of chapters 290, 391 and 429 of the Acts of $1903, \$ 365,000$ bearing interest at the rate of $3 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. and $\$ 100,000$ at the rate of $3 \frac{1}{5}$ per cent. per annum. The total issue for park purposes is $\$ 8,020,000$.

## Metropolitan Loan for Parkways and Boulevards.

There have been issued, uncler authority of chapters 293 and 359 of the Acts of 1903 , bouds to the amount of $\$ 410,000$, making a total issue for these purposes of $\$ 3,885,000$. One-half of this loan is to be paid by the State at large, the balance by the metropolitan parks district.

## Metropolitan Sewerage Loan.

During the year 1903 bonds were issued, uncler authority of chapter 429 of the Acts of $1899, \$ 50,000$; and of chapters 24.2 , 315,356 and 399 of the Acts of $1903, \$ 1,450,000$; both issues bearing interest at the rate of $3 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

The total amount of bonds issued for sewerage purposes is $\$ 13,405,912$. Of this amount, $\$ 6,095,000$ was issued for the north metropolitan system and $\$ 7,310,912$ for the south metropolitan system.

## Metropolitan Water Loan.

Under authority of chapter 488 of the Acts of 1895 , additional bonds have been issued to continue the work upon the metropolitan water system, to the amount of $\$ 2,000,000$, making a total issue to Jan. 1, 1904, of $\$ 36,500,000$.

## Prisons and Hospitals Loans.

There have been issued during the year 1903, for the enlargement of certain institutions, the following bonds: -

State House Loan.
Uncler authority of chapter 537 of the Acts of 1901 there has been a further issue of boucls, to the amount of $\$ 380,000$, to be used principally to pay claims arising uncler the law limiting the height of structures on Beacon Hill. These bonds were issued, $\$ 80,000$ at the rate of 3 per cent. per innum and $\$ 300,000$ at the rate of $3 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum, and are due Oct. 1, 1918. The total issue of bonds for all purposes in connection with the construction or remodelling of the State House, up to Jan. 1, 1904, is $\$ 6,790,000$. Of this amount, boncls amounting to $\$ 2,335,000$ became due and were paid July 1, 1901, leaving now outstanding $\$ 4,455,000$.

## State Highway Loan

Under authority of chapters 280 and 384 of the Acts of 1903, bonds to the amount of $\$ 400,000$ were issued for the construction of State highways, bearing interest at the rate of $3 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per anuum. This makes the total issue of bonds for highway purposes, up to Jan. 1, 1904, \$4, 225, 000.
The total amount of loans authorized by the Legislature up to date is $\$ 5,050,000$. The total expenditure up to Jan. 1, 1904, for highways, which inclucles the expenses of the temporary commission and of the permanent commission from appropriations and loans, amounts to $\$ 4,925,268.63$. This does not inclucle any appropriations for interest on the loans or for sinking fund requirements. The receipts have been as follows :-

## Legislation suggested.

Eapenses of Railroad and Gas and Electric Light Commissions.
By existing laws the expenses of these commissions are assessed annually upon the railroad and street railway and gas and electric light companies, respectively. The practice has been to assess such expenses as of the first of July in each year, the assessment covering the payments made by the Commonwealth for the preceding twelve months, thus including six months of two calendar years. This complication of accounts should be avoided, and I suggest legislation which will provicle for the assessment upon these corporations of the amount annually appropriated by the Legislature, any unexpended balance to be made available for the expenses of the succeeding year. This course will reliere the treasury of the Commonwealth, and the atcounts of the fiscal year will show the entire transaction, both payment and assessment, which seems to be very desirable.

Approval ly the Auditor of Official Bonds.
In ouly two cases is the Auditor charged with the duty of approving official bonds, namely, those of the persons designated to receive advances of money by the Metropolitan Park and Metropolitan Water and Sewerage boards. The Treasurer of the Commonwealth is the custodian of these bonds, and in the interest of uniformity, he having the approval of many of such bouds, I suggest legislation transferring this duty from the Auditor to the Treasurer. I make this suggestion with his consent and approval.

## In Conclusion.

I am pleased to certify that, after a careful examination of the books and accounts of the Treasurer and Receiver-General, they were found correct and in very much improved form, through the introduction of new and superior methods of bookkeeping. I am also pleased to certify that the cash and securities, after a most careful examination, were found to be absolutely correct, as shown by the books of this department.
