The contingent debt is a loan of the credit of the Commonwealth to certain metropolitan districts for water, sewerage and parks, and to certain cities for the building of armories; and the interest and sinking fund requirements are annually assessed upon said cities and districts, no portion of the debt being a liability of the Commonwealth at large.

The large increase in the revenue above the estimates indicates general business prosperity. It will be noted that almost all the items show a material increase, the one exception, however, being foreign railroad companies' tax, the decrease in which is due to the fact that the Mexican Central Railroad Company questions the validity of the tax, and that question is being settled by litigation.

ACTUAL REVENUE AND EXPENSES FOR 1905.

Section 24 of chapter 6 of the Revised Laws requires that the Auditor's report shall state whether or not the ordinary expenses of the year have exceeded the income, and show the amount of the balance. In compliance with this provision of law I have to say that—

The cash on hand at the commencement of the year is included in the amount of revenue, in compliance with a provision of law requiring this to be done.

The tables which follow show in summary form, somewhat extended, the revenue and expenses. Table 1 shows the revenue. Table 2 shows the actual expenses, whether paid or unpaid at the close of the year. For purposes of comparison figures for the past five years are given.

The Auditor's estimates cover appropriations and requirements to meet existing legislation, but do not comprehend the probable action of the Legislature in the matter of special appropriations. Your predecessors of 1905 appropriated for purposes not included in the Auditor's estimates about \$700,000. It being apparent that there is already about \$2,800,000 to be provided for, should you appropriate no more than was appropriated last year, the State tax would be \$3,500,000. In the exercise of a wise discretion, should the special appropriations be for a less amount, the tax can be correspondingly reduced.

ARMORY LOAN.

During the year 1905, under the authority of chapter 465 of the Acts of 1905, bonds have been issued to the amount of \$71,000 for the construction and improvement of State armories in the cities of Brockton, Cambridge, Gloucester, Holyoke and Marlborough, bearing interest as follows:—

The total amount of bonds issued for armories is \$2,100,000.

CHARLES RIVER BASIN LOAN.

During the year 1905 bonds have been issued under the authority of chapter 465 of the Acts of 1903, which provides for the construction of a dam across the Charles River between the cities of Boston and Cambridge, to the amount of \$400,000, bearing interest at 3½ per cent., making a total issue for this purpose of \$650,000.

METROPOLITAN PARKS LOAN.

During the year 1905 bonds have been issued to the amount of \$370,000, bearing interest at the rate of 3½ per cent., \$300,000 under the authority of chapter 429 of the Acts of 1903, which provides for an annual issue of that amount in each year for five years, and \$70,000 under the authority of chapter 326 of the Acts of 1904, for the construction of a public bath house on Nahant Beach. The total issue for park purposes is \$8,690,000.

METROPOLITAN LOAN FOR PARKWAYS AND BOULEVARDS.

During the year 1905 bonds were issued under the authority of chapter 419 of the Acts of 1903 to the amount of \$300,000, bearing interest at 3½ per cent., making a total issue for these purposes of \$4,485,000. This is the third annual issue of the same amount, the act referred to providing for such annual issue for five years. One-half of this loan is the debt of the State at large, the balance of the metropolitan park district.

METROPOLITAN SEWERAGE LOAN.

There has been no further issue of bonds, either for the north or the south system, during the year. The total amount of bonds issued for sewerage purposes is \$13,797,912. Of this amount, \$6,095,000 was issued for the north metropolitan system and \$7,702,912 for the south metropolitan system.

METROPOLITAN WATER LOAN.

Under authority of chapter 488 of the Acts of 1895, additional bonds have been issued to continue the work of the metropolitan water system to the amount of \$650,000, making the total issue to Jan. 1, 1906, \$39,150,000.

PRISONS AND HOSPITALS LOAN.

During the year 1905 bonds have been issued, under the authority of chapter 446 of the Acts of 1904 and chapter 128 of the Acts of 1905, to the amount of \$300,000, for the establishment of the Massachusetts School and Home for Crippled and Deformed Children.

STATE HOUSE LOAN.

Under the authority of chapter 537 of the Acts of 1901 there has been a further issue of bonds to the amount of \$60,000, to be used principally to pay claims arising under the law limiting the height of structures on Beacon Hill. These bonds were issued at the rate of 3½ per cent., and are due Oct. 1, 1918. The total issue of bonds for all purposes in connection with the construction or remodelling of the State House, to Jan. 1, 1906, is \$7,080,000.

The bonds now outstanding amount to \$4,745,000.

STATE HIGHWAY LOAN.

Under the authority of chapter 280 of the Acts of 1903, bonds to the amount of \$250,000 were issued for the construction of State highways, bearing interest at the rate of 3½ per cent. This

makes a total issue of bonds for highway purposes, to Jan. 1, 1906, of \$4,775,000.

The total amount of loans authorized by the Legislature is \$6,850,000.

The total expenditures to Jan. 1, 1906, which includes the expenses of the temporary commission and of the permanent commission, from appropriations and loans, have been \$6,113,591.76.

This amount does not include interest or sinking fund requirements.

The receipts in 1905 have been as follows: —

From assessments on counties,	\$153,693 58
From assessments on street railways,	3,297 72

These receipts are credited to the loan, increasing the amount available for highway construction.

IN CONCLUSION.

The system inaugurated in January, 1905, has accomplished the purpose for which it was established, and is found to work admirably, bringing the books of the treasury and Auditor's department into daily accord, and accomplishing a daily audit of the treasury transactions.

I have made a careful examination of the treasury, and find the securities and cash to be absolutely correct, as shown by the books of this department.
