The contingent debt is a loan of the credit of the Commonwealth to certain metropolitan districts for water, sewerage and parks, and to certain cities for the building of armories; and the interest and sinking fund requirements are annually assessed upon said cities and districts, no portion of the debt being a liability of the Commonwealth at large.

The excess of revenue over the estimates is gratifying, and indicates that the estimates were conservative, as they were intended to be. In the five years last past the revenue of the Commonwealth applicable to its running expenses has increased a little over \$1,000,000, or an average of about \$200,000 a year,

showing that the present methods of indirect taxation are producing results in some degree relative to the increase in population and wealth. The estimate as to the foreign railway companies' tax was based upon the expected tax from the Mexican Central Railroad Company, which was then in litigation. The courts determined the question in favor of the company, which contended that it was taxable under the business corporation act, instead of chapter 14, section 52, of the Revised Laws. This company's tax will this year be found in the corporation tax, under business corporations.

REVENUE AND EXPENSES FOR 1906.

Section 24 of chapter 6 of the Revised Laws requires that the Auditor's report shall state whether or not the ordinary expenses of the year have exceeded the income, and show the amount of the balance. In compliance with this provision of law I have to say that —

During the year 1906, under the authority of chapter 465 of the Acts of 1905, bonds have been issued to the amount of \$122,000, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., for the construction and improvement of the following State armories:—

CHARLES RIVER BASIN LOAN.

During the year 1906 bonds have been issued under the authority of chapter 465 of the Acts of 1903, which provides for the construction of a dam across the Charles River between the cities of Boston and Cambridge, to the amount of \$515,000, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., making a total issue for this purpose of \$1,165,000.

METROPOLITAN PARKS LOAN.

During the year 1906 bonds have been issued to the amount of \$299,000, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., under the authority of chapter 429 of the Acts of 1903, which provides for an annual issue of bonds in each year for five years. The total issue for park purposes is \$8,989,000.

METROPOLITAN LOAN FOR PARKWAYS AND BOULEVARDS.

During the year 1906 bonds were issued under the authority of chapter 419 of the Acts of 1903 to the amount of \$300,000, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., making a total issue for

these purposes of \$4,785,000. This is the fourth annual issue of the same amount, the act referred to providing for such annual issue for five years. One-half of this loan is the debt of the State at large, the balance of the metropolitan park district.

METROPOLITAN SEWERAGE LOAN.

Under authority of chapter 319 of the Acts of 1906 there were issued bonds amounting to \$55,000 for an extension of the north metropolitan system in the city of Malden; also, under authority of chapter 406 of the Acts of 1906 there were issued bonds amounting to \$154,000 for an extension of the south metropolitan system in West Roxbury, Brookline and Brighton; both issues bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., making a total issue for sewerage purposes of \$14,006,912. Of this amount, \$6,150,000 was issued for the north metropolitan system and \$7,856,912 for the south metropolitan system.

METROPOLITAN WATER LOAN.

Under authority of chapter 488 of the Acts of 1895 additional bonds have been issued to continue the work on the metropolitan water system to the amount of \$1,043,000, making the total issue to Dec. 1, 1906, \$40,193,000.

STATE HOUSE LOAN.

Under the authority of chapter 537 of the Acts of 1901 there has been a further issue of bonds to the amount of \$40,000, to pay claims arising under the law limiting the height of structures on Beacon Hill. These bonds were issued at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., and are due Oct. 1, 1918. The total issue of bonds for all purposes in connection with the construction or remodelling of the State House, to Dec. 1, 1906, is \$7,120,000.

The bonds now outstanding amount to \$4,785,000.

STATE HIGHWAY LOAN.

Under the authority of chapter 280 of the Acts of 1903 bonds to the amount of \$286,000 were issued for the construction of State highways, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. This makes a total issue of bonds for highway purposes, to Dec. 1, 1906, of \$5,061,000.

The total expenditures to Dec. 1, 1906, including the expenses of both the temporary and permanent commissions, from appropriations and loans, have been \$6,658,650.03.

This amount does not include interest or sinking fund requirements.

These receipts are credited to the loan, increasing the amount available for highway construction.

LEGISLATION SUGGESTED.

Amendments to Chapter 211, Acts of 1905.

I respectfully suggest that section 3 of chapter 211 of the Acts of 1905 be amended by striking out, from the first line of said section, the word "December," leaving it optional to the Auditor to examine annually, but at such time as he may select. Preparation of the various reports which the Auditor must submit to the Legislature on the first Wednesday in January makes it difficult to make the thorough examination which is contemplated in the month of December, and for obvious reasons the date should be left indefinite.

Also, that section 4 of said chapter be amended by making the date of submission of the abstract of the Auditor's report the second instead of the first Wednesday in January.

Additional Clerical Assistance.

To carry out certain plans which I believe will increase the efficiency of this department, I suggest that section 14 of chapter 6 of the Revised Laws and amendments thereto be further amended by increasing the amount provided for additional clerical assistance in the sum of \$1,500.

Sinking Funds.

In making the annual examination of the books, accounts and vouchers of the Treasurer and Receiver-General I have given particular attention to the accounts of the sinking funds; and, while I am not in full accord with the present methods of handling these funds, I have found that they are all in strong condition, and in many cases hold amounts largely in excess of what I consider legal requirements. One fund in particular, however, the abolition of grade crossings loan sinking fund, holds an amount very largely in excess of any possible requirement. In his annual report for the year 1905 the Treasurer and Receiver-General stated that the amount then in that sinking fund would at the maturity of the loans issued amount to about \$11,968,430.11, while the total amount of the loans outstanding was \$8,300,000. This fund at the close of the fiscal year, Nov. 30, 1906, amounted to \$6,870,647.29. The amount necessary to retire the outstanding loans of \$8,300,000 at maturity, figured upon a 3 per cent. basis, is \$4,842,500, showing that this fund holds an excess above possible requirement of \$2,028,147.29.

Section 70 of chapter 6 of the Revised Laws reads as follows:

"When the accumulations of a sinking fund of the Commonwealth are sufficient to extinguish at maturity the indebtedness for which it was established, its subsequent accumulations *may* be added by the treasurer to any sinking fund which is not sufficient to meet the indebtedness for which it was established." If the word "may" in the section quoted is to be interpreted "shall," the excess in this sinking fund should be distributed without further legislation; but if action in the matter is optional with the treasurer, I suggest the expediency of further legislation to require the distribution of this excess, in order that unnecessary taxation may be avoided. It appears to me that failure to distribute this large amount among the other sinking funds necessarily increases the annual contributions to be made to these funds, and I therefore respectfully call your attention to the existing condition.
