The debt incurred for State purposes is payable by the Commonwealth at large. The contingent debt is a loan of the credit of the Commonwealth to certain metropolitan districts for water, sewerage and parks, and to certain cities for the building of armories; and the interest and sinking fund requirements are annually assessed upon said cities and districts, no portion of the debt being a liability of the Commonwealth at large.

REVENUE AND EXPENSES FOR 1907.

Section 24 of chapter 6 of the Revised Laws requires that the Auditor's report shall state whether or not the ordinary expenses of the year have exceeded the income, and show the amount of the balance. In compliance with this provision of law I have to say that—

The actual running expenses of the State government for 1907 were \$10,758,532 86
The income or revenue applicable thereto was \$6,664,878 89
To which is to be added the cash on hand Dec. 1, 1906, 2,248,777 85

Showing a deficiency in income or revenue of \$1,844,876 12

The cash on hand at the commencement of the year is included in the amount of revenue, in compliance with a provision of law.

The tables which follow show in summary form, somewhat extended, the revenue and expenses. Table 1 shows the revenue. Table 2 shows the actual expenses, whether paid or unpaid at the close of the year. For purposes of comparison, figures for the past five years are given.

The estimated expenses for the coming fiscal year exceed those of the past year by a little over one million dollars, the excess being mainly due to two causes, viz.: the expense of acquiring the militia armories under chapter 526 of the Acts of 1907, estimated at \$400,000; and the increased demands of institutions, due to the increasing number of inmates, the higher cost of supplies of all kinds and the operation of new laws reducing the hours of labor. It will be noted that the balance unprovided for is about \$4,000,000, which was the amount of the State tax for 1907. The Auditor's estimates cover only such appropriations as existing legislation requires, and all special appropriations of the present session must be added in determining the tax for 1908, which must evidently be the largest for many years. Only twice since 1853 has the State tax exceeded \$4,000,000, viz.: in 1865, \$4,700,000; and in 1867, \$5,000,000.

ABOLITION OF GRADE CROSSINGS LOAN.

During the year 1907 bonds have been issued, under the authority of chapter 440 of the Acts of 1902, for the further abolition of grade crossings, to the amount of \$500,000, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., making a total issue for this purpose of \$8,800,000. The total amount which has been authorized by the various acts is \$14,000,000.

Section 5 of chapter 440 of the Acts of 1902 provides that: "The amount so to be paid by the Commonwealth in any one year shall not exceed five hundred thousand dollars, but if in any one year the expenditure by the Commonwealth shall not amount to five hundred thousand dollars, the unexpended remainder thereof shall be added to the five hundred thousand dollars allowed to be paid by it in any subsequent year."

During the year 1907, under the authority of chapter 465 of the Acts of 1905, bonds have been issued to the amount of \$303,500, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., for the construction or improvement of the following State armories: —

Chapter 526 of the Acts of 1907 provides for the taking by the

the proceeds of these bonds, repaying to the cities and towns the amounts which they have paid into the sinking funds with the accumulations thereof less the amounts which the Commonwealth has paid the cities and towns for rentals. The act in question was made to take effect Dec. 2, 1907, and when the taking is completed the armory loan will become a part of the direct debt of the Commonwealth, and the sinking fund established for the payment thereof will become its property. The said chapter provides for further issues of bonds of this loan for the construction of new armories not exceeding three yearly.

CHARLES RIVER BASIN LOAN.

During the year 1907 bonds have been issued under the authority of chapter 465 of the Acts of 1903, which provides for the construction of a dam across the Charles River between the cities of Boston and Cambridge, to the amount of \$1,235,000, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., making a total issue for this purpose of \$2,400,000. When this work is finished the Metropolitan Park Commission will have exclusive control of the dam, etc., as a part of the metropolitan park system, subject to the powers vested by law in the State Board of Health.

METROPOLITAN PARKS LOAN.

During the year 1907 bonds have been issued to the amount of \$301,000, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., under the authority of chapter 429 of the Acts of 1903, which provides for an annual issue of bonds in each year for five years, of which this is the last. The total issue for park purposes is \$9,290,000.

METROPOLITAN LOAN FOR PARKWAYS AND BOULEVARDS.

During the year 1907 bonds were issued under the authority of chapter 419 of the Acts of 1903 to the amount of \$300,000, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., making a total issue for these purposes of \$5,085,000. This is the fifth annual issue of the same amount, the act referred to providing for such annual issue for five years. One-half of this loan is the debt of the State at large; the balance, of the metropolitan park district.

METROPOLITAN SEWERAGE LOAN.

Under authority of chapter 406 of the Acts of 1906 there were issued bonds amounting to \$321,000 for an extension of the south

bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., making a total issue for sewerage purposes of \$14,327,912. Of this amount, \$6,150,000 was issued for the north metropolitan system and \$8,177,912 for the south metropolitan system.

METROPOLITAN WATER LOAN.

Under authority of chapter 488 of the Acts of 1895 additional bonds have been issued to continue the work on the metropolitan water system to the amount of \$307,000, making the total issue to Dec. 1, 1907, \$40,500,000.

STATE HIGHWAY LOAN FUND.

Under authority of chapter 280 of the Acts of 1903 bonds to the amount of \$374,000 were issued for the construction of State highways, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. This makes a total issue of bonds for highway purposes, to Dec. 1, 1907, of \$5,435,000.

Chapter 446 of the Acts of 1907 authorized the Massachusetts Highway Commission to expend during the years 1908, 1909, 1910, 1911 and 1912 a sum not exceeding \$2,500,000 for the construction of State highways. Of this sum, not more than \$500,000 can be expended in any one year, but an unexpended balance in any year may be used in the succeeding year. This amount is to be raised by further issues of bonds.

SUFFOLK COUNTY COURT HOUSE LOAN.

Chapter 534 of the Acts of 1906, as amended by chapter 209 of the Acts of 1907, provides for the enlargement of or an addition to the court house in the county of Suffolk by a commission of three persons, one to be appointed by the governor, one by the mayor of the city of Boston, and one by the chief justices of the supreme and superior courts and of the municipal court of the city of Boston. The total expenditure authorized is \$800,000, and the Treasurer and Receiver-General is required to issue bonds to that amount if necessary, for a term not exceeding thirty years. The city of Boston is to pay to the Commonwealth two-thirds of each and every instalment of principal and interest when the same becomes due and payable. Under authority of this act, bonds amounting to \$180,000 have been issued, payable \$6,000 each year from 1908 to and including 1937, bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum.

TECHNICAL EDUCATION FUND, UNITED STATES GRANT.

Chapter 121 of the Acts of 1907 authorized the Treasurer to issue on account of this fund bonds of the prisons and hospitals loan to the amount of \$219,000, to date Jan. 1, 1907, and to be payable after one year from that date at the option of the Treasurer and Receiver-General, with the approval of the Governor and Council, and to bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum. This fund, which amounts to \$219,000, is the proceeds of a grant of land scrip made by the United States in 1863 to the Commonwealth for the promotion of education in agricultural and the

should yield 5 per cent. per annum. For many years it was possible to invest the fund so as to yield this percentage, but since 1903 it has been necessary to make a revenue appropriation annually to provide for a deficiency in income. To avoid the necessity of this annual appropriation the act above mentioned was passed, permitting the issuance of bonds at a special rate for this specific purpose. The annual income of this fund is apportioned two-thirds to the Massachusetts Agricultural College and one-third to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

LEGISLATION SUGGESTED.

Amendment to Chapter 211 of the Acts of 1905.

I respectfully renew a suggestion made in my last annual report, namely, that section 4 of the above-quoted chapter be amended by making the date of submission of the abstract of the Auditor's report the second instead of the first Wednesday in January. Experience has demonstrated that the time between the closing of the accounts and the submission of the abstract is so short as to make it almost impossible to comply with the terms of the law.

Amendments to Chapter 139 of the Acts of 1907.

Section 1 of this act repeals section 21 of chapter 6 of the Revised Laws, and inserts a new section 21, which provides, among other duties of the Auditor, that he shall audit the accounts of all State officials, boards and institutions receiving moneys to be turned into the treasury of the Commonwealth. I suggest an amendment making it clear that the term "State officials" does not apply to those officials whose accounts the Controller of County Accounts is by law required to examine.

Section 2 of said chapter 139 provides for the repeal of section 14 of chapter 6 of the Revised Laws, and inserts in place thereof a new section. The experience of the past year has shown that the amount provided by this section for clerks, examiners, stenographers and additional clerical assistance is insufficient. I find that it is impossible with one examiner to audit the accounts as provided with such frequency as is desirable, and I therefore respectfully suggest that the amount of \$14,000 be increased to \$16,000.

Sinking Funds.

For the reasons stated at length in my last annual report, I renew the suggestion that section 70 of chapter 6 of the Revised Laws, which reads, "When the accumulations of a sinking fund

of the Commonwealth are sufficient to extinguish at maturity the indebtedness for which it was established, its subsequent accumulations *may* be added by the treasurer to any sinking fund which is not sufficient to meet the indebtedness for which it was established," be amended by striking out the word "may" and inserting in place thereof the word "shall."

An Emergency Appropriation.

Notwithstanding the careful manner in which appropriations are made by the Legislature, and through no fault of the officials charged with the expenditure of these appropriations, the experience is that they frequently prove insufficient to meet the necessary expenditures. When an appropriation is exhausted, there is no fund from which the just claims of the creditors of the Commonwealth can be paid, and such claims cannot be in any way provided for until the assembling of the Legislature. This results in delaying payment sometimes for three months, and occasions very great inconvenience, and in the present strenuous year has occasioned serious loss. I respectfully suggest that an emergency appropriation be made, from which transfers can be made to such appropriations as have proved insufficient, upon the recommendation of the Auditor, with the approval of the Governor and Council.

IN CONCLUSION.

The additional duties imposed upon the Auditor by chapter 139 of the Acts of 1907 he has endeavored to discharge. The accounts which he was required by said chapter to audit have all been carefully examined at least once during the year. Many changes in methods have been made, and all suggestions made by him have been cheerfully acceded to. It is his intention during the coming year to see that a uniform system of bookkeeping is installed in all the institutions.
