The cash on hand at the commencement of the year is included in the amount of revenue, in compliance with a provision of law.

The total requirements exceed those of the previous fiscal year by something over \$200,000, while the estimated revenue, including cash on hand, is less than that of last year by something over \$400,000. The increases and decreases as compared with the appropriations for the past year are shown in the recapitulation of expenses, and the details of estimated revenue are shown above. These estimates cover only such appropriations as existing legislation requires, and all special appropriations of the present session must be added in determining the amount of the State tax.

ABOLITION OF GRADE CROSSINGS LOAN.

During the year 1909 bonds were issued, under the authority of chapter 463 of the Acts of 1906, for the further abolition of grade crossings, to the amount of \$500,000, \$250,000 bearing interest at the rate of 3 per cent., and \$250,000 bearing interest at the rate of 3½ per cent., making a total issue for the purpose of \$9,800,000. Under the general laws there have been authorized \$10,000,000 and under special laws there have been authorized and issued for Tremont Street, Boston, Hyde Park and Dedham, \$3,000,000, and for Congress Street, Boston, \$300,000, making a total of \$13,300,000 authorized.

Section 42 of chapter 463 of the Acts of 1906 provides that: "The amount to be paid by the Commonwealth in any one year shall not exceed five hundred thousand dollars, but if in any one year the expenditure of the Commonwealth shall not amount to five hundred thousand dollars, the unexpended remainder thereof shall be added to the five hundred thousand dollars allowed to be paid by it in any subsequent year."

ARMORY LOAN.

Under authority of chapter 567 of the Acts of 1908, bonds to the amount of \$5,500 have been issued for enlarging and completing the armory in the town of Framingham; and under authority of chapter 526 of the Acts of 1907, as amended by chapter 323 of the Acts of 1909, bonds have been issued as follows: for rebuilding the armory in the city of Chelsea, which was destroyed by fire, the sum of \$40,000; and for a new armory in the town of Hingham, the sum of \$40,000. Of these bonds, \$40,500 were issued with interest at the rate of 3½ per cent. per annum, and \$45,000 at the rate of 3 per cent. per annum, — all for the term of thirty years, — making a total issue of bonds for armories of \$3,051,500.

Chapter 321 of the Acts of 1909 authorizes the issue of bonds to the amount of \$6,000, for a term not exceeding thirty years, with interest not exceeding 4 per cent., for the purpose of paying the city of Brockton for land taken in building their armory. No bonds have been issued as yet.

CHARLES RIVER BASIN LOAN.

During the year 1909 bonds have been issued under the authority of chapter 465 of the Acts of 1903, which provides for the construction of a dam across the Charles River between the cities of Boston and Cambridge, to the amount of \$850,000, \$425,000 bearing interest at the rate of 3 per cent. and \$425,000 bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., making a total issue for this purpose of \$3,650,000. When this work is finished the Metropolitan Park Commission will have exclusive control of the dam, etc., as a part of the metropolitan park system, subject to the powers vested by law in the State Board of Health.

METROPOLITAN PARKS LOAN.

During the year 1909, under the authority of chapter 652 of the Acts of 1908, for the purpose of completing the work now under way on Mystic River and for the protection of certain land of the Commonwealth on the Winthrop shore, bonds have been issued to the amount of \$70,000, \$35,000 bearing interest at the rate of 3 per cent. and \$35,000 bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. The total issue for park purposes is \$9,485,000.

METROPOLITAN LOAN FOR PARKWAYS AND BOULEVARDS.

Under authority of chapter 651 of the Acts of 1908 bonds have been issued to the amount of \$50,000, \$25,000 bearing interest at the rate of 3 per cent. and \$25,000 bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., for completing the land requirements for the Alewife Brook improvements and Fresh Pond parkway. One-half of this loan is the debt of the State at large; the balance, of the metropolitan park district. For boulevards, the total issue to date is \$5,135,000.

METROPOLITAN SEWERAGE LOAN.

Under the authority of chapter 556 of the Acts of 1908, bonds were issued amounting to \$300,000, \$150,000 bearing interest at the rate of 3 per cent. and \$150,000 bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., for the purpose of constructing extensions and additions at the East Boston pumping station and for the Deer Island pumping station of the north metropolitan system, making a total issue for sewerage purposes of \$15,327,912. Of this amount, \$6,450,000 was issued for the north metropolitan system and \$8,877,912 for the south metropolitan system.

METROPOLITAN WATER LOAN.

Under authority of chapter 558 of the Acts of 1908, bonds have been issued to the amount of \$398,000, \$199,000 bearing interest at the rate of 3 per cent. and \$199,000 bearing interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., to make certain improvements in the metropolitan water works and to provide for the payment of claims. Total issue to Dec. 1, 1909, \$40,898,000.

Chapter 320 of the Acts of the year 1909 authorizes the issue of bonds to the amount of \$900,000, to provide for a 60-inch main from the terminus

of the Weston aqueduct to connect with the present mains near Chestnut Hill reservoir, for additional pumping machinery at the Chestnut Hill pumping station and for cesspools and other improvements to the water system. The provisions of section 17 of chapter 488 of the Acts of 1895 apply to the issue herein provided for, which are that the terms shall not be less than thirty years nor more than forty years, and shall bear interest not exceeding 4 per cent. No bonds have been issued up to date.

Of the bonds issued during the present year, amounting to \$335,800, \$210,800 bear interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. and \$125,000 bear interest at the rate of 3 per cent.

Chapter 401 of the Acts of 1909 authorizes the issue of bonds to the amount of \$1,000,000 to provide funds for the payment to the city of Boston for the insane hospital taken by the Commonwealth. The term provided is thirty years, and the interest not to exceed 4 per cent. No bonds have been issued. As provided for in section 2, the Treasurer and Receiver-General borrowed \$1,000,000 in anticipation of the issue of bonds with interest at $3\frac{1}{8}$ per cent., issuing temporary notes due March 1, 1910.

Chapter 414 of the Acts of 1909 authorizes the issue of bonds to the amount of \$15,000, for a term not exceeding thirty years, at a rate of interest not exceeding 4 per cent., for finishing and properly equipping the three new sanatoriums and for grading the land about the same. No bonds have been issued as yet.

Chapter 470 of the Acts of 1909 authorizes the establishment in the city of Boston of a hospital for the observation and treatment of mental diseases. A bond issue of \$600,000 is provided for, for a term not exceeding thirty years, interest not to exceed 4 per cent. Any land or rights in land acquired under authority of this act shall be under the control of the trustees of the Boston State Hospital, and any buildings erected thereon shall be a part of said hospital. Bonds to the amount of \$80,000 have been issued under authority of this act.

Chapter 475 of the Acts of 1909 authorizes the issue of bonds to the amount of \$118,000, for a term not exceeding thirty years, at a rate of interest not exceeding 4 per cent., for the construction of new buildings at the Monson State Hospital. No bonds have been issued as yet.

Chapter 489 of the Acts of 1909 authorizes the increase of bonds to the amount of \$41,000, for a term not exceeding thirty years, at a rate of interest not exceeding 4 per cent., for the purpose of finishing and equipping the Industrial School for Boys. No bonds have been issued as yet.

Chapter 522 of the Acts of 1909 authorizes the issue of bonds to the amount of \$508,000, for a term not exceeding thirty years, at a rate of interest not exceeding 4 per cent., to provide for the construction or enlargement of certain public institutions and for the proper care of the insane, to wit:—

STATE HIGHWAY LOAN.

Under the authority of chapter 446 of the Acts of 1907, bonds to the amount of \$380,000 were issued for the construction of State highways, \$200,000 bearing interest at the rate of 3 per cent., and \$180,000 bearing interest at the rate of 3½ per cent. This makes a total issue of bonds for highway purposes, to Dec. 1, 1909, of \$6,310,000.

Chapter 446 of the Acts of 1907 authorized the Massachusetts Highway Commission to expend during the years 1908, 1909, 1910, 1911 and 1912 a sum not exceeding \$2,500,000 for the construction of State highways. Of this sum, not more than \$500,000 can be expended in any one year, but an unexpended balance in any one year may be used in the succeeding year. This amount is to be raised by further issue of bonds.

Chapter 511 of the Acts of 1909 authorizes the issue of bonds to the amount of \$15,000, for a term not exceeding ten years, and interest not exceeding 4 per cent., for the construction and improvement of a certain highway in the county of Berkshire. No bonds have been issued as yet.

SUFFOLK COUNTY COURT HOUSE LOAN.

Chapter 534 of the Acts of 1906, as amended by chapter 209 of the Acts of 1907, and still further amended by chapters 215 and 603 of the Acts of 1908, provides for the enlargement of or an addition to the court house in the county of Suffolk by a commission of three persons, one to be appointed by the Governor, one by the mayor of the city of Boston, and one by the chief justices of the supreme and superior courts and of the municipal court of the city of Boston. The total expenditure authorized is \$910,000, and the Treasurer and Receiver-General is required to issue bonds to that amount, if necessary, for a term not exceeding thirty years. The city of Boston is to pay to the Commonwealth two-thirds of each and every instalment of principal and interest when the same becomes due and payable. Under the authority of this act, serial bonds amounting to \$360,000 have been issued, payable each year from 1908 to and including 1938, bearing interest at the rate of 3½ per cent. per annum.

Under the provisions of chapter 549 of the Acts of 1908, transfers to the appropriations stated above were made from the appropriation for extraordinary expenses, upon the recommendation of the Auditor, with the approval of the Governor and Council.

IN CONCLUSION.

Under the provisions of chapter 597 of the Acts of 1908 the Auditor has established a uniform system of accounts in each department, and for the institutions a system has been devised and established in most of them which has met with general satisfaction. During the year his supervisors have visited the various departments and institutions from time to time. He believes that the system now in use by the various departments provides for the proper accounting of all receipts and expenditures, and it will be noticed that this year all the institutions have kept within their appropriations.

A careful examination of the books and accounts of the Treasurer and Receiver-General has been made, and the cash and securities found to be correct, as shown by the books of this department.
