The debt incurred for State purposes is payable by the Commonwealth at large. The contingent debt is a loan of the credit of the Commonwealth to certain metropolitan districts for water, sewerage and parks, and the interest and sinking fund requirements are annually assessed upon said districts. The contingent debt also includes the loans on account of the Suffolk County Court House and the Marblehead breakwater and highway. No portion of this debt is a liability of the Commonwealth at large.

The cash on hand at the commencement of the year is included in the amount of revenue, in compliance with a provision of law.

## ABOLITION OF GRADE CROSSINGS LOAN FUND.

During the year 1910 bonds were issued, under the authority of chapter 463 of the Acts of 1906, for the further abolition of grade crossings, to the amount of \$500,000, bearing interest at the rate of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., making a total issue for the purpose of \$10,300,000. Under the general laws there have been authorized \$10,000,000 and under special laws there have been authorized and issued for Tremont Street, Boston, Hyde Park and Dedham, \$3,000,000, and for Congress Street, Boston, \$300,000, making a total of \$13,300,000 authorized.

As provided in section 39 of chapter 463 of the Acts of 1906, advances have been made for cities and towns which have not as yet been returned of \$822,816.49.

Section 42 of chapter 463 of the Acts of 1906 provides that: "The amount to be paid by the Commonwealth in any one year shall not exceed five hundred thousand dollars, but if in any one year the expenditure of the Commonwealth shall not amount to five hundred thousand dollars, the unexpended remainder thereof shall be added to the five hundred thousand dollars allowed to be paid by it in any subsequent year."

## ARMORY LOAN.

Under authority of chapter 321 of the Acts of 1909, bonds to the amount of \$6,000 have been issued for reimbursing the city of Brockton for land on which the State armory is located, and under authority of chapter 604 of the acts of 1908, as amended by chapter 323 of the Acts of 1909, bonds to the amount of \$140,000 have been issued as follows: \$50,000 for a new armory in the town of Greenfield and \$40,000 for repairs to one of the armories in the city of Worcester, said bonds bearing interest at the rate of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., for a term of thirty years. Under authority of chapter 123 of the Acts of the year 1910, temporary notes were issued to the amount of \$184,000, due March 1, 1911, bearing interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum, for the following purposes: \$41,000 for the purchase of an armory from the city of Everett; \$31,000 for the purchase of an armory from the town of Plymouth; \$56,000 for a new armory in the city of Newton; and \$56,000 for a new armory in the town of Hudson,—making a total issue of bonds and notes for armories of \$3,381,500.

## CHARLES RIVER BASIN LOAN.

During the year 1910 bonds have been issued under the authority of chapter 465 of the Acts of 1903, which provides for the construction of a dam across the Charles River between the cities of Boston and Cambridge, to the amount of \$475,000, bearing interest at the rate of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.; and under authority of chapter 123 of the Acts of 1910, temporary notes to the amount of \$75,000, bearing interest at the rate of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., due March 1, 1911, making a total issued for this purpose of \$4,200,000. The control of the Charles River Basin was transferred to the Metropolitan Park Commission July 1, 1910, and became a part of the park system.

## COMMONWEALTH'S FLATS AT EAST BOSTON.

Chapter 648 of the Acts of 1910 authorized the issue of \$3,000,000 of bonds for the purpose of improving, under certain conditions, certain flats. No bonds have been issued.

## METROPOLITAN PARKS LOAN.

Chapter 628 of the Acts of 1910 authorizes the Metropolitan Park Commission to rebuild certain bridges over the Charles River and to acquire additional land along said river, and authorizes an issue of bonds to the amount of \$50,000 as an addition to the metropolitan parks loan for the purpose of purchasing land. The rebuilding of bridges is provisional upon the consent of the United States government. No bonds have been issued during the year 1910 for park purposes, and the total issue to date is \$9,485,000.

## METROPOLITAN LOAN FOR PARKWAYS AND BOULEVARDS.

No bonds were issued for parkways and boulevards in 1910. For boulevards the total issue to date is \$5,135,000.

## METROPOLITAN SEWERAGE LOAN.

Chapter 546 of the Acts of 1910 provides for the addition of the town of Braintree to the south metropolitan sewerage system, and authorizes the Metropolitan Water and Sewerage Board to provide an outlet at the Braintree town line for the sewage of said town. Said chapter also authorized an issue of bonds to the amount of \$100,000 for the construction of said work.

Chapter 547 provides for an outlet for the sewage of the cities of Malden and Everett into the north metropolitan sewerage system, and authorizes an issue of bonds to the amount of \$56,000 to carry out the provisions of said act. Both of these issues are for a period not exceeding thirty years, with interest at a rate not exceeding 4 per cent. per annum. No bonds have been issued for these purposes.

During the year 1910 bonds have been issued, under authority of chapter 556 of the Acts of 1908, to the amount of \$113,000, bearing interest at the rate of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., for the purpose of constructing extensions and additions at the East Boston pumping station and for the Deer Island pumping station of the north metropolitan system, making a total issue for sewerage purposes of \$15,440,912. Of this amount, \$6,563,000 was issued for the north metropolitan system and \$8,877,912 for the south metropolitan system.

#### METROPOLITAN WATER LOAN.

Chapter 291 of the Acts of 1910 authorizes the Metropolitan Water and Sewerage Board to make certain improvements in the metropolitan water system, to improve the supply of the East Boston district in the city of Boston, and for a new main for the extension of the high-service district in Arlington and Lexington, and authorized an issue of bonds to an amount not exceeding \$80,000 as an addition to the amount already authorized. No bonds have been issued for this purpose.

During the year bonds have been issued, under authority of chapter 320 of the Acts of the year 1909, to the amount of \$500,000, bearing interest at the rate of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., to provide for a 60-inch main from the terminus of the Weston aqueduct to connect with the present mains near Chestnut Hill reservoir, for additional pumping machinery at the Chestnut Hill pumping station and for cesspools and other improvements to the water system. The provisions of section 17 of chapter 488 of the Acts of 1895 apply to these bonds, which are issued for forty years. The total issue to Dec. 1, 1910, is \$41,398,000.

#### PRISONS AND HOSPITALS LOAN.

Chapter 644 of the Acts of 1910 provides for certain improvements at the Boston State Hospital, and authorizes an issue of bonds to the amount of \$358,000, for a term not exceeding thirty years and at a rate of interest not exceeding 4 per cent. per annum. No bonds have been issued under the provisions of this act.

#### STATE HIGHWAY LOAN.

Chapter 527 of the Acts of 1910 provides, upon its acceptance by the city council of the city of Boston, for the construction of a State highway as a part of Washington Street in the West Roxbury district in the city of Boston by the Massachusetts Highway Commission, and the Treasurer and Receiver-General is thereby authorized to issue for this purpose certificates of indebtedness in the manner prescribed by chapter 574 of the Acts of 1907, to an amount not exceeding \$70,000.

Chapter 646 of the Acts of 1910 authorizes the Massachusetts Highway Commission to make certain purchases and takings of land in the town of Revere for the purpose of laying out and constructing a highway in said town; and to meet the expenditures authorized by this act authority is given to the Treasurer and Receiver-General to issue bonds to an amount not exceeding \$125,000, in the manner provided by section 2 of chapter 616 of the Acts of 1908.

Under the authority of chapter 446 of the Acts of 1907, bonds have been issued for the construction of State highways to the amount of \$270,000; and under authority of chapter 511 of the Acts of 1909, bonds to the amount of \$15,000 have been issued for the construction and improvement of a certain highway in the county of Berkshire. These bonds bear interest at the rate of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. The total issue of bonds for highway purposes to Dec. 1, 1910, is \$6,595,000.

## MARBLEHEAD BREAKWATER AND HIGHWAY.

Under authority of chapter 578 of the Acts of 1910, which authorizes the Massachusetts Highway Commission to construct a breakwater and highway in the town of Marblehead, notes have been issued to the amount of \$50,000, bearing interest at the rate of 4 per cent., payable Nov. 16, 1911, the Commonwealth to pay 65 per cent., the county of Essex 25 per cent. and the town of Marblehead 10 per cent.

## SUFFOLK COUNTY COURT HOUSE LOAN.

Chapter 534 of the Acts of 1906, as amended by chapter 209 of the Acts of 1907, by chapters 215 and 603 of the Acts of 1908, and chapter 522 of the Acts of 1910, provides for the enlargement of or an addition to the Court House in the county of Suffolk by a commission of three persons, one to be appointed by the Governor, one by the mayor of the city of Boston, and one by the chief justices of the supreme and superior courts and of the municipal court of the city of Boston. The total expenditure authorized is \$935,000, and the Treasurer and Receiver-General is required to issue bonds to that amount, if necessary, for a term not exceeding thirty years. The city of Boston is to pay to the Commonwealth two-thirds of each and every installment of principal and interest when the same becomes due and payable. Under the authority of these acts, serial bonds amounting to \$850,000 have been issued, bearing interest at the rate of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. per annum.

Under the provisions of chapter 549 of the Acts of 1908, transfers to the appropriations stated above were made from the appropriation for extraordinary expenses, upon the recommendation of the Auditor, with the approval of the Governor and Council.

## IN CONCLUSION.

The supervisors of accounts have continued their audit of the various departments and institutions under the authority of chapter 597 of the Acts of 1908. More institutions have been systematized and a system of accounting for stores has been installed. The taking of cash discounts has been encouraged, and increased savings have been made for the Commonwealth.

A careful examination of the books and accounts of the Treasurer and Receiver-General has been made, and the cash and securities found to be correct, as shown by the books of this department.
