The direct debt is incurred for State purposes, and is payable by the Commonwealth at large. The contingent debt is a loan of the credit of the Commonwealth to certain metropolitan districts for water, sewerage and parks, and the interest, sinking fund and serial bond requirements are annually assessed upon soid districts. The contingent debt also includes the loans on account of the Granite Avenue bridge, the North Beacon Street bridge and the city of Boston's proportion (two-thirds) of the loan on account of the Suffolk County Court House.

## Ways and Means.

Estimated expenses for the fiscal year ending Nov. 30, 1915, under existing laws are Estimated revenue as above,

The balance unprovided for is over $\$ 2,000,000$ more than the figures of one year ago. The estimates from which it is derived cover only such appropriations as existing legislation requires, and all special appropriations of the present session must be added in determining the amount of the State tax. The General ' י-.nntion monniring netw annual and special appropri-
estimates calling for new buildings and improvements, it is very apparent that, unless great care is exercised in authorizing appropriations for new or special undertakings, the State tax may easily be more than $\$ 11,000,000$.

## Abolition of Grade Crossings Loan.

There were no bonds issued during the year 1914 for the further abolition of grade crossings, the total issue to date being $\$ 11,300,000$. Under the general laws there have been authorized $\$ 10,000,000$, and under special laws there have been authorized and issued for Tremont Street, Boston, Hyde Park and Dedham, $\$ 3,000,000$, and for Congress Street, Boston, $\$ 300,000$, making a total of \$13,300,000 authorized.
As provided in section 39 of Part I. of chapter 463 of the Acts of 1906, advances have been made for cities and towns which have not as yet been returned of $\$ 455,484.44$.
Section 42 of Part I. of chapter 463 of the Acts of 1906 provides that: -
The amount so to be paid by the commonwealth in any one year shall not exceed five hundred thousand dollars, but if in any one year the expenditure by the commonwealth shall not amount to five hundred thousand dollars, the unexpended remainder thereo shall be added to the five hundred thousand dollars allowed to be paid by it in any sub sequent year.

[^1]Under authority of section 133 of chapter 604 of the Acts of 1908, as amended by chapter 323 of the Acts of 1909, chapter 665 of the Acts of 1912, and chapter 812 of the Acts of 1913 , bonds to the amount of $\$ 684,500$, bearing intercst at the rate of 4 per cent., have been issued as follows: $\$ 600,000$ for the Commonwealth armory for the mounted arms, $\$ 65,000$ for the armory at Clinton, $\$ 1,500$ for the armory at Lawrence, and $\$ 18,000$ for the armory at Springfield.

There have also been issued bonds to the amount of $\$ 55,000$, bearing interest at 4 per cent., for the purpose of building and equipping an armory in the town of Concord to replace the armory recently destroyed in part by fire, as authorized by chapter 56 of the Resolves of 1913.

Charles River Basin Loan.
The Metropolitan Park Commission is authorized by chapter 539 of the Acts of 1913 to expend the sum of $\$ 40,000$ in dredging the Charles River Basin between North Beacon Street in Boston and Galen Street in the town of Watertown, and in improving the southerly bank of said basin between said streets. To meet these expenses bonds to the amount of $\$ 40,000$, bearing interest at 4 per cent., were issucd during the year.

## Development of the Port of Boston Loan.

Chapter 748 of the Acts of 1911 provides for an issue of bonds to the amount of $\$ 9,000,000$ for the development of the port of Boston. During the year there were issued bonds to the amount of $\$ 3,000,000$, bearing interest at 4 per cent., making a total issue to date of $\$ 6,000,000$.
Chapter 602 of the Acts of 1914 authorizes the Directors of the Port of Boston to widen and deepen Commercial Point Channel in the Dorchester district in the city of Boston. The directors may expend for this purpose a sum not exceeding $\$ 58,000$ out of the $\$ 9,000,000$ loan authorized by chapter 748 of the Acts of 1911.

## Granite Avenue Bridge Loan.

There have been issued during the year demand notes to the amount of $\$ 70,000$, bearing interest at 4 per cent., to carry out the provisions of chapter 771 of the Acts of 1913 relative to the construction of a new bridge over the Neponset River at Granite Avenue between the town of Milton and the city of Boston.

The Board of Harbor and Land Commissioners is authorized, by chapter 691 of the Acts of 1914 , to expend a sum not exceeding $\$ 1,000,000$ for the improvement for navigation of the Merrimac River from the sea to Hunt's Falls at Lowell by the construction of a channel therein, provided that no part of said sum shall be available or expended until the Congress of the United States shall approve a project, and make an appropriation therefor, to make certain improvements in that part of said river from the sea to a point opposite Ward's Hill, about
one mile above Haverhill. An issue of bonds to an amount not excceding $\$ 1,000,000$, for a term not excecding forty years, is authorized to meet the expenses of this improvement.
Chapter 693 of the Acts of 1914 authorizes the Board of Harbor and Land Commissioners to reconstruct and extend certain piers, to build sheds or other buildings on said piers, to provide the necessary equipment and appliances for handling freight and recciving passengers at said piers, to fill solid and dredge, and to do such other work as may be necessary to improve and develop New Bedford harbor and the transportation and terminal facilities of the city of New Bedford. All of this work is to be done at and near the present piers and docks in New Bedford. The expenditure of a sum not exceeding $\$ 350,000$ is authorized for the purpose of this act, and an issue of bonds for a term not exceeding fifteen years is authorized to meet such expenditures.

The Board of Harbor and Land Commissioners is authorized, by chapter 716 of the Acts of 1914 , to expend a sum not excceding $\$ 100,000$ for the improvement for navigation of that part of Taunton River extending from Fall River to Weir Village in Taunton, provided that no part of this fund shall be available or expended until the Congress of the United States shall approve a project, and make appropriation therefor, to improve that part of said river extending from Fall River to Weir Village in Taunton by the construction of a continuous channel therein. An issue of bonds to an amount not exceeding $\$ 100,000$, for a term not exceeding forty ycars, is authorized for this purpose.
The improvement by the Board of Harbor and Land Commissioners of Lynn harbor and Saugus River, by dredging a channel from the Point of Pines to the Boston \& Maine Railroad bridge across the Saugus River, is authorized by chapter 741 of the Acts of 1914. The Board may expend for this dredging a sum not exceeding $\$ 50,000$, provided, however, that no part of said sum shall be available or expended until there is presented to the Auditor of the Commonwealth satisfactory evidence that there is available the additional sum of $\$ 30,000$ to be raised as follows: the city of Lynn shall make an appropriation of $\$ 15,000$ for the building of bulkheads and the reclamation of the flats owned by said city bordering on said river, and furthermore, there shall be raised from other sources the sum of $\$ 15,000$ for the purpose of dredging said river and for reclaiming the flats mentioned above. An issue of bonds to an amount not exceeding $\$ 50,000$, for a term not exceeding fifteen years, is authorized for this purpose.

No bonds have been issued for any of the above purposes.

## Holden Highway Loan.

The expenditure of the sum of $\$ 10,000$ was authorized by chapter 668 of the Acts of 1914 for the improvement of the highway leading from Holden to Rutland, and the Treasurer and Recciver-General may borrow for this purpose such sums as may be required, kecping a separate and accurate account of all sums borrowed and expended, including interest. The expenditures shall be apportioned as follows: 50 per cent. shall be paid by the Commonwealth, 35 per cent. by the county of Worcester, and 15 per cent. by the town of Holden. No money has been borrowed for this purpose.

## Metropolitan Parks Loan.

Chapter 143 of the Resolves of 1914 authorizes an expenditure of $\$ 10,000$, in addition to the amounts authorized by chapter 655 of the Acts of 1911 and chapter 91 of the Resolves of 1913, for the purpose of dredging and deepening Neponset River, making changes and alteration in any bridge, draw or other structure, and any other work which will tend to restore the lands along said river to their original condition and to abate malaria and other peril to the public health, making a total authorization of $\$ 195,000$ for this purpose. There were issued during the year bonds to the amount of $\$ 17,500$, bearing interest at 4 per cent. The total issue for parks to date is $\$ 9,642,500$.

Metropolitan Parks Loan, Series Two (Parkways and Boulevards).
A portion of the Wellington bridge over the Mystic River between Somerville and Medford was destroyed by fire during the year, and the Metropolitan Park Commission was authorized by chapter 794 of the Acts of 1914 to reconstruct, with steel and concrete and other fireproof materials, the burnt portion. To meet the expenses incurred the Treasurer and Receiver-General is authorized to issue bonds, as a part of the Metropolitan Parks Loan, Series Two, to an amount not exceeding $\$ 115,000$. A note for this amount, bearing interest at 4 per cent., payable on demand, has been issued for this purpose under authority of chapter 123 of the Acts of 1910 .
The Metropolitan Park Commission is authorized by chapter 699 of the Acts of 1912 to expend the sum of $\$ 200,000$ each year for the five years beginning with the year 1913 for the acquisition of land for, and the construction of, certain parkways and boulevards. Bonds to the amount of $\$ 200,000$, bearing intelest at 4 per cent., were issued during the year, making a total issue to date for boulevards of $\$ 5,650,000$.

## Metropolitan Seferage Loan.

Chapter 643 of the Acts of 1914 provides for the admission of the town of Wellesley to the South Metropolitan Sewerage District, and authorizes an issue of bonds to an amount not exceeding $\$ 350,000$, for a term not exceeding forty years, to meet the expenditures incurred by the Metropolitan Water and Sewerage Board in carrying out the provisions of this act.
The construction of an additional metropolitan sewer to provide for the sewage of the town of Revere is authorized by chapter 259 of the Acts of 1914. An issue of bonds to an amount not exceeding $\$ 5,500$, for a term not exceeding thirty years, is authorized to meet the expenses incurred under this act. The serial bond and interest requirements shall annually be assessed upon the town of Revere.

Chapter 344 of the Acts of 1914 authorizes the Metropolitan Water and Sewerage Board to extend the outfall sewer at Deer Island. To meet the expenses incurıed a bond issue is authorized to an amount not exceeding $\$ 125,000$.
No bonds have been issued for the above purposes. The total issue for sewerage purposes to date is $\$ 15,880,912$, of which $\$ 7,003,000$ was for the north metropolitan system and $\$ 8,877,912$ for the south metropolitan system.

Metropolitan Water Loan.
Chapter 601 of the Acts of 1914 provides for the following works: a 24 -inch main from River Strect in Dorchester, through Milton to Quincy; a reinforced concrete reservoir on Bellevue hill in Boston; a 20 -inch force main to said reservoir; and an electric power plant at the Sudbury dam. To meet the expenses incurred for the above work an issue of bonds to an amount not exceeding $\$ 254,000$ is authorized to be taken from the unexpended balance of the $\$ 450,000$ appropriated by chapter 694 of the Acts of 1912 . No bonds have been issued for this purpose.

There have been issued during the year bonds to the amount of $\$ 258,000$, bearing interest at 4 per cent., for the following purposes: $\$ 75,000$ for the lowering of the metropolitan water mains in Chelsea creek; $\$ 33,000$ for the improvement of Beaver Dam Brook in the towns of Ashland, Framingham, Sherborn and Natick; and $\$ 150,000$ for the payment of a demand note issued in 1913 for the taking of property of the city of Boston known as the Fisher Hill Reservoir.
The total issue to date for metropolitan water purposes is $\$ 42,046,000$.

## North Beacon Street Bridge Loan.

The Metropolitan Park Commission is authorized by chapter 780 of the Acts of 1914 to remove the existing bridge over the Charles River between the city of Boston and the town of Watertown, known as the North Beacon Street bridge, and to construct a new bridge with suitable approaches at or near the site of the present bridge. The cost of construction of said bridge shall in the first instance be paid by the Commonwealth, provided, however, that said cost shall not exceed $\$ 175,000$; and the Treasurer and Receiver-General is authorized to borrow such sums as may be required for the said cost and may issue notes or bonds therefor. When full cost has been ascertained, after deducting therefrom any amounts paid for damages to land or property or for land purchased, etc., with interest and costs, the following parties shall each be assessed and contribute the following percentages of the remainder of the total amount paid by the Commonwealth, including interest, to wit: Boston, 35 per cent.; Watertown, 35 per cent.; Middlesex County, 5 per cent.; Commonwealth, 10 per cent.; Newtonville and Watertown Street Railway Company, 15 per cent. The amounts are to be paid by each party at such time as the Treasureı may designate. All amounts paid for land, etc., including costs and interest thereon, within the limits of the city of Boston, shall be paid by the city; and all amounts paid for land, ctc., together with costs and interest, purchased within the limits of the town of Watertown, shall be paid by the town. There has been borrowed for this purpose $\$ 15,000$ on a demand note bearing interest at 4 per cent.

Prisons and Hospitals Loan.
There have been issued during the year, under the authority of chapter 79 of the Acts of 1912, as amended by chapter 3 of the Acts of 1913, and chapter 130 of the Resolves of 1914 , bonds to the amount of $\$ 200,000$, bearing interest
at 4 per cent., for the construction of an asylum at the Grafton Colony to supersede the Worcester State Asylum at Worcester. The total issue of bonds for prisons and hospitals to Nov. 30,1914 , is $\$ 9,566,250$, as follows: -

Soldiers' Gratuity Loan.
Under the provisions of chapter 702 of the Acts of 1912, as amended by chapters 105 and 443 of the Acts of 1913, there have been issued during the year bonds to the amount of $\$ 300,000$, bearing interest at 4 per cent., of which $\$ 285,000$ was to provide for the payment of the demand note issued in 1913.
There have been 100 claims allowed and paid during the year, making the total number of claims paid to date 4,480 , amounting to $\$ 560,000$.

## State Highway Loan.

Chapter 733 of the Acts of 1914 authorizes a sum not exceeding $\$ 15,000$ for the construction and maintenance of a State highway in the town of Egremont, the cost and expense incurred to be borne as follows: the county of Berkshire shall pay 30 per cent. and the Commonwealth shall pay 70 per cent. Bonds may be issued for this purpose to an amount not exceeding $\$ 15,000$, for a term not exceeding five years.
Chapter 754 of the Acts of 1914 authorizes the expenditure of the sum of $\$ 10,000$ for the construction of a State highway in the town of New Marlborough. The cost and expense incurred shall be borne as follows: the county
of Berkshire shall pay 25 per cent. and the Commonwealth shall pay 75 per cent. Bonds may be issucd to an amount not exceeding $\$ 10,000$, for a term not exceeding fifteen years.
Chapter 756 of the Acts of 1914 authorizes the expenditure of the sum of $\$ 10,000$ for the improvement of the highway in the towns of Becket, Washing ton and Hinsdale. The cost and expense incurred shall be borne as follows the county of Berkshire shall pay 25 per cent. and the Commonwealth shall pay 75 per cent.
Chapter 779 of the Acts of 1914 authorizes the expenditure of the sum of $\$ 10,000$ for the improvement of a highway in the towns of Southbridge, Dudley and Webster. The cost and expense incurred shall be borne as follows: the county of Worcester shall pay 25 per cent. and the Commonwealth shall pay 75 per cent. Bonds may be issued to an amount not exceeding $\$ 10,000$, for a term not exceeding fifteen ycars.
In each of the abpve cases it is provided that upon the completion of the work a detailed statement of the cost sball be filed in the office of the clerk of courts for the county in which the work was done, and said county, within sixty days after the filing of said report, shall pay into the treasury of the Commonwealth its proportion of said expense.
Chapter 502 of the Acts of 1914 authorizes the expenditure of the sum of $\$ 10,000$, in addition to the amounts authorized by chapter 711 of the Acts of 1911, chapter 627 of the Acts of 1912, and chapter 731 of the Acts of 1913, for the improvement of a highway between the towns of Dalton and Goshen, in the counties of Berkshire and Hampshire, making a total of $\$ 35,000$ authorized for this purpose. Bonds may be issued for a term not exceeding fifteen years.
Chapter 503 of the Acts of 1914 authorizes the expenditure of the sum of $\$ 10,000$ for the improvement of a highway leading from Hinsdale to Chester through Middleficld. Bonds may be issued for a term not cxceeding fifteen years for this purpose.
The Massachusetts Highway Commission is authorized, by chapter 711 of the Acts of 1914 , to expend the sum of $\$ 10,000$ for the improvement of the highway leading from Milford to Southborough tbrough Hopkinton, and bonds may be issued for a term not exceeding ten years to meet the expenditures.
Bonds to the amount of $\$ 1,070,000$, bearing interest at 4 per cent., bave been issued during the year for the following purposes: $\$ 845,000$ under the authority of the general law, chapter 704 of the Acts of 1912; $\$ 100,000$, being the balance of bonds authorized by chapter 646 of the Acts of 1910, as amended by chapter 557 of the Acts of 1911 and chapter 697 of the Acts of 1912, to make several purchases and takings of land in the town of Revere for the purpose of laying out and constructing a bighway in said town; $\$ 30,000$, as authorized by chapter 712 of the Acts of 1913, for the improvement of a highway along the northerly as authorized Merrimac River in the towns of Dracut and Methuen; $\$ 10,000$, as authorized by chapter 730 of the Acts of 1913, for the improvement of a highway leading from Hinsdale to Chester through Middlefield; $\$ 10,000$, as authorized by chapter 731 of the Acts of 1913, for the improvement of a highway in the counties of Berkshire and Hampshire; and $\$ 75,000$, as authorized
by chapter 778 of the Acts of 1913, for the laying out and construction of Humphrey Street in the town of Swampscott. The total issue of bonds for highway purposes to Nov. 30, 1914, is $\$ 9,520,000$.

## State House Construction Loan.

Chapter 830 of the Acts of 1913 provides for the construction of additions to the State House, and authorizes an issue of bonds to an amount not exceeding $\$ 900,000$ in order to defray the expenses which may be incurred. Bonds to the amount of $\$ 500,000$, bearing interest at 4 per cent., have been issued during the year, $\$ 5,000$ of which were to provide for the payment of the temporary note. issued in 1913

## Recommendations

I respectfully recommend that the positions of accountant and bookkeeper be established in this department. Legislation to this end appears to me desirable, owing to the great increase in the amount of work done by this department and the consequent increased responsibility, which necessitates a higher degree of skill on the part of the employees.
I have the honor to call to your attention the advisability of auditing the distribution of supplies in the stock rooms of the various institutions.
My term of office expires on the 20th of January. During the year among the changes in methods made by this office, which have been adopted, are the standardization of the requisition systems in State institutions, - whereas each had its own system there is now one system for all of them; the extension to all institutions of the triplicate order system for purchasing supplies; the oarion of an adequate method of farm management accounting for the numerous farms and dairies of the State, whereby, for the first time, can be ascertained whether any branch of this activity is an asset or a liability to the State.
For several years there has been lack of observance by the county courts of the law which provides that certain court fines be paid into the State treasury. Through the enforcement of this law the past year there has been, or will be, paid into the treasury about $\$ 9,000$.
There has been created the past ycar a new budget system, which gives dctailed information by each department, institution, board and commission regarding the annual estimate of each for its appropriation
In 1887 a law was passed that for each institution there should be an estimate made annually of the value of patient labor. This year that law has been enforced for the first time.
There has been recently called to the attention of those in charge of cach activity of the State the financial loss annually to the Commonwealth from the inadequate preparation of copy for the State printer, necessitating frequent revisions which are seemingly an unnecessary expense, amounting, it is estimated, to from $\$ 15,000$ to $\$ 20,000$, which can easily be saved if the suggestions presented are adopted.
In the foregoing changes which have been made it affords me pleasure to record my appreciation of the value of the service rendered to the Commonwealth by the attaches of this office in carrying out these reforms. Their hearty co-operation and the harmonious relationship existing in the Auditor's office have contributed very materially to the success of the changes which have taken place. I desire, also, to express my appreciation of the cordial manner in which radical changes made in connection with the accounting systems of State institutions have been received and carried into effect by the superintendents of such institutions.
