

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I. FOREWORD

Fiscal 1977 has been an interesting and productive year for the Department of the State Auditor. A number of significant accomplishments and commitments bode well for the future of the department and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

One of the more significant occurrences during the last fiscal year was the advent of new and more demanding Revenue Sharing audit requirements. The federal statute creating Revenue Sharing now requires a complete audit of all state accounts, conducted in accordance with AICPA and GAO auditing standards. This department, responding to a request from Governor Dukakis, has agreed to perform these audits, and to meet the new audit requirements. This agreement will allow the Commonwealth to receive over 75 million dollars of federal funds from the United States Treasury. Plans have been made to convert most of the Fiscal Year 1978 audit reports to the new audit format, with the remainder converted by the following year. Realizing also that these requirements translate into a more demanding sense of professionalism, a rigorous training program was begun. The first step was the pursuit of a suitable sized federal grant for a major training effort, which was eventually obtained from funds awarded under the Intergovernmental Personnel Act. The grant was used for the basis of the next step; i.e., the negotation of a contract with a college or university for an appropriate training program. After a thorough search, the Department selected Boston University, which, along with our Training Director, established an intensive course of study for our professional staff. The course ran for ten consecutive days, and was given on four separate occasions, three times in Boston and once in Worcester. A number of federal and state auditors attended as guests, along with approximately 150 auditors from the staff. The course covered quite a lot

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of ground and required a good deal of study and work by the employees. Three principle areas were taught: AICPA auditing standards, the attributes of an audit finding, and a survey study of computers and auditing. A final exam was given covering the course material. A subsequent survey of the course was made, and generally high marks were given to the content of the course and the instructors. Plans are currently underway for a continuation of the training program next year.

The Department of the State Auditor also participated in the planning of a joint audit training program with the New England Intergovernmental Audit Forum (NEIAF), of which this department is a charter member. The NEIAF has authorized the national accounting firm of Peat, Marwick and Mitchell to establish an audit training seminar applicable to all governmental accountants. This department has committed itself to participating in, and evaluating the seminar.

Last, the department is continuing its efforts in two unique training areas. The first is its tuition reimbursement program. During Fiscal Year 1977 the department reimbursed twenty six employees of the department who took courses that were directly job related. Second, our program of encouraging our staff to join and be active in the Association of Governmental Accountants is also bearing fruit.

Another highlight during the year was the increased number of federal contracts and audits. In Fiscal Year 1976, realizing that there existed a clear need for audits of federal monies spent by state agencies, the Department of the State Auditor introduced legislation that allowed the negotiation of contracts between us and the federal government to perform such audits. The legislation passed (G.L.c.11, S.13) and the department's federal effort is resulting in significantly greater audit coverage. Such programs as LEAA and CETA are now

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being audited. Contracts with EPA, HEW and the Department of Agriculture are in the negotiation stage. The increase in audits augurs well for the taxpayers of Massachusetts.

The traditional audits of state agencies and authorities went well during the year, considering the large number of unfillable vacancies within the department. Although there was a 10% increase in the number of field audit days, the workload also increased. Several new agencies created were audited, plus the financial activity in most existing agencies continued to increase. See pages 9, 10, 20, 29 and 30.

The department also continued its major effort to audit the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program, undertaken at the behest of the Department of Public Welfare in order to insure the Commonwealth's interests in the participating program.

One of the more interesting and potentially disturbing audit areas is the increased demand for audits of c.180 non-profit corporations doing business with the Commonwealth. In the cases audited, it became quite evident that a great deal of attention is needed, both at the agency level and post-audit level, of these enterprises. The department intends to continue its audits in this area.

In the budget area, we are still plagued by insufficient state appropriations. As was explained in some detail in our analysis of the budget, which was submitted with the budget proposals, there exists a constant strain between workload increases and the size of the audit staff.

Several important savings have been made during the year. The Office Manager saved several thousand dollars by renegotiating our contract for audit covers. Previously costing about 22¢, the covers now cost about 17¢. Considering the fact that thousands of covers are used each year, this represents a sizeable

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savings. Another savings was made after analyzing the distribution of the audit reports. Realizing that a number of our reports of smaller agencies are of significance only to the agency itself, and its principal governing body, excessive distribution has been curtailed. Third, the process of audit consolidation continues. In cases of related spending activities (such as Mental Health Clinics) the audit effort has been consolidated into one report, thus cutting down audit production costs.

There are several in-house studies continuing. The first is an analysis of travel expenses. After one full year of analyzing each quarterly cost, a proposal will be drafted to make the travel costs more accurate and fair. The project of work load measurement continues, although slowly. Last, money was requested in next year's budget for a small computer system. Hopefully, such a system will help make our administrative record keeping more efficient and cost conscious.

A number of personnel innovations were begun or continued during the year. The personnel evaluation system was modified to a more objective rather than subjective system, as was the case in the previous year. The educational co-op and intern program was continued, with students from Bentley College, Northeastern University, Merrimack College and University of Massachusetts participating. The program has been an outstanding success for the participating colleges and the second, third and fourth year students. The department also participated in the "Shared Experience" program in which college students are given the opportunity to work alongside an individual in the profession to which the student aspires. Wheaton College and Boston University sent two outstanding young students.

Work has just about finished on the codification of Administrative Rules and Regulations authorized under c.689 of the Acts of 1975. When finished, they will be published and distributed to all the employees.

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Work on the Marketing Survey is progressing and should be completed in the Fall. For the first time we should have accurate data on the effect of our audit reports on the agencies audited. Studies are also being done on our personnel evaluation system and on sick/vacation day data. The Office Manager has embarked on an ambitious project of insuring that all the clerical help are cross-trained. By doing this he has prevented needless backlog of work as a result of illness or vacations, and saved money in insuring that the rental equipment used in the production process did not lay idle for any extensive period of time.

On the legislative side of the department, two bills were filed on behalf of the department. At the end of the fiscal year, neither had passed. The first was legislation establishing a Bureau of Vendor Audits. This bill would create a mechanism and have resources to make more timely audits of vendors doing business with the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Although the bill received favorable editorial response, and much discussion, the prognosis for passage is not good. The second bill, adjusting the frequency of audit, has passed the Senate, and is currently pending in the House.

I have also supported Common Cause's legislation to create a "Sunset" Act for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The bill is still pending in the Legislature.

All in all, Fiscal Year 1977 was a productive and successful year for the Department of the State Auditor, primarily due, of course, to the hard work and professionalism of the staff. We all look forward to an equally productive year in Fiscal Year 1978.

II. INTRODUCTION

The election of an auditor is provided for by Article XVII of the Articles of Amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

The Department of the State Auditor operates under the authority granted by Chapter 11 of the General Laws, as amended. Sections 12 and 13 of said Chapter 11 state as follows:

> "Section 12. The department of the state auditor shall make an audit as often as the state auditor determines it necessary, but in no event less than once in every two years of the accounts of all departments, offices, commissions, institutions, and activities of the commonwealth, including those of districts and authorities created by the general court, and including those of the income tax division of the department of corporations and taxation, and for said purpose the authorized officers and employees of said department of the state auditor shall have access to such accounts at reasonable times and said department may require the production of books, documents and vouchers, except tax returns, relating to any matter within the scope of such audit. The state auditor shall annually reconcile the income and balance the cash of all agencies that receive revenue. The accounts of the last named department shall be subject at any time to such examination as the governor and council or the general court may order. Said department shall comply with any written regulations, consistent with law, relative to its duties made by the governor and council. This section shall not apply to the accounts of state officers which the director of accounts of the department of corporations and taxation is required by law to examine. The department of the state auditor shall, in any audit of the department of public welfare or any agency thereof, refer to the fraudulent claims commission any case coming to its attention in the course of such audit which appears to involve fraud. In any such audit the department of the state auditor is hereby authorized to examine the records of vendors to verify bills submitted to the department of public welfare to the extent necessary to determine the propriety and accuracy of their charges against the commonwealth. The department of the state auditor shall keep no books or records except records of audits made by it, and its annual report shall relate only to such audits. The examination of the accounts of districts and authorities required by this section shall be made in addition to any audit required by the law creating such district or authority.

"Section 13. The state auditor may enter into agreements or contracts with the federal government or its agencies, or state agencies, acting in behalf thereof for the purpose of conducting mutual financial audits of programs funded in whole or in part by the federal government and carried out by agencies of the commonwealth. Such audits shall be undertaken only after related contracts or agreements between the parties have been filed with the joint legislative committee on federal financial assistance and funds received in accordance with such agreements have been deposited with the state treasurer into a separate account and expended solely for the purpose of this section. The costs of these audits shall not exceed the amount of funds received therefor and for these purposes may be expended without appropriation and providing further that the commonwealth shall receive the maximum reimbursement for the cost of providing group insurance, workmen's compensation and retirement benefits. The term of employment of any individual hired by the state auditor under the provisions of this section shall be expressly limited in duration by the availability of federal funds. The term of employment shall expire on the date of expiration of the federal funds."

The Department of the State Auditor is comprised of four divisions and a licensing of private business schools section.

All requirements of the law relating to the duties and functions of the State Auditor have been carefully complied with for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1977.

III. DIVISION OF STATE AUDITS

The Division of State Audits makes careful annual audits of the accounts of all departments, offices, commissions, institutions and activities of the Commonwealth. In addition, the Division makes special cash audits at the request of State agency heads in order to provide an orderly change-over in the custodianship of funds from one State employee to another.

Funds and property administered by agencies of the Commonwealth amount to several billions of dollars and consist principally of assets belonging to the Commonwealth; however, substantial amounts of Federal grants and trust funds are also administered by various Commonwealth agencies. Through the years, there has been a consistent growth of funds and property in all three categories. Also the Legislature has expanded on-going programs considerably and has established new State agencies to administer new programs. As a result, the audit responsibility of the Division of State Audits has grown considerably through the years.

V. DIVISION OF FEDERAL AUDITS

Fiscal year 1977 marks a turning point within the Division of Federal Audits -from the posture of a struggling infant to the status of a viable, independent entity capable of long term growth. Workload increased 100% to 37 audits in 1977 versus 18 in 1976. This increase provides concrete evidence of thinking within the Federal sector which dictates the engagement of independent public auditors, such as ourselves, in meeting Federal external audit requirements.

A contract drawn up under the guidelines established by the U.S. Department of Labor with the balance of State CETA Prime Sponsor provides for audit of its 20 subgrantees; 12 of these audits were performed in 1977. Four audits were performed in 1977 under terms of a contract made directly with the U.S. Department of Labor that calls for the audit of 9 CETA Prime Sponsors in Massachusetts.

Thirteen audits were conducted along guidelines of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, four under guidelines of the Economic Development Administration and one each according to requirements of the U.S. Department of the Interior, the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, the Community Services Administration and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

A contract was entered into for the first time with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency calling for the audit of various planning and construction grants throughout the Commonwealth over the next three years. This contract increases the scope of the Federal Audits Division to a point where specialized training will be introduced to implement the newly created State Auditor's Training program, which was presented to the Department at large for the first time during the spring and summer of 1977.

The Federal Audits Division was authorized to hire a staff in fiscal 1977. In addition to the appointment of an Administrative Assistant to the Director, four highly qualified professional field auditors were hired. They include:

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Leo Bonarrigo, who earned a BS at Boston State College and an MBA at Suffolk University. He joined the Division in December 1976 and has recently passed the Theory, Law and Practice parts of the CPA examination.

Janis Elmo joined the Federal Division in December 1976. She earned a BA at Ohio State University and an MS at Northeastern University. While at Northeastern, Ms. Elmo served an internship in public accounting at Levanthal and Horwath and has recently passed the Practice and Theory parts of the CPA examination.

Steven Gilchrist came to the Division in March 1977 after 2 years at Raytheon Corporation as a cost analyst and 2 years as an auditor with Coopers and Lybrand. He holds a BSBA and an MBA from Babson College and has recently passed the Auditing and Law parts of the CPA examination.

John Krause joined us in May 1977 after spending 3½ years as an auditor with the Department of Youth Services in the Executive Office of Human Services. For 2½ years prior to that he was on the staff of Coopers and Lybrand. John holds a BSBA from Babson College and a MBA from Boston University.

The following separate Federal audits were conducted during the year, in addition to the combined audit of the various Federal funds administered by the departments and agencies of the Commonwealth and the instrumentalities of the General Court:

VI. DIVISION OF CONTRACT AUDITS

The Contract Section conducts audits in both the State agencies and authorities, on approximately 700 million dollars of construction, engineering and architectural contracts annually. Currently, the three main areas of these activities are Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (\$200 million), Department of Public Works (\$150 million) and the Bureau of Building Construction (\$250 million); however, personnel from the Section are available to any State or authority audit to advise on related engineering or technical matters.

The audit responsibility consists of investigation and analysis of all construction, engineering and consultant contracts awarded by various State agencies and authorities. This procedure covers the legal requirements imposed by the contract and their mutual fulfillment by the parties involved. The engineering practices covered by the contracts are also subject to review and evaluation as to efficient and functional future use of the facility.

The actual administration of the contract during its tenure is studied and recommendations are made with respect to efficient and economical fulfillment of the terms of the agreement. In the construction contracts, change orders, extra work orders and overruns are analyzed and their propriety established. The "daily" administration of various departments are reviewed, compared and recommendations, in needed areas of improvement, are made to the appropriate department head.

Finally, in most cases, a personal visit is made to many of the larger completed facilities by a representative of the Contract Section. This visit is made to determine that the public funds were properly and economically expended.

LICENSING OF PRIVATE BUSINESS SCHOOLS WITHIN THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Section 3 of Chapter 75D of the General Laws states, in part, that:

"Any person desiring to operate a private business school within the commonwealth shall submit to the state auditor, on a form supplied by him, such financial information as he may require, including but not limited to:

- a) ownership and organization of the school;
- b) the financial condition of the school; and
- c) the form and content of the student enrollment agreement to be used by the school."

The term "Private Business School" is defined in Chapter 75D, Section 1,

as:

"a school maintained or classes conducted, for profit or by charging tuition, for the purpose of teaching business administration, accounting, data processing, computer operation, secretarial skills, sales techniques or social skills, habits or customs, medical assistant, dental assistant, or nursing assistant skills, and tractor-trailer operating skills, and any other private business school not regulated by any agency of the commonwealth."

At the close of fiscal year ending June 30, 1977, there were 75 schools that had been recommended to the Department of Education for licensing. A listing of these schools and a recapitulation by types of schools is included at the end of this narrative.

There were 15 new schools recommended for licensing by the Department of the State Auditor during fiscal 1977. Nine of these were subsequently licensed by the Department of Education. The remaining six schools plus five more recommended prior to fiscal 1977 remained unlicensed as of June 30, 1977.

During the year, five licensed schools were removed from the active list for the following reasons.

- License renewal denied by the Department of Education.
- School closed.
- School now part of a Junior College that is "degree granting" and therefore no longer comes under Chapter 75D.
- Two schools reclassified as trade schools.

VII.

At the close of fiscal 1977, there were 152 applicants on the list who had requested financial application forms in anticipation of organizing a school. Four had furnished partial information required by the State Auditor.

PROPOSED CHANGES TO CHAPTER 75D OF THE GENERAL LAWS OF THE COMMONWEALTH

House Bill H-61 (1976) defeated in third reading and H-65 (1977) in the House Ways and Means Committee, at the close of fiscal 1977, proposes to add trade and correspondence schools to Chapter 75D of the General Laws.

It also provides for the assessment of fines and/or imprisonment of any person or persons operating a trade school without a license. These provisions were sponsored by the Department of Education.

The proposed legislation also provides for a change in bonding from the present \$25,000.00 flat coverage for all schools, regardless of their size to an amount of not less than \$5,000.00 and not more than \$50,000.00 along with a provision that the Auditor shall require additional security in those cases where he is of the opinion that cash resources of the licensee may not be sufficient to make tuition refunds as required by Section 13K of Chapter 255.

Because H-61 (1976) was defeated in third reading, the Department of the State Auditor filed a separate bill, H-2915 (1977), that includes only proposed changes in the bonding requirements described above and the inclusion of a thirty-day deadline prior to expiration of the school's license for furnishing financial information to the Auditor's Office by the applying school.

It was felt that this legislation was urgently required and therefore should be considered separately in the event that H-65 (1977) is again defeated.

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE INQUIRIES

Effective July 1, 1974, all State institutions' billheads were required to have imprinted on them the following:

"If the balance shown on this bill does not agree with your records, immediately notify in writing, this agency and the Department of the State Auditor, Room 229, State House, Boston, MA. 02133. The State Auditor will report his findings to you."

This requirement was enacted as a result of an agreement between the State Auditor and the Comptroller to provide a continual control over accounts receivables for the agency and the State Auditor.

There were 1,113 inquiries received during fiscal 1975; 737 during fiscal 1976 and 553 during fiscal 1977.

Ratioed to the number received in fiscal 1975, there were 39 percent fewer inquiries received during fiscal 1976 and 50 percent fewer during fiscal 1977.

As the result of instituting this program, there has been a market improvement in accounting and recordkeeping at State institutions. They are also being more responsive to general inquiries regarding third party insurance coverage and in determining the patients' financial resources in arriving at an equitable settlement of outstanding charges.

PROFESSIONAL TRAINING AND CONTINUING EDUCATION

The Department of the State Auditor during the past year initiated a comprehensive program of continuing education for its professional staff. The need for such a program is twofold. First, State and Federal auditing requirements have become more intensive, making it vital that our staff keep abreast of all new developments. Second, it is important for the Department to maintain the highest possible level of professional expertise amongst its staff. This will equip our auditors with the skills necessary to solve the increasingly complex problems found in State government.

The training program itself included seminars in report writing, data processing, and exposure to the new requirements regulating the auditing of Federal funds, particularly those of the Office of Revenue Sharing.

This program came about as a result of the Federal Intergovernmental Personnel Act. Matching State and Federal funds from the United States Civil Service Commission, and the Massachusetts Division of Personnel Administration, supported the program. Cooperation was also received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the General Accounting Office, and Boston University.

This program has greatly increased the professional ability of our auditors, and more useful audits have already started to appear. The cost of this training to the State was infinitesimal in light of the Federal funds received and the higher levels of efficiency achieved.

The Department is now planning to implement a second phase of this continuing education, which will include flow charting, statistical sampling, electronic data processing and further development in the area of report writing.

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RESEARCH PROJECTS

The Department of the State Auditor has initiated several projects designed to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of operations. Projects currently underway include market research analysis of audit reports, a study on the establishment of productivity, work flow analysis and the compilation of a useable data bank for workload information.

The focus of the market analysis is directed toward an evaluation of the acquisition, internal distribution, and use of the State Auditor's reports by those individuals and groups receiving them. As areas requiring improvement are identified further efforts will be made to prepare the necessary analysis and recommendations.

A survey was made of other State Auditors across the country to ascertain the status of any work done on productivity measurement for auditing. The survey revealed that except for a couple of states very little had been done in the area of audit workload measurement for the public sector. Nevertheless, the Department of the State Auditor has taken the initiative to study and attempt to formulate such measurements. It is anticipated that with the combination of these productivity statistics and an accurate appraisal of audit capacity and demand, that limited resources available to the Department can be better utilized.

The Department of the State Auditor over the past year and a half has supervised an intensive internship program. The internships are designed to allow college students an opportunity to gain work experience and have direct input in a public agency. The scope of projects has ranged from mailing list surveys to management analysis. Projects are tailored to student abilities and departmental research demands. As of June 30, 1977, students from the following colleges had participated in the Department's internship and work-study program: Boston College, Boston University, Fairfield University, Harvard University, Providence College, Regis College, Suffolk University, University of Massachusetts, and Wheaton College.
