



#### AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have examined the Comparative Statement of Expenditures under Maintenance Appropriations of the Legislative Research Council and the Legislative Research Bureau for the three fiscal years ended June 30, 1982. We made our examination in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1 (page 4), the financial records of the Legislative Research Council and the Legislative Research Bureau are maintained on an accrual basis of accounting, as prescribed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. This basis differs in certain respects from generally accepted accounting principles. The financial statement contained in this report refers to specific accounts within the Commonwealth's fund structure. Therefore, the financial statement is not intended to present the Legislative Research Council's and the Legislative Research Bureau's financial position in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statement presents fairly the Legislative Research Council's and the Legislative Research Bureau's financial activities for the periods indicated, in conformity with the Commonwealth's accounting system, which has been applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding period.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENT

#### Note 1. Significant Accounting Policies

The Legislative Research Council and the Legislative Research Bureau are required to follow the accounting and financial reporting policies prescribed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. These policies differ in certain respects from generally accepted accounting principles applicable to governmental units. The following is a summary of the significant policies.

Basis of Accounting: A modified cash basis of accounting is used. Receipts are recorded when received, and no receivable accounts are included in the financial statements. Expenditures are recorded on a cash basis. At the close of the fiscal year, all encumbrances (expenditure commitments) against appropriation accounts that expire at fiscal year-end are recorded as expenditures.

Expenditures for real property and fixed assets are reported in the year the expenditure is made. The Commonwealth's accounting system does not reflect on its financial statements the cost of fixed assets and real property the Commonwealth owns, and consequently, no depreciation is recorded on such property.

#### Note 2. Rental Expenses

Rental expenditures totalled \$33,961 in fiscal year 1982; \$29,775 in fiscal year 1981; and \$22,466 in fiscal year 1980. The bureau paid the rent to Nathan R. Miller Properties, Limited. Its lease agreement provides for tenancyat-will.

#### SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

#### Exit Conference

On Friday, February 25, 1983, we discussed our audit results with Mr. Daniel M. O'Sullivan, Director of the Legislative Research Bureau.

#### ORGANIZATION

The Legislative Research Council and the Legislative Research Bureau were established by Chapter 607, Section 2, of the Acts of 1954, and started operating on February 1, 1955.

The Legislative Research Council and the Legislative Research Bureau are authorized by Chapter 3, Sections 56 and 57, of the General Laws, as amended. The statutory functions of these agencies are as follows:

The Legislative Research Council . . .

shall determine all policies with respect to a legislative research program . . . and shall provide for the creation of a legislative research bureau, . . ., under its direction, which shall carry out the policies so determined.

The Legislative Research Bureau . . .

shall assist the members of the general court and any committee and recess commission thereof in all matters requiring statistical research of fact finding in connection with proposed legislation or other matters pertaining to the functions of the general court.

The research projects the council and bureau conduct may be classified as follows:

- 1. Substantial Requests: Research assignments for the General Court.
  These assignments are usually major projects resulting in published reports.
- 2. Spot Requests: Research requests made by individual members, committees, and commissions of the General Court and other legislative research and governmental agencies throughout the country. This type of project is generally less extensive in scope and may result in a typed or mimeographed report. Some of those requests, however, can be answered verbally. In addition, the bureau can provide the requestor with the relevant and available material.
