



Funded by the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security's Office of Grants and Research, the Charles E. Shannon Community Safety Initiative (Shannon) is modeled after the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention's Comprehensive Gang Model. Shannon is a multi-sector approach used to address a community's gang and youth violence problem. Each community receiving Shannon funding demonstrates the presence of risk factors for youth and gang violence. Shannon participants must be between the ages of 10-24 years.

LOW-RISK*

Youth in danger of engaging in risky behavior or gang activity due to the presence of known risk factors such as exposure to gang affiliates in their home or community.

35%
MODERATE-RISK*

Youth exposed to the same risk factors as low-risk youth, as well as additional risk factors such as school failure, dropping out, truancy, substance abuse, and gang involvement.

41%
HIGH-RISK*

Youth who are perpetrators or victims of shooting or stabbing violence, and/or are known gang members.

Gang Activity in Boston

During 2019, the Boston Police Department identified 100 active gangs. Boston Police Gang and Intelligence Officers classified 902 individuals between the ages of 14 and 24 as gang-involved. This intelligence was gathered through self-identification, field reports, arrest records, and collaboration with street workers, violence interrupters, Department of Corrections, parole, clergy and other community-based organizations. Neighborhoods most affected by youth and gang violence included Roxbury, Dorchester, and Mattapan.
