Funded by the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security's Office of Grants and Research, the Charles E. Shannon Community Safety Initiative (Shannon) is modeled after the <u>Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention's</u> <u>Comprehensive Gang Model</u>. Shannon is a multi-sector approach used to address a community's gang and youth violence problem. Each community receiving Shannon funding demonstrates the presence of risk factors for youth and gang violence. Shannon participants must be between the ages of 10-24 years.

Youth Risk Assessments

3% LOW-RISK*	Youth in danger of engaging in risky behavior or gang activity.
42% MODERATE- RISK*	Youth exposed to the same risk factors as low-risk youth, as well as additional risk factors such as truancy.
55% HIGH-RISK*	Youth who are perpetrators or victims of shooting or stabbing violence, and/or are known gang members.

Success Highlight

"One of our participants who was never gang involved a few years ago was stabbed while walking home. During his recovery, gang affiliates were able to convince him to associate with them and he became heavily involved. He gained a weapons charge, was arrested, and was on probation for at least a two years. Since then, he has participated in New Bedford Shannon's personal development groups, intensive case management, and a subsidized employment program. He graduated from high school, has not participated in gang activity for a year and a half, and is working a full time job." ~New Bedford Shannon



In 2021, the New Bedford Police Department confirmed 11 active gangs with 120 validated gang members (2/3 under the age of 25). The gangs are considered "hybrid" street gangs, but affiliate with national gang organizations (i.e., Gangster Disciples, Bloods, Crips, Shotgun Crips, Latin Kings, Vice Lords). Cyberspace and social media platforms have become the most common means by which gangs communicate, disrespect, and threaten one another. Gang members openly flaunt weapons, drugs, and cash on their posts and use rap music videos to taunt rivals.

The NBPD Gang Unit has recently purged their gang database and is in the process of changing the criteria by which they measure an individual's gang affiliation; therefore, although it may look like our gang population has dropped, we continue to experience gang violence from primarily neighborhood gangs that often claim affiliation to national organizations.
