<u>Funded Partners</u>: 18 Degrees - Pittsfield Community Connections, Pittsfield Police Department

Funded by the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security's Office of Grants and Research, the Charles E. Shannon Community Safety Initiative (Shannon) is modeled after the <u>Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention's</u> <u>Comprehensive Gang Model</u>. Shannon is a multi-sector approach used to address a community's gang and youth violence problem. Each community receiving Shannon funding demonstrates the presence of risk factors for youth and gang violence. Shannon participants must be between the ages of 10-24 years.

Youth Risk Assessments

45% LOW-RISK*	Youth in danger of engaging in risky behavior or gang activity.
36% MODERATE- RISK*	Youth exposed to the same risk factors as low-risk youth, as well as additional risk factors such as truancy.
19% HIGH-RISK*	Youth who are perpetrators or victims of shooting or stabbing violence, and/or are known gang members.

* % of youth assessed for risk; responses in risk assessment may have been impacted by changes in context due to COVID-19 pandemic.

"A program participant was in need of support in managing the legal system after they had obtained charges for driving without a license. Throughout the months of court dates and probation, the youth communicated with the program about making appropriate decisions to secure a new job and attend their final year in school. 

Gang Activity in Pittsfield

200+ Active Gang Members 30-50 Gang Members Under 25 "In Pittsfield we have a variety of different gangs, we have the national gangs that all people are aware of ie. Bloods, Crips, Latin kings. We also have street gangs that have developed in the area that will sometimes align themselves with the larger gangs. We also have the street gangs from the Springfield area that come to Pittsfield and/or Berkshire County. To my knowledge we haven't had any recent gang on gang violence, usually the violence stems from individual issues. Normally people think of Bloods and Crips being rival gangs, but often times we see groups that have members from both Gangs affiliating with one another in order to facilitate the sale of narcotics. The gang activity in Pittsfield revolves around the sales of narcotics and prostitution. Means of recruitment stem from neighborhood or street level recruitment, social media, and entertainment (music)." -Investigator Thomas J. Bowler
