# 2021 CHARLES E. SHANNON COMMUNITY SAFETY INITIATIVE FALL RIVER

Funded by the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security's Office of Grants and Research, the Charles E. Shannon Community Safety Initiative (Shannon) is modeled after the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention's Comprehensive Gang Model. Shannon is a multi-sector approach used to address a community's gang and youth violence problem. Each community receiving Shannon funding demonstrates the presence of risk factors for youth and gang violence. Shannon participants must be between the ages of 10-24 years.

#### Youth Risk Assessments

# 26% Youth in danger of engaging in risky LOW-RISK\* behavior or gang activity. 24% Youth exposed to the same risk factors MODERATE- as low-risk youth, as well as additional risk factors such as truancy. 50% Youth who are perpetrators or victims of HIGH-RISK\* shooting or stabbing violence, and/or are known gang members.

"A young man who had left high school and was minimally participating in a tutoring program was able to finally return to high school this school year with the support of his mentor and family. Also, this young man returned to counseling services to address his depression and anxiety symptoms that had been impacting his daily functioning and physical health."

# Gang Activity in Fall River



Over the past year, the City of Fall River has seen multiple shootings involving members/associates of violent street gangs. The Asian Boyz and the Gangster Disciples are most active, but members of the Crips, Mafioso, Gangster Disciple sets, Boston-based street gangs, 40 Blocc, 1 % Motorcycle Gangs, and Latin Kings were also involved and the targets of multiple search warrants. These gangs continue to target the city's youth by actively trying to recruit them into their gangs We are seeing youth, some as young as 12 years old, join street gangs for protection, recognition, brotherhood, intimidation, criminal activity, feeling of belonging, and financial gain. Within the last two years, we have seen more neighborhood gangs come into existence rather than gangs that are nationally affiliated. These gangs such as Topside and YBG consist of mostly younger at-risk juveniles as young as 12. Due to the age of many of these members and associates, they are difficult to track and identify.
