Commonwealth Corporation's <u>Workforce Training Fund Program (WTFP)</u> is announcing \$19,474,544 in General Program Training Grants awarded to employers for incumbent worker training projects. The mission of the WTFP is to promote job growth, job retention, and increased opportunity for workers by increasing businesses productivity, competitiveness, and ability to do business in Massachusetts. These two-year grants are awarded competitively and can range from \$10,000 to \$250,000.

At this time, we are announcing 150 grants, involving 187 employers, to train 12,010 individuals, resulting in 2,773 new jobs expected to be added by 2025. General Program grants pay for the cost of customized training for incumbent workers. Grant recipients contribute a matching investment of at least one dollar for each grant-dollar awarded. Match investment includes wages paid to trainees during training. WTFP grants are awarded on a rolling basis throughout the year. Grant recipients are notified once an award has been approved, but grants are announced publicly periodically. This announcement includes General Program training grants awarded from January 2023 through October 2023.
